- *Unrestrained merrymaking.*



Synonyms of "Revelry" as a noun (14 Words)

- carousal** Revelry in drinking; a merry drinking party.
- carousing** Revelry in drinking; a merry drinking party.
*A night of **carousing**.*
- celebration** A social gathering or enjoyable activity held to celebrate something.
*A birthday **celebration**.*
- celebrations** A joyful occasion for special festivities to mark some happy event.
The celebration of marriage.
- debauchery** Excessive indulgence in sex, alcohol, or drugs.
- festivities** Any joyous diversion.
- festivity** The celebration of something in a joyful and exuberant way.
*A time of great rejoicing and **festivity**.*

- frolics** Gay or light-hearted recreational activity for diversion or amusement.
Their frolic in the surf threatened to become ugly.
- jollification** Lively celebration with others; merrymaking.
*He could have gone into London and enjoyed the **jollifications**.*
A boisterous celebration; a merry festivity.
- merrymaking** *I d had my fill of **merrymaking** and decided to stay put till my headache eased.*
- parties** A band of people associated temporarily in some activity.
In 1992 Perot tried to organize a third party at the national level.
- partying** A band of people associated temporarily in some activity.
- revel** Lively and noisy enjoyment, especially with drinking and dancing.
*Late night **revels**.*
- revels** Unrestrained merrymaking.



Usage Examples of "Revelry" as a noun

- *New Year revelries.*
- *Sounds of revelry issued into the night.*



Associations of "Revelry" (30 Words)

- alcohol** A liquor or brew containing alcohol as the active agent.
*It is an offence to drive if you have more than 80 mg of **alcohol** per 100 ml of blood.*
- alcoholic** Addicted to alcohol- Carl Van Doren.
***Alcoholic** liquor.*

bacchanalian	Characterized by or given to drunken revelry. <i>A night of bacchanalian revelry.</i>
beer	An alcoholic drink made from yeast-fermented malt flavoured with hops. <i>He ordered a beer.</i>
bibulous	Given to or marked by the consumption of alcohol. <i>A bibulous fellow.</i>
carousal	Revelry in drinking; a merry drinking party.
carouse	Engage in boisterous, drunken merrymaking. <i>Corporate carouses.</i>
celebration	A social gathering or enjoyable activity held to celebrate something. <i>The birth of his son was a cause for celebration.</i>
drink	A social gathering at which alcoholic drinks are served. <i>The children like to drink soda.</i>
drunken	Caused by or showing the effects of drink. <i>Gangs of drunken youths roamed the streets.</i>
feast	Partake in a feast or banquet. <i>A feast day.</i>
guzzle	Drink greedily or as if with great thirst. <i>The boys guzzled the cheap vodka.</i>
inebriate	A drunkard. <i>He was inebriated by his phenomenal success.</i>
inebriated	Stupefied or excited by a chemical substance (especially alcohol). <i>I got mildly inebriated.</i>
inebriety	A temporary state resulting from excessive consumption of alcohol. <i>The ravages of inebriety.</i>
intoxicate	Have an intoxicating effect on, of a drug. <i>Van Gogh went to Provence where he was intoxicated by the Mediterranean sunlight.</i>
intoxicated	As if under the influence of alcohol. <i>A noisy crowd of intoxicated sailors.</i>
liquor	Steep (something, especially malt) in water. <i>Waste liquors.</i>
oaf	An awkward stupid person. <i>They are just big clumsy oafs.</i>
plastered	Covered with or made of plaster. <i>Coarsely plastered brickwork.</i>

reveler	A celebrant who shares in a noisy party. <i>The clubs attract revelers as young as thirteen.</i>
sip	Drink in sips. <i>She took a sip of the red wine.</i>
sober	Become sober after excessive alcohol consumption. <i>A sober grey suit.</i>
spree	Take part in a spree. <i>A shopping spree.</i>
tipple	Drink moderately but regularly. <i>Those who liked to tipple and gamble.</i>
tipsy	Slightly drunk. <i>A tipsy boat.</i>
