<b>daydreaming</b>	Absentminded dreaming while awake.
<b>fancy</b>	Enthusiasts for a sport, especially boxing or racing, considered collectively. <i>He is prone to flights of <b>fancy</b>.</i>
<b><u>fantasy</u></b>	The faculty or activity of imagining impossible or improbable things. <i>A schoolgirl <b>fantasy</b>.</i>
<b><u>hallucination</u></b>	Illusory perception; a common symptom of severe mental disorder. <i>His dreams of vast wealth are a <b>hallucination</b>.</i>
<b>idea</b>	The content of cognition; the main thing you are thinking about. <i>Our menu list will give you some <b>idea</b> of how interesting a low fat diet can be.</i>
<b>musings</b>	A period of reflection or thought. <i>His <b>musings</b> were interrupted by the sound of the telephone.</i>
<b>notion</b>	Items used in sewing, such as buttons, pins, and hooks. <i>The theatrical <b>notion</b> of disguise is associated with disaster in his stories.</i>
<b>oneirism</b>	Absentminded dreaming while awake.
<b>revery</b>	An abstracted state of absorption.
<b><u>trance</u></b>	A state of abstraction. <i>The kind of <b>trance</b> he went into whenever illness was discussed.</i>
<b>vision</b>	The images seen on a television screen. <i>He had a <b>vision</b> of the Virgin Mary.</i>

<b><u>delusion</u></b>	An erroneous belief that is held in the face of evidence to the contrary. <i>What a capacity television has for <b>delusion</b>.</i>
<b><u>dreamer</u></b>	Someone who is dreaming. <i>A rebellious young <b>dreamer</b>.</i>
<b><u>dreaming</u></b>	A series of mental images and emotions occurring during sleep.
<b><u>engrossed</u></b>	Giving or marked by complete attention to. <i>That <b>engrossed</b> look or rapt delight.</i>
<b><u>envision</u></b>	Imagine; conceive of; see in one's mind. <i>I cannot <b>envision</b> him as President.</i>
<b><u>fantasy</u></b>	Denoting a competition or league in which participants select imaginary teams from among the players in a real sports league and score points according to the actual performance of their players. <i>Look at their dedication to <b>fantasy</b> leagues and the enormous minutiae of the stats they memorize.</i>
<b><u>hallucination</u></b>	An experience involving the apparent perception of something not present. <i>He refused to believe that the angel was a <b>hallucination</b>.</i>
<b>hypnosis</b>	The induction of a state of consciousness in which a person apparently loses the power of voluntary action and is highly responsive to suggestion or direction. Its use in therapy, typically to recover suppressed memories or to allow modification of behaviour, has been revived but is still controversial. <i>I was regressed under <b>hypnosis</b>.</i>
<b>hypnotism</b>	The study or practice of hypnosis.
<b>illusive</b>	Based on or having the nature of an illusion. <i><b>Illusive</b> hopes of finding a better job.</i>
<b>illusory</b>	Based on illusion; not real. <i>She knew the safety of her room was <b>illusory</b>.</i>
<b><u>imaginary</u></b>	Not based on fact; unreal- F.D.Roosevelt. <i>A small child s <b>imaginary</b> friends.</i>
<b>intent</b>	Intention or purpose. <i>With alarm she realized his <b>intent</b>.</i>
<b>mesmerism</b>	The therapeutic system of F. A. Mesmer.
<b>oversleep</b>	Sleep longer than intended. <i>We talked until the early hours and consequently I overslept.</i>
<b><u>preoccupied</u></b>	Deeply absorbed in thought. <i>She seemed a bit <b>preoccupied</b>.</i>

<b>psychoanalysis</b>	A system of psychological theory and therapy which aims to treat mental disorders by investigating the interaction of conscious and unconscious elements in the mind and bringing repressed fears and conflicts into the conscious mind by techniques such as dream interpretation and free association. <i>His physician recommended <b>psychoanalysis</b>.</i>
<b>relaxation</b>	(physiology) the gradual lengthening of inactive muscle or muscle fibers. <i>The <b>relaxation</b> of requirements.</i>
<b>sleep</b>	Be able to accommodate for sleeping. <i>Two more <b>sleeps</b> till I fly to LA.</i>
<b><u>slumber</u></b>	Sleep. <i>Scaring folk from their <b>slumbers</b>.</i>
<b><u>subconscious</u></b>	The subconscious part of the mind not in technical use in psychoanalysis where unconscious is preferred. <i>Uncertainties were lurking around the edge of her <b>subconscious</b>.</i>
<b>thoughtful</b>	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>Her work is <b>thoughtful</b> and provocative.</i>
<b><u>visualize</u></b>	Imagine; conceive of; see in one's mind. <i>Mathematicians often <b>visualize</b>.</i>
<b>waking</b>	The state of being awake. <i>Worked every moment of my <b>waking</b> hours.</i>
