## Synonyms of "Revitalize" as a verb (29 Words)

- bolster** Prop up with a pillow or bolster.  
*The fall in interest rates is starting to **bolster** confidence.*
- brace** Support or hold steady and make steadfast with or as if with a brace.  
*She **braced** her feet against a projecting shelf.*
- breathe new life into** Reach full flavor by absorbing air and being let to stand after having been uncorked.
- build up** Be engaged in building.
- enliven** Make (someone) more cheerful or animated.  
*The wartime routine was **enlivened** by a series of concerts.*

<b>fortify</b>	Prepare oneself for a military confrontation. <i>The enclave has been heavily fortified in recent years.</i>
<b>give a boost to</b>	Inflict as a punishment.
<b>give new strength to</b>	Be flexible under stress of physical force.
<b>help</b>	Give help or assistance be of service. <i>She never <b>helps</b> around the house.</i>
<b>kick-start</b>	Start a motorcycle by means of a kick starter.
<b>prop up</b>	Support by placing against something solid or rigid.
<b>put new life into</b>	Formulate in a particular style or language.
<b>put some spark into</b>	Estimate.
<b>reanimate</b>	Give fresh vigour or impetus to. <i>His personal dislike of the man was <b>reanimated</b>.</i>
<b>reawaken</b>	(with reference to a feeling or state) emerge or cause to emerge again; awaken again. <i>A sense of community started to <b>reawaken</b> in the 1970s.</i>
<b>refresh</b>	Refresh one's memory. <i>Short term courses give nurses an opportunity to <b>refresh</b> their skills.</i>
<b>regenerate</b>	Restore strength. <i>Once destroyed brain cells do not <b>regenerate</b>.</i>
<b>reinvigorate</b>	Give new energy or strength to. <i>We are fully committed to reinvigorating the economy of the area.</i>
<b>rejuvenate</b>	Restore (a river or stream) to a condition characteristic of a younger landscape. <i>A new challenge may be just what he needs to <b>rejuvenate</b> his career.</i>
<b>rekindle</b>	Kindle anew, as of a fire. <i><b>Rekindle</b> her love.</i>
<b>renew</b>	Replace (something that is broken or worn out). <i>Detectives <b>renewed</b> their appeal for witnesses to contact them.</i>
<b>restore</b>	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>Order was eventually <b>restored</b> by riot police.</i>
<b>resuscitate</b>	Make (something) active or vigorous again. <i>Measures to <b>resuscitate</b> the ailing economy.</i>
<b>revitalise</b>	Give new life or vigor to.

<b>revive</b>	Be brought back to life, consciousness, or strength. <i>She <b>revived</b> after the doctor gave her an injection.</i>
<b>revivify</b>	Give new life or vigour to. <i>They <b>revivified</b> a wine industry that had all but vanished.</i>
<b>stimulate</b>	Encourage development of or increased activity in (a state or process). <i>The women are given fertility drugs to <b>stimulate</b> their ovaries.</i>
<b>strengthen</b>	Gain strength. <i><b>Strengthen</b> the relations between the two countries.</i>
<b><u>uplift</u></b>	Lift up from the earth, as by geologic forces. <i>Audiences will be <b>uplifted</b> by this incredible tale of fighting for your dreams.</i>

<b>reanimate</b>	Give fresh vigour or impetus to. <i>In the vain hope of being <b>reanimated</b> he left his body to science.</i>
<b>recover</b>	Get or find back recover the use of. <i>Many companies <b>recovered</b> their costs within six months.</i>
<b><u>recreate</u></b>	Create anew. <i>She <b>recreated</b> the feeling of the 1920 s with her stage setting.</i>
<b>reestablish</b>	Bring back into original existence, use, function, or position. <i><b>Reestablish</b> peace in the region.</i>
<b>refresh</b>	Refresh one's memory. <i>The tea is cold and the pot needs <b>refreshing</b>.</i>
<b><u>regain</u></b>	Obtain possession or use of (something, typically a quality or ability) again after losing it. <i>She <b>regained</b> control of herself.</i>
<b><u>regenerate</u></b>	Bring, lead, or force to abandon a wrong or evil course of life, conduct, and adopt a right one. <i>A <b>regenerate</b> sinner.</i>
<b><u>reincarnation</u></b>	The Hindu or Buddhist doctrine that a person may be reborn successively into one of five classes of living beings (god or human or animal or hungry ghost or denizen of Hell) depending on the person's own actions. <i>He believed he was the <b>reincarnation</b> of Louis XVI.</i>
<b><u>reinstate</u></b>	Restore (someone or something) to their former position or state. <i>The union threatened strike action if Owen was not <b>reinstated</b>.</i>
<b><u>rejuvenate</u></b>	Return to life; get or give new life or energy. <i>Exfoliation <b>rejuvenates</b> the skin.</i>
<b>rejuvenation</b>	The phenomenon of vitality and freshness being restored. <i>The annual <b>rejuvenation</b> of the landscape.</i>
<b><u>renew</u></b>	Replace (something that is broken or worn out). <i>The parents <b>renewed</b> their campaign to save the school.</i>
<b>renewal</b>	The act of renewing. <i>The need for urban <b>renewal</b>.</i>

<b>renovate</b>	Restore to a previous or better condition. <i>This will <b>renovate</b> my spirits.</i>
<b><u>replenish</u></b>	Fill (something) up again. <i>He <b>replenished</b> Justin s glass with mineral water.</i>
<b>reproduce</b>	Have offspring or produce more individuals of a given animal or plant. <i>He <b>reproduced</b> the feeling of sadness in the portrait.</i>
<b>resilience</b>	The capacity to recover quickly from difficulties; toughness. <i>Nylon is excellent in wearability abrasion resistance and <b>resilience</b>.</i>
<b>restore</b>	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>The week at the spa <b>restored</b> me.</i>
<b>resurge</b>	Rise again. <i>His need for a meal <b>resurged</b>.</i>
<b><u>resurgence</u></b>	An increase or revival after a period of little activity, popularity, or occurrence. <i>A <b>resurgence</b> of interest in religion.</i>
<b><u>resurrect</u></b>	Restore from a depressed, inactive, or unused state. <i>He queried whether Jesus was indeed <b>resurrected</b>.</i>
<b>resuscitate</b>	Return to consciousness. <i>An ambulance crew tried to <b>resuscitate</b> him.</i>
<b>retrieve</b>	Recall (something). <i>The police hope to encourage him to <b>retrieve</b> forgotten memories.</i>
<b><u>revival</u></b>	A reawakening of religious fervour, especially by means of evangelistic meetings. <i>Cryogenic <b>revival</b> patients.</i>
<b>revive</b>	Regain life, consciousness, or strength. <i>The cool refreshing water <b>revived</b> us all.</i>
<b><u>shattered</u></b>	Very upset. <i>Our <b>shattered</b> dreams of peace and prosperity.</i>
<b>vim</b>	An imaginative lively style (especially style of writing). <i>He seemed full of <b>vim</b> and vigor.</i>
<b>vivify</b>	Make more striking or animated. <i>Outings <b>vivify</b> learning for children.</i>
