- (in bridge, whist, and other card games) fail to follow suit despite being able to do so.
- Fail to follow suit when able and required to do so.
- Cancel officially.
- Officially cancel (a decree, decision, or promise).

abolish	Formally put an end to (a system, practice, or institution). <i>Slavery was abolished in the mid 19th century in America and in Russia.</i>
abrogate	Revoke formally. <i>A proposal to abrogate temporarily the right to strike.</i>

<u>cancel</u>	Delete (an equal factor) from both sides of an equation or from the numerator and denominator of a fraction. <i>Cancel cheques or tickets.</i>

<u>nullify</u>	Make legally null and void; invalidate. <i>Insulin can block the release of the hormone and thereby nullify the effects of training.</i>
<u>override</u>	Rule against. <i>The external rendering should not override the damp proof membrane.</i>
overrule	Reject or disallow by exercising one's superior authority. <i>Welfare staff overruled an experienced detective.</i>
<u>overturn</u>	Cause to overturn from an upright or normal position. <i>The big vase overturned.</i>

quash	Reject as invalid, especially by legal procedure. <i>His conviction was quashed on appeal.</i>
render invalid	Restate (words) from one language into another language.
repeal	Cancel officially. <i>The legislation was repealed five months later.</i>
rescind	Cancel officially. <i>The government eventually rescinded the directive.</i>
retract	Pull inward or towards a center. <i>The cat retracted his claws.</i>
reverse	Reverse the position order relation or condition of. <i>The court reversed his conviction.</i>
set aside	Become gelatinous.
vacate	Give up (a position or employment). <i>She vacated the position when she got pregnant.</i>
void	Declare invalid. <i>The chemist voided the glass bottle.</i>
withdraw	Withdraw from active participation. <i>Patients were withdrawn from therapy when they had been depression free for a month.</i>

delete	A command or key on a computer which erases text. <i>Please delete my name from your list.</i>
empty	Make void or empty of contents. <i>Empty bellied children.</i>
exterminate	Kill (a pest). <i>Hitler wanted to exterminate the Jews Gypsies Communists and homosexuals of Europe.</i>
invalidate	Make invalid for use. <i>Invalidate a contract.</i>
negate	Deny the truth of. <i>This action will negate the effect of my efforts.</i>
neutralize	Make incapable of military action. <i>Her optimism neutralizes his gloom.</i>
null	Combine a signal with another in order to create a null cancel out. <i>Null and void.</i>
nullify	Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of. <i>Judges were unwilling to nullify government decisions.</i>
override	A device for suspending an automatic function on a machine. <i>This commitment should override all other considerations.</i>
reject	The person or thing that is rejected or set aside as inferior in quality. <i>His body could begin to reject the implanted heart.</i>
remove	Remove from a position or an office. <i>The death of her mother removed the last obstacle to their marriage.</i>
repeal	The action of revoking or annulling a law or act of parliament. <i>The House voted in favour of repeal.</i>
repel	Be repellent to cause aversion in. <i>The alleged right of lien led by the bankrupt s solicitor was repelled.</i>
repudiation	Rejecting or disowning or disclaiming as invalid. <i>The repudiation of the debt by the city.</i>

rescind	Cancel officially. <i>The government eventually rescinded the directive.</i>
rescission	The act of rescinding; the cancellation of a contract and the return of the parties to the positions they would have had if the contract had not been made. <i>The plaintiff agreed to the rescission of the agreement.</i>
reversible	(of a reaction) occurring together with its converse, and so yielding an equilibrium mixture of reactants and products. <i>The entropy change is zero only in the limiting case of a reversible process.</i>
revocable	Capable of being revoked or cancelled. <i>A revocable order.</i>
revocation	The state of being cancelled or annulled. <i>The revocation of a law.</i>
terminate	Terminate the employment of discharge from an office or position. <i>Adamson s putting pressure on me to terminate you.</i>
<u>vacate</u>	Give up (a position or employment). <i>She vacated the position when she got pregnant.</i>
<u>veto</u>	A rejection by right of veto. <i>Mother vetoed the trip to the chocolate store.</i>
