- *A refusal to continue to obey or conform.*



Synonyms of "Revolt" as a noun (22 Words)

act of defiance Something that people do or cause to happen.

act of resistance Something that people do or cause to happen.

anarchy A state of lawlessness and disorder (usually resulting from a failure of government).

*He must ensure public order in a country threatened with **anarchy**.*

coup An instance of successfully achieving something difficult.

*It was a major **coup** to get such a prestigious contract.*

disorder A disturbance of the peace or of public order.

*Recurrent food crises led to outbreaks of **disorder**.*

insurgence A large increase.

*He quelled the **insurgence** and became governor of the region.*

insurgency An organized rebellion aimed at overthrowing a constituted government through the use of subversion and armed conflict.

*Efforts to counter terrorism and **insurgency**.*

insurrection A violent uprising against an authority or government.

*The **insurrection** was savagely put down.*

<u>mutiny</u>	An open rebellion against the proper authorities, especially by soldiers or sailors against their officers. <i>A mutiny by those manning the weapons could trigger a global war.</i>
<u>overthrow</u>	A score made because the ball has been overthrown. <i>She was unprepared for this sudden overthrow of their normal way of living.</i>
<u>protest</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>A protest over planned pit closures.</i>
<u>rebellion</u>	Refusal to accept some authority or code or convention. <i>Each generation must have its own rebellion.</i>
regime change	The organization that is the governing authority of a political unit.
revolution	A single complete turn (axial or orbital). <i>Revolution about the axis of rotation.</i>
<u>riot</u>	An uproar. <i>Everyone thought she was a riot.</i>
rioting	A wild gathering involving excessive drinking and promiscuity. <i>The clashes followed a night of rioting in several parts of the city.</i>
rising	A movement upward. <i>The reforms led to peasant risings.</i>
sedition	An illegal action inciting resistance to lawful authority and tending to cause the disruption or overthrow of the government.
seizure of power	A sudden occurrence (or recurrence) of a disease.
<u>strike</u>	A pitch that passes through the strike zone. <i>Dockers voted for an all out strike.</i>
<u>subversion</u>	The act of subverting; as overthrowing or destroying a legally constituted government. <i>The ruthless subversion of democracy.</i>
<u>uprising</u>	An act of resistance or rebellion; a revolt. <i>An armed uprising.</i>



Usage Examples of "Revolt" as a noun

- *A country-wide revolt against the government.*
- *A revolt over tax increases.*
- *The peasants rose in revolt.*

churn up

Stir (cream) vigorously in order to make butter.

disgust

Fill with distaste.

*This spoiled food **disgusts** me.*

dislikeable

Have or feel a dislike or distaste for.

foul

Commit a foul break the rules.

***Foul** the water.*

gross out

Earn before taxes, expenses, etc.

mutiny

Engage in a mutiny against an authority.

*Thousands of the soldiers **mutinied** over the non-payment of wages.*

nauseate

Upset and make nauseated.

*They were **nauseated** by the jingoism.*

<u>rebel</u>	Take part in a rebellion renounce a former allegiance. <i>The Earl of Pembroke subsequently rebelled against Henry III.</i>
<u>repel</u>	Be repellent to cause aversion in. <i>Electrically charged objects attract or repel one another.</i>
<u>revolting</u>	Fill with distaste.
<u>riot</u>	Take part in a riot disturb the public peace by engaging in a riot. <i>An unrepentant prodigal son rioting off to far countries.</i>
rise	Rise to one s feet. <i>The sun had just risen.</i>
rise up	Rise up.
show resistance	Show in, or as in, a picture.
sicken	Make sick or ill. <i>He sickened at the thought.</i>
take part in an uprising	Have with oneself; have on one's person.
take to the streets	Require (time or space).
take up arms	Take somebody somewhere.

- *The Iceni revolted and had to be suppressed.*
- *He was revolted by the stench that greeted him.*
- *The people revolted when bread prices tripled again.*

betrayer	A person who says one thing and does another.
cheat	An act of cheating a fraud or deception. <i>I wish someone had told me my partner was cheating on me.</i>
coup	A sudden and decisive change of government illegally or by force. <i>It was a major coup to get such a prestigious contract.</i>
disloyal	Failing to be loyal to a person, country, or organization to which one has obligations. <i>Disloyal mutterings about his leadership.</i>
disloyalty	The quality of not being loyal to a person, country, or organization; unfaithfulness. <i>An accusation of disloyalty and betrayal.</i>
disobedience	The failure to obey. <i>Disobedience to law is sometimes justified.</i>

<u>firebrand</u>	Someone who deliberately foments trouble. <i>A political firebrand.</i>
instigator	Someone who deliberately foments trouble. <i>He was not the instigator of the incident.</i>
<u>insubordination</u>	An insubordinate act. <i>He was dismissed for insubordination.</i>
insurgent	A person who takes part in an armed rebellion against the constituted authority (especially in the hope of improving conditions). <i>An attack by armed insurgents.</i>
insurrection	A violent uprising against an authority or government. <i>Opposition to the new regime led to armed insurrection.</i>
junta	A group of military officers who rule a country after seizing power. <i>The country's ruling military junta.</i>
<u>mutiny</u>	Engage in a mutiny against an authority. <i>The crew were on the verge of mutiny.</i>
<u>overthrow</u>	A score made because the ball has been overthrown. <i>His throw missed the stumps and went for four overthrows.</i>
<u>protest</u>	Write or obtain a protest in regard to a bill. <i>The senator rose to register his protest.</i>
quisling	Someone who collaborates with an enemy occupying force. <i>He had the Quisling owner of the factory arrested.</i>
<u>rebel</u>	A person who takes part in an armed rebellion against the constituted authority especially in the hope of improving conditions. <i>The Earl of Pembroke subsequently rebelled against Henry III.</i>
<u>rebellion</u>	An act of armed resistance to an established government or leader. <i>An act of teenage rebellion.</i>
<u>renegade</u>	Become a renegade. <i>A renegade monk.</i>
restive	Being in a tense state. <i>The crowd had been waiting for hours and many were becoming restive.</i>
revolution	The overthrow of a government by those who are governed. <i>The country has had a socialist revolution.</i>
<u>revolutionary</u>	A radical supporter of political or social revolution. <i>A revolutionary discovery.</i>
<u>riot</u>	Take part in a riot disturb the public peace by engaging in a riot. <i>The film's sex scenes caused a riot in Cannes.</i>

rising	An armed protest against authority; a revolt. <i>A rising trend.</i>
seditions	In opposition to a civil authority or government. <i>The letter was declared seditions.</i>
subvert	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i>We must not let our civil liberties be subverted by the current crisis.</i>
traitor	A person who says one thing and does another. <i>He was a traitor to his own class.</i>
treason	The action of betraying someone or something. <i>They were convicted of treason.</i>
turncoat	A disloyal person who betrays or deserts his cause or religion or political party or friend etc. <i>They denounced him as a turncoat.</i>
uprising	An act of resistance or rebellion; a revolt. <i>An armed uprising.</i>
