insurgent	In opposition to a civil authority or government. <i>An attack by armed insurgents.</i>
junta	A group of military officers who rule a country after seizing power. <i>The country s ruling military junta.</i>
libertarian	An advocate of libertarianism. <i>A lot of people are very libertarian they just haven t heard the term.</i>
<u>overthrow</u>	A score made because the ball has been overthrown. <i>Plotting the overthrow of the government.</i>
political	Interested in or active in politics. <i>A political machine.</i>
