<b>alter dramatically</b>	Remove the ovaries of.
<b>inspire</b>	Animate someone with (a feeling). <i>He <b>inspired</b> his students with a vision of freedom.</i>
<b>make far-reaching changes in</b>	Have a bowel movement.
<b>metamorphose</b>	Change or cause to change completely in form or nature. <i>The salesman <b>metamorphosed</b> into an ugly beetle.</i>

**overturn**

Cause to overturn from an upright or normal position.

*The results **overturned** previous findings.*

**recast**

Cast or model anew.

*The bell cracked and had to be **recast**.*

**reform**

Make changes in (something, especially an institution or practice) in order to improve it.

*It was only when his drunken behaviour led to blows that he started to **reform**.*

**rejig**

Re-equip a factory or plant.

*Britain will send experts to help **rejig** French factories.*

**remould**

Put a new tread on (a worn tyre).

*Did the welfare state **remould** capitalism to give it a more human face.*

**reorganize**

Change the way in which (something) is organized.

*The company **reorganized** into fewer key areas.*

**reshape**

Shape again or shape differently.

*The decrees will thoroughly **reshape** Poland's economy.*

**restructure**

Construct or form anew or provide with a new structure.

*After his accident he had to **restructure** his life.*

**revolutionise**

Fill with revolutionary ideas.

**shake up**

Stir the feelings, emotions, or peace of.

**stir up**

Summon into action or bring into existence, often as if by magic.

**transfigure**

Transform into something more beautiful or elevated.

*Jesus was **transfigured** after his resurrection.*

**transform**

Subject to a mathematical transformation.

***Transform** energy to light.*

**transmute**

Subject (base metals) to alchemical transmutation.

*The raw material of his experience was **transmuted** into stories.*

**turn upside down**

Move around an axis or a center.

## Associations of "Revolutionize" (30 Words)

<b>atavism</b>	Recurrence of traits of an ancestor in a subsequent generation. <i>The more civilized a society seems to be the more susceptible it is to its buried <b>atavism</b>.</i>
<b>change</b>	Change from one vehicle or transportation line to another. <i>The <b>change</b> from a nomadic to an agricultural society.</i>
<b>countermand</b>	An order revoking a previous one. <i>An order to arrest the strike leaders had been <b>countermanded</b>.</i>
<b><u>coup</u></b>	An instance of successfully achieving something difficult. <i>He was overthrown in an army <b>coup</b>.</i>
<b><u>dramatic</u></b>	Exciting or impressive. <i>He recalled his <b>dramatic</b> escape from the building.</i>
<b>fend</b>	Look after and provide for oneself, without any help from others. <i>The youngsters had to <b>fend</b> for themselves after their parents died.</i>
<b><u>flip</u></b>	The act of flipping a coin. <i>She <b>flipped</b> off her dark glasses.</i>
<b>funnel</b>	Move or be guided through or as if through a funnel. <i>They were close to the middle of the cloud <b>funnel</b>.</i>
<b>inverse</b>	Opposite or contrary in position, direction, order, or effect. <i>The age of such a universe is simply the <b>inverse</b> of the Hubble constant.</i>
<b>inversion</b>	A transformation in which each point of a given figure is replaced by another point on the same straight line from a fixed point especially in such a way that the product of the distances of the two points from the centre of inversion is constant. <i>An <b>inversion</b> of traditional customer supplier relationships.</i>
<b>invert</b>	A gay person. <i><b>Invert</b> the mousse on to a serving plate.</i>
<b>locative</b>	A word in the locative case.
<b>obverse</b>	Of or denoting the obverse of a coin or medal. <i>The <b>obverse</b> fates of the principals.</i>
<b>opposite</b>	Characterized by opposite extremes completely opposed. <i>And I on the <b>opposite</b> shore will be ready to ride and spread the alarm.</i>
<b><u>overthrow</u></b>	A score made because the ball has been overthrown. <i>She was unprepared for this sudden <b>overthrow</b> of their normal way of living.</i>

<b><u>overturn</u></b>	An act of overturning something. <i>The crowd proceeded to <b>overturn</b> cars and set them on fire.</i>
<b>rearrange</b>	Put into a new order or arrangement. <i>Please <b>rearrange</b> these files.</i>
<b>renovate</b>	Restore (something old, especially a building) to a good state of repair. <i>They <b>renovated</b> the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel.</i>
<b>replacement</b>	A person or thing that takes the place of another. <i>The <b>replacement</b> of lost blood by a transfusion of donor blood.</i>
<b>retrograde</b>	Show retrograde motion. <i>The outer satellites move in <b>retrograde</b> orbits.</i>
<b>reversal</b>	Turning in an opposite direction or position. <i>There was a <b>reversal</b> of autonomic function.</i>
<b>reverse</b>	Reversed turned backward in order or nature or effect. <i>He didn't feel homesick quite the <b>reverse</b>.</i>
<b>setback</b>	A plain, flat offset in a wall. <i>A serious <b>setback</b> for the peace process.</i>
<b><u>subvert</u></b>	Undermine the power and authority of (an established system or institution). <i>An attempt to <b>subvert</b> democratic government.</i>
<b>takeover</b>	A change by sale or merger in the controlling interest of a corporation. <i>A company threatened with <b>takeover</b>.</i>
<b><u>throwback</u></b>	Characteristic of an atavist. <i>The eyes could be an ancestral <b>throwback</b>.</i>
<b>transposition</b>	The action of transposing something. <i><b>Transposition</b> of word order.</i>
<b>turnabout</b>	A decision to reverse an earlier decision. <i>The move was a significant <b>turnabout</b> for the company.</i>
<b><u>turnaround</u></b>	The process of or time taken for unloading and reloading a ship, aircraft, or vehicle. <i>A seven day <b>turnaround</b>.</i>
<b>upset</b>	The act of upsetting something. <i>He <b>upset</b> a tureen of soup.</i>
