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## Associations of "Revolutionized" (30 Words)

<b>atavism</b>	A tendency to revert to something ancient or ancestral. <i>The more civilized a society seems to be the more susceptible it is to its buried <b>atavism</b>.</i>
<b>change</b>	Money given in exchange for the same sum in larger units. <i>He is going to be worse for the next two or three days because the moon has <b>changed</b>.</i>
<b>countermand</b>	An order revoking a previous one. <i>He was already <b>countermanding</b> her.</i>
<b><u>coup</u></b>	A direct pocketing of the cue ball, which is a foul stroke. <i>He was overthrown in an army <b>coup</b>.</i>
<b><u>dramatic</u></b>	(of a person or their behaviour) intending or intended to create an effect; theatrical. <i>With a <b>dramatic</b> gesture she put a hand to her brow.</i>
<b>fend</b>	Look after and provide for oneself, without any help from others. <i>The youngsters had to <b>fend</b> for themselves after their parents died.</i>
<b><u>flip</u></b>	The act of flipping a coin. <i>A quick <b>flip</b> through my cookery books.</i>
<b>funnel</b>	Guide or channel something through or as if through a funnel. <i>A <b>funnel</b> of light fell from a circular ceiling.</i>
<b>inverse</b>	Something inverted in sequence or character or effect. <i>A term is in <b>inverse</b> proportion to another term if it increases or decreases as the other decreases or increases.</i>
<b>inversion</b>	A transformation in which each point of a given figure is replaced by another point on the same straight line from a fixed point especially in such a way that the product of the distances of the two points from the centre of inversion is constant. <i>Administration officials admit that their new effort to deter corporate <b>inversions</b> won't actually stop the practice.</i>

<b>invert</b>	Put upside down or in the opposite position, order, or arrangement. <i>When forming a question <b>invert</b> the subject and the verb.</i>
<b>locative</b>	A word in the locative case.
<b>obverse</b>	Of or denoting the obverse of a coin or medal. <i>True solitude is the <b>obverse</b> of true society.</i>
<b>opposite</b>	Of angles between opposite sides of the intersection of two lines. <i>The <b>opposite</b> sex.</i>
<b><u>overthrow</u></b>	A score made because the ball has been overthrown. <i>The Czar was <b>overthrown</b>.</i>
<b><u>overturn</u></b>	Cause to overturn from an upright or normal position. <i>The crowd proceeded to <b>overturn</b> cars and set them on fire.</i>
<b>rearrange</b>	Change (the position, time, or order of something). <i>She <b>rearranged</b> her skirt as she sat back in her chair.</i>
<b>renovate</b>	Restore (something old, especially a building) to a good state of repair. <i>They <b>renovated</b> the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel.</i>
<b>replacement</b>	A person who follows next in order. <i>A hip <b>replacement</b>.</i>
<b>retrograde</b>	Show retrograde motion. <i>Our history must <b>retrograde</b> for the space of a few pages.</i>
<b>reversal</b>	An adverse change of fortune. <i>The <b>reversal</b> of the image in the lens.</i>
<b>reverse</b>	Reverse the position order relation or condition of. <i>The ship's engines <b>reversed</b> and cut out altogether.</i>
<b>setback</b>	An unfortunate happening that hinders or impedes; something that is thwarting or frustrating. <i>They had to get permission to overlap the city's <b>setback</b> lines.</i>
<b><u>subvert</u></b>	Destroy completely. <i>We must not let our civil liberties be <b>subverted</b> by the current crisis.</i>
<b>takeover</b>	An act of assuming control of something, especially the buying out of one company by another. <i>A company threatened with <b>takeover</b>.</i>
<b><u>throwback</u></b>	Characteristic of an atavist. <i>A lot of his work is a <b>throwback</b> to the fifties.</i>
<b>transposition</b>	The act of reversing the order or place of. <i>He wrote a textbook on the electrical effects of <b>transposition</b>.</i>

- turnabout** A sudden and complete change or reversal of policy, opinion, or of a situation.  
*The move was a significant **turnabout** for the company.*
