<b>brink</b>	A region marking a boundary. <i>The country was on the <b>brink</b> of a constitutional crisis.</i>
<b>brow</b>	An eyebrow. <i>His <b>brows</b> lifted in surprise.</i>
<b>causeway</b>	A road that is raised above water or marshland or sand. <i>An island reached at low tide by a <b>causeway</b>.</i>
<b>cliff</b>	A steep high face of rock. <i>A coast path along the top of rugged <b>cliffs</b>.</i>
<b>crag</b>	A steep or rugged cliff or rock face.
<b>crest</b>	A plume of feathers on a helmet. <i>A large game bird with a conspicuous erect red <b>crest</b>.</i>
<b>crown</b>	Dentistry dental appliance consisting of an artificial crown for a broken or decayed tooth. <i>An erect evergreen tree with a dense <b>crown</b>.</i>
<b>dam</b>	A metric unit of length equal to ten meters. <i>The <b>dam</b> burst after torrential rain.</i>
<b>earthwork</b>	An earthen rampart. <i>Bronze Age <b>earthworks</b>.</i>
<b>escarpment</b>	A long, steep slope, especially one at the edge of a plateau or separating areas of land at different heights.
<b>head</b>	Usually plural the obverse side of a coin that usually bears the representation of a person's head. <i>An 8 m <b>head</b> of water in the shafts.</i>
<b>headland</b>	A natural elevation (especially a rocky one that juts out into the sea).
<b>height</b>	The vertical dimension of extension; distance from the base of something to the top. <i>He's terrified of <b>heights</b>.</i>
<b>highest part</b>	A public secondary school usually including grades 9 through 12.
<b>highest point</b>	A forward gear with a gear ratio that gives the greatest vehicle velocity for a given engine speed.
<b>hill</b>	A heap or mound of something. <i>They were climbing a steep <b>hill</b> in low gear.</i>
<b>inselberg</b>	An isolated hill or mountain rising abruptly from a plain.
<b>levee</b>	A landing place; a quay.
<b>mound</b>	The position on a baseball team of the player who throws the ball for a batter to try to hit. <i>The dead were cremated and then buried at the centre of a great <b>mound</b>.</i>

<b>mountain</b>	A large number or amount or extent. <i>They sought refuge in the <b>mountains</b>.</i>
<b>mountaintop</b>	The area at the top of a mountain. <i>The <b>mountaintop</b> castle.</i>
<b>overhang</b>	A quantity of securities or commodities large enough to make prices fall if offered for sale. <i>He crouched beneath an <b>overhang</b> of bushes.</i>
<b>peak</b>	The point of highest activity, quality, or achievement. <i>At the <b>peak</b> of the pyramid.</i>
<b>pinnacle</b>	A slender upright spire at the top of a buttress of tower. <i>Catapulted Einstein to the <b>pinnacle</b> of fame.</i>
<b>precipice</b>	A very steep rock face or cliff, especially a tall one. <i>We swerved toward the edge of the <b>precipice</b>.</i>
<b>promontory</b>	A point of high land that juts out into the sea or a large lake; a headland. <i>A rocky <b>promontory</b>.</i>
<b>puy</b>	A small extinct volcanic cone in the Auvergne, France.
<b>ridgeline</b>	The line of the ridge of a roof.
<b>ridgepole</b>	A beam laid along the edge where two sloping sides of a roof meet at the top; provides an attachment for the upper ends of rafters.
<b>rock face</b>	Pitching dangerously to one side.
<b>rooftree</b>	A beam laid along the edge where two sloping sides of a roof meet at the top; provides an attachment for the upper ends of rafters.
<b>scarp</b>	A very steep bank or slope an escarpment. <i>The north face is a very steep <b>scarp</b>.</i>
<b>serac</b>	A pinnacle or ridge of ice on the surface of a glacier.
<b>summit</b>	The highest attainable level of achievement. <i>She climbed back up the path towards the <b>summit</b>.</i>
<b>tip</b>	An indication of potential opportunity. <i>George pressed the <b>tips</b> of his fingers together.</i>
<b>tor</b>	A hill or rocky peak. <i>Glastonbury <b>Tor</b>.</i>
<b>vertex</b>	The point of intersection of lines or the point opposite the base of a figure.

- cliff** A steep high face of rock.  
*A coast path along the top of rugged **cliffs**.*

<b><u>climbing</u></b>	The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. <b><i>Climbing</i></b> equipment.
<b>crest</b>	The center of a cambered road. <i>A high wave formed by the meeting of two <b>crests</b>.</i>
<b><u>gradient</u></b>	An increase or decrease in the magnitude of a property (e.g. temperature, pressure, or concentration) observed in passing from one point or moment to another. <i>A five degree <b>gradient</b>.</i>
<b><u>hill</u></b>	Form into a hill. <i>They loved to roam the <b>hills</b> of West Virginia.</i>
<b>meridian</b>	Relating to or situated at a meridian. <i>The European Broadcasting Area extends from the Atlantic to the <b>meridian</b> 40 E.</i>
<b>minaret</b>	A slender tower, typically part of a mosque, with a balcony from which a muezzin calls Muslims to prayer.
<b>mound</b>	A large pile or quantity of something. <i>Basmati rice was <b>mounded</b> on our plates.</i>
<b><u>mountain</u></b>	A large natural elevation of the earth's surface rising abruptly from the surrounding level; a large steep hill. <i>A <b>mountain</b> peak.</i>
<b><u>peak</u></b>	A V shape. <i>The <b>peak</b> halyard.</i>
<b><u>pinnacle</u></b>	Raise on or as if on a pinnacle. <i>He had reached the <b>pinnacle</b> of his career.</i>
<b><u>plateau</u></b>	A relatively flat highland. <i>The industry s problems have <b>plateaued</b> out.</i>
<b><u>precipice</u></b>	A very steep cliff. <i>We swerved toward the edge of the <b>precipice</b>.</i>
<b>precipitant</b>	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation- Shakespeare- Arthur Geddes. <i>The immediate <b>precipitants</b> of the conflict.</i>
<b>precipitous</b>	Dangerously high or steep. <i>The track skirted a <b>precipitous</b> drop.</i>
<b>promontory</b>	A protuberance on an organ or other bodily structure. <i>A rocky <b>promontory</b>.</i>
<b>ravine</b>	A deep narrow steep-sided valley (especially one formed by running water).

- rung** A crosspiece between the legs of a chair.  
*We must ensure that the low skilled do not get trapped on the bottom **rung**.*
- sandstone** A sedimentary rock consisting of sand consolidated with some cement (clay or quartz etc.)
- scarp** Provide a ditch in a fortification with a steep scarp and counterscarp.  
*The north face is a very steep **scarp**.*
- steep** A steep mountain slope.  
*Note the **steep** incline.*
- summit** Reach the summit of a mountain.  
*The region is a few molecules wide at the **summit**.*
- top** Situated at the top or highest position.  
*He couldn't get the **top** off of the bottle.*
- valley** An internal angle formed by the intersecting planes of a roof, or by the slope of a roof and a wall.  
*The **valley** floor.*
