- *Any long raised border or margin of a bone or tooth or membrane.*
- *An elongated region of high barometric pressure.*
- *Any long raised strip.*
- *A long narrow range of hills.*
- *A raised strip of arable land, especially (in medieval fields) one of a set separated by furrows.*
- *A long narrow natural elevation or striation.*
- *A narrow raised band on a surface.*
- *The line or edge formed where the two sloping sides of a roof meet at the top.*

aiguille	A sharp pinnacle of rock in a mountain range.
alp	A high mountain, especially a snow-capped one.
apex	The highest point of achievement; a climax. <i>The apex of his career was in 1966 when he hoisted aloft the World Cup for England.</i>
apogee	The highest point in the development of something; a climax or culmination. <i>A film which was the apogee of German expressionist cinema.</i>
bank	An elevation in the seabed or a riverbed a mudbank or sandbank. <i>A grassy bank.</i>
barrier	A gate at a car park or railway station that controls access by being raised or lowered. <i>Intolerance is a barrier to understanding.</i>

<u>brink</u>	A region marking a boundary. <i>The country was on the brink of a constitutional crisis.</i>
brow	An eyebrow. <i>His brows lifted in surprise.</i>
causeway	A road that is raised above water or marshland or sand. <i>An island reached at low tide by a causeway.</i>
<u>cliff</u>	A steep high face of rock. <i>A coast path along the top of rugged cliffs.</i>
crag	A steep or rugged cliff or rock face.
crest	A plume of feathers on a helmet. <i>A large game bird with a conspicuous erect red crest.</i>
<u>crown</u>	Dentistry dental appliance consisting of an artificial crown for a broken or decayed tooth. <i>An erect evergreen tree with a dense crown.</i>
dam	A metric unit of length equal to ten meters. <i>The dam burst after torrential rain.</i>
earthwork	An earthen rampart. <i>Bronze Age earthworks.</i>
escarpment	A long, steep slope, especially one at the edge of a plateau or separating areas of land at different heights.
head	Usually plural the obverse side of a coin that usually bears the representation of a person's head. <i>An 8 m head of water in the shafts.</i>
headland	A natural elevation (especially a rocky one that juts out into the sea.
<u>height</u>	The vertical dimension of extension; distance from the base of something to the top. <i>He's terrified of heights.</i>
highest part	A public secondary school usually including grades 9 through 12.
highest point	A forward gear with a gear ratio that gives the greatest vehicle velocity for a given engine speed.
<u>hill</u>	A heap or mound of something. <i>They were climbing a steep hill in low gear.</i>
inselberg	An isolated hill or mountain rising abruptly from a plain.
levee	A landing place; a quay.
mound	The position on a baseball team of the player who throws the ball for a batter to try to hit. <i>The dead were cremated and then buried at the centre of a great mound.</i>

<u>mountain</u>	A large number or amount or extent. <i>They sought refuge in the mountains.</i>
mountaintop	The area at the top of a mountain. <i>The mountaintop castle.</i>
overhang	A quantity of securities or commodities large enough to make prices fall if offered for sale. <i>He crouched beneath an overhang of bushes.</i>
<u>peak</u>	The point of highest activity, quality, or achievement. <i>At the peak of the pyramid.</i>
<u>pinnacle</u>	A slender upright spire at the top of a buttress of tower. <i>Catapulted Einstein to the pinnacle of fame.</i>
<u>precipice</u>	A very steep rock face or cliff, especially a tall one. <i>We swerved toward the edge of the precipice.</i>
promontory	A point of high land that juts out into the sea or a large lake; a headland. <i>A rocky promontory.</i>
puy	A small extinct volcanic cone in the Auvergne, France.
ridgeline	The line of the ridge of a roof.
ridgepole	A beam laid along the edge where two sloping sides of a roof meet at the top; provides an attachment for the upper ends of rafters.
rock face	Pitching dangerously to one side.
rooftree	A beam laid along the edge where two sloping sides of a roof meet at the top; provides an attachment for the upper ends of rafters.
scarp	A very steep bank or slope an escarpment. <i>The north face is a very steep scarp.</i>
serac	A pinnacle or ridge of ice on the surface of a glacier.
<u>summit</u>	The highest attainable level of achievement. <i>She climbed back up the path towards the summit.</i>
tip	An indication of potential opportunity. <i>George pressed the tips of his fingers together.</i>
tor	A hill or rocky peak. <i>Glastonbury Tor.</i>
vertex	The point of intersection of lines or the point opposite the base of a figure.

apex

Turn (a corner) very close to the edge of the track.
*Melodic lines build up to the chorus and it **apexes** at the solo.*

brae

A slope or hillside.
*A figure was spied struggling up the **brae**.*

butte

A hill that rises abruptly from the surrounding region; has a flat top and sloping sides.

canyon

A deep gorge, typically one with a river flowing through it, as found in North America.
*The Grand **Canyon**.*

cliff

A steep high face of rock.
*A coast path along the top of rugged **cliffs**.*

<u>climbing</u>	The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. Climbing equipment.
crest	The center of a cambered road. <i>A high wave formed by the meeting of two crests.</i>
<u>gradient</u>	An increase or decrease in the magnitude of a property (e.g. temperature, pressure, or concentration) observed in passing from one point or moment to another. <i>A five degree gradient.</i>
<u>hill</u>	Form into a hill. <i>They loved to roam the hills of West Virginia.</i>
meridian	Relating to or situated at a meridian. <i>The European Broadcasting Area extends from the Atlantic to the meridian 40 E.</i>
minaret	A slender tower, typically part of a mosque, with a balcony from which a muezzin calls Muslims to prayer.
mound	A large pile or quantity of something. <i>Basmati rice was mounded on our plates.</i>
<u>mountain</u>	A large natural elevation of the earth's surface rising abruptly from the surrounding level; a large steep hill. <i>A mountain peak.</i>
<u>peak</u>	A V shape. <i>The peak halyard.</i>
<u>pinnacle</u>	Raise on or as if on a pinnacle. <i>He had reached the pinnacle of his career.</i>
<u>plateau</u>	A relatively flat highland. <i>The industry s problems have plateaued out.</i>
<u>precipice</u>	A very steep cliff. <i>We swerved toward the edge of the precipice.</i>
precipitant	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation- Shakespeare-Arthur Geddes. <i>The immediate precipitants of the conflict.</i>
precipitous	Dangerously high or steep. <i>The track skirted a precipitous drop.</i>
promontory	A protuberance on an organ or other bodily structure. <i>A rocky promontory.</i>
ravine	A deep narrow steep-sided valley (especially one formed by running water.

rung	A crosspiece between the legs of a chair. <i>We must ensure that the low skilled do not get trapped on the bottom rung.</i>
sandstone	A sedimentary rock consisting of sand consolidated with some cement (clay or quartz etc.
scarp	Provide a ditch in a fortification with a steep scarp and counterscarp. <i>The north face is a very steep scarp.</i>
<u>steep</u>	A steep mountain slope. <i>Note the steep incline.</i>
<u>summit</u>	Reach the summit of a mountain. <i>The region is a few molecules wide at the summit.</i>
top	Situated at the top or highest position. <i>He couldn't get the top off of the bottle.</i>
<u>valley</u>	An internal angle formed by the intersecting planes of a roof, or by the slope of a roof and a wall. <i>The valley floor.</i>
