<b>lampoon</b>	A speech or text lampooning someone or something. <i>The magazine fired at God Royalty and politicians using cartoons and <b>lampoons</b>.</i>
<b>laughter</b>	The activity of laughing; the manifestation of joy or mirth or scorn. <i>He roared with <b>laughter</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">mockery</a></u>	Showing your contempt by derision. <i>Stung by her <b>mockery</b> Frankie hung his head.</i>
<u><a href="#">parody</a></u>	An imitation or version of something that falls far short of the real thing; a travesty. <i>The film is a <b>parody</b> of the horror genre.</i>
<b>raillery</b>	Light teasing repartee. <i>She was greeted with <b>raillery</b> from her fellow workers.</i>
<b>sarcasm</b>	Witty language used to convey insults or scorn. <i>She didn't like the note of <b>sarcasm</b> in his voice.</i>
<u><a href="#">satire</a></u>	A play novel film or other work which uses satire. <i>The crude <b>satire</b> seems to be directed at the fashionable protest singers of the time.</i>
<b>scoffing</b>	Showing your contempt by derision. <i>He had to overcome the <b>scoffing</b> of theoretical physicists.</i>

<b>scorn</b>	A feeling and expression of contempt or disdain for someone or something. <i>A scandal and a <b>scorn</b> to all who look on thee.</i>
<b>sneering</b>	The action of smiling or speaking in a contemptuous or mocking manner. <i>It will take a concerted effort from many to lay off the <b>sneering</b> and try understanding.</i>
<b>sneers</b>	A facial expression of contempt or scorn; the upper lip curls.
<b>taunting</b>	Aggravation by deriding or mocking or criticizing.
<b>taunts</b>	Aggravation by deriding or mocking or criticizing.
<b><u>teasing</u></b>	Playful vexation. <i>The parody was just a form of <b>teasing</b>.</i>

<b>lampoon</b>	Publicly criticize (someone or something) by using ridicule, irony, or sarcasm. <i>The actor was <b>lampooned</b> by the press.</i>

<b>make fun of</b>	Carry out or commit.
<b>make jokes about</b>	Give rise to; cause to happen or occur, not always intentionally.

<b><u>discredit</u></b>	Cause to be distrusted or disbelieved. <i>His remarks were taken out of context in an effort to <b>discredit</b> him.</i>
<b><u>disrepute</u></b>	The state of being held in low esteem. <i>One of the top clubs in the country is bringing the game into <b>disrepute</b>.</i>
<b>disrespect</b>	A manner that is generally disrespectful and contemptuous. <i>A young brave who <b>disrespects</b> his elders.</i>
<b>flout</b>	Treat with contemptuous disregard. <i>The women pointed and <b>flouted</b> at her.</i>
<b>gibe</b>	Laugh at with contempt and derision. <i>She proved impervious to his sarcastic <b>gibes</b>.</i>
<b>heckle</b>	Comb with a heckle. <i>He was booed and <b>heckled</b> when he tried to address the demonstrators.</i>
<b>hoot</b>	With reference to a car horn siren etc make or cause to make a hoot. <i>A car horn <b>hooted</b> frightening her.</i>
<b><u>insult</u></b>	A disrespectful or scornfully abusive remark or act. <i>The movement of the bone causes a severe tissue <b>insult</b>.</i>

<b>satirize</b>	Ridicule with satire. <i>The writer <b>satirized</b> the politician's proposal.</i>
<u><a href="#">scoff</a></u>	Showing your contempt by derision. <i>You, a scientist, he <b>scoffed</b>.</i>
<b>scorn</b>	A person viewed with contempt or disdain. <i>A letter <b>scorning</b> his offer of intimacy.</i>
<u><a href="#">sneer</a></u>	Smile or speak in a contemptuous or mocking manner. <i>She <b>sneered</b> her contempt.</i>
<b>spoof</b>	Interfere with (radio or radar signals) so as to make them useless. <i>Word got out that the whole thing had been a <b>spoof</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">travesty</a></u>	Make a travesty of. <i>The absurdly lenient sentence is a <b>travesty</b> of justice.</i>
