## **Ridiculousness as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Ridiculousness" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “ridiculousness” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The quality or state of deserving or inviting derision or mockery.*
- *A message whose content is at variance with reason.*



## Synonyms of "Ridiculousness" as a noun (2 Words)

**absurdness** A message whose content is at variance with reason.

| <b>funny</b>        | Not as expected.<br><i>The <b>funny</b> thing is I can't remember much about it.</i>   |
| <b>goofy</b>        | Having or displaying protruding or crooked front teeth.<br><i>A <b>goofy</b> grin.</i>   |
| <b>idiotic</b>      | Having a mental age of three to seven years.<br><i>An <b>idiotic</b> idea.</i>   |
| <b>illogical</b>    | Lacking in correct logical relation.<br><i>An <b>illogical</b> fear of the supernatural.</i>   |
| <b>inadvisable</b>  | Not prudent or wise; not recommended.<br><i>It would be <b>inadvisable</b> to involve more than one architect.</i>                                 |
| <b>incongruity</b>  | The quality of disagreeing; being unsuitable and inappropriate.<br><i>The <b>incongruity</b> of his fleshy face and skinny body disturbed her.</i> |
| <b>incongruous</b>  | Lacking in harmony or compatibility or appropriateness.<br><i><b>Incongruous</b> behavior.</i>   |
| <b>irrational</b>   | An irrational number or quantity a surd.<br><i><b>Irrational</b> feelings of hostility.</i>  |
| <b>laughable</b>    | Arousing or provoking laughter.<br><i>A contribution so small as to be <b>laughable</b>.</i>   |
| <b>ludicrous</b>    | Broadly or extravagantly humorous; resembling farce.<br><i>It is <b>ludicrous</b> to call a cottage a mansion.</i>                                 |
| <b>mocking</b>      | Abusing vocally; expressing contempt or ridicule.<br><i>He got jeers and <b>mocking</b> laughter as he addressed the marchers.</i>                 |
| <b>nonsense</b>     | Spoken or written words that have no meaning or make no sense.<br><i>She's a strong woman who stands no <b>nonsense</b>.</i>                       |
| <b>patsy</b>        | A person who is gullible and easy to take advantage of.<br><i>There is a mischievous sparkle in his eyes that suggests he is no <b>patsy</b>.</i>  |
| <b>preposterous</b> | So unreasonable as to invite derision.<br><i>A <b>preposterous</b> attempt to turn back the pages of history.</i>                                  |

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| <b>risible</b>             | Provoking laughter through being ludicrous.<br><i>A <b>risible</b> scene of lovemaking in a tent.</i>                      |
| <b>satiric</b>             | Exposing human folly to ridicule.<br><i>A persistent campaign of mockery by the <b>satirical</b> fortnightly magazine.</i> |
| <b>silly</b>               | A foolish person (often used as a form of address).<br><i>He would brood about <b>silly</b> things.</i>                    |
| <b>skit</b>                | A short theatrical episode.<br><i>A <b>skit</b> on daytime magazine programmes.</i>  |
| <u><b>unreasonable</b></u> | Beyond normal limits.<br><i>She knew she was being <b>unreasonable</b> but she resented his domesticity.</i>               |
| <u><b>unwise</b></u>       | Showing or resulting from lack of judgment or wisdom.<br><i>It is <b>unwise</b> to rely on hearsay evidence.</i>           |
