- *Correctly so called; genuine.*
- *Very good; excellent.*
- *Morally right or justifiable.*
- *Morally justified.*
- *Characterized by or proceeding from accepted standards of morality or justice.*
- *(of a person) morally good; virtuous.*
- *Characterized by or proceeding from accepted standards of morality or justice- James 5:16.*

- decent** Decently clothed.
*A **decent** high necked dress.*
- defensible** Capable of being defended.
*A fort with a **defensible** yard at its feet.*
- good** Pleasing and welcome.
*A warranty **good** for two years.*
- just** Of an opinion or appraisal well founded justifiable.
*A **just** cause.*
- justifiable** Able to be shown to be right or reasonable; defensible.
*Their **justifiable** fears.*
- justified** Having, done for, or marked by a good or legitimate reason.
***Justified** right margins.*
- legitimate** Based on known statements or events or conditions.
*The last **legitimate** Anglo Saxon king.*
- rightful** Having a legitimate right to property, position, or status.
*A **rightful** inheritance.*
- supportable** Capable of being borne though unpleasant.

- upright** Upright in position or posture.
*An **upright** vacuum cleaner.*
- upstanding** (of an animal) strong and healthy.
***Upstanding** feathered plumes.*
- virtuous** Morally excellent.
*She considered herself very **virtuous** because she neither drank nor smoked.*
- worthy** Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse.
*These issues are **worthy** of further consideration.*

- *Victory in battle was conferred on the righteous.*
- *He is righteous trash.*

Openly; explicitly.
*She nodded **barely** able to speak.*

coincidentally

Happening at the same time.
*The three are **coincidentally** reunited when captured by the enemy.*

comer	Someone who arrives (or has arrived). <i>Many in the party see tax relief as a comer.</i>
correct	Make right or correct. <i>He corrected Dixon s writing for publication.</i>
correctly	In a way that is true, factual or appropriate; accurately. <i>She correctly answered eight questions.</i>
equitable	Fair to all parties as dictated by reason and conscience. <i>An equitable distribution of gifts among the children.</i>
ethical	Adhering to ethical and moral principles. <i>Had no ethical objection to drinking.</i>
evenhanded	Without partiality. <i>Evenhanded justice.</i>
exactly	In a precise manner. <i>They met in 1989 and got married exactly two years later.</i>
fitting	Being precisely fitting and right. <i>We have come to dedicate a portion of that field It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.</i>
hap	An accidental happening. <i>What can hap to him worthy to be deemed evil.</i>
happenstance	Coincidence. <i>An untoward happenstance for Trudy.</i>
just	Of an opinion or appraisal well founded justifiable. <i>A just and democratic society.</i>
justness	The quality of being just or fair. <i>It was performed with justness and beauty.</i>
legitimate	Make an illegitimate child legitimate declare the legitimacy of someone. <i>The regime was not legitimated by popular support.</i>
marginally	In a marginal manner. <i>He s marginally worse than he was.</i>
merely	And nothing more. <i>Gary a silent boy merely nodded.</i>
precisely	Used as a reply to confirm or agree with a previous statement. <i>At 2 00 precisely the phone rang.</i>
purely	Entirely; exclusively. <i>The purpose of the meeting was purely to give information.</i>
pushover	Any undertaking that is easy to do. <i>Colonel Moore was benevolent but no pushover.</i>

rectitude	Morally correct behaviour or thinking; righteousness. <i>Mattie is a model of rectitude.</i>
redress	Remedy or compensation for a wrong or grievance. <i>The power to redress the grievances of our citizens.</i>
right	The hand that is on the right side of the body. <i>He writes with his right hand but pitches with his left.</i>
rightful	Legally valid. <i>The rightful owner of the jewels.</i>
rightness	The quality or state of being best or most appropriate for a particular situation. <i>They are convinced of the rightness of their theories.</i>
scarcely	Only a very short time before. <i>Her voice is so low I can scarcely hear what she is saying.</i>
simply	Merely; just. <i>It s simply beautiful.</i>
slightly	To a small degree or extent. <i>The children argued because one slice of cake was slightly larger than the other.</i>
timely	Done or occurring sufficiently early; prompt. <i>Timely diagnosis and subsequent early administration will be imperative.</i>
virtuous	Having or showing high moral standards. <i>She considered herself very virtuous because she neither drank nor smoked.</i>
