<b>gamey</b>	Willing to face danger.
<b>gamy</b>	Suggestive of sexual impropriety. <i>A <b>gamy</b> stew of various meats.</i>
<b>juicy</b>	Temporarily appealing. <i>The promise of <b>juicy</b> returns.</i>
<b>naughty</b>	Mildly rude or indecent, typically because related to sex. <i>A <b>naughty</b> wink.</i>
<b>spicy</b>	Flavoured with or fragrant with spice. <i><b>Spicy</b> jokes and suggestive songs.</i>

<b>brat</b>	A small pork sausage. <i>She s been acting like a spoiled <b>brat</b> all evening.</i>
<b>dilettante</b>	A person who cultivates an area of interest, such as the arts, without real commitment or knowledge. <i>A wealthy literary <b>dilettante</b>.</i>
<b>flamboyant</b>	Showy tropical tree or shrub native to Madagascar; widely planted in tropical regions for its immense racemes of scarlet and orange flowers; sometimes placed in genus Poinciana. <i>The band s <b>flamboyant</b> lead singer.</i>
<b>frisky</b>	Playful like a lively kitten. <i>He bounds about like a <b>frisky</b> pup.</i>
<b>fun</b>	A source of fun. <i>He became a figure of <b>fun</b>.</i>
<b>grin</b>	Smile broadly. <i>The skull <b>grinned</b> back at him its eye sockets dark and hollow.</i>
<b>incomprehensible</b>	Incapable of being explained or accounted for. <i>The most <b>incomprehensible</b> thing about the universe is that it is comprehensible.</i>
<b>irreverent</b>	Showing a lack of respect for people or things that are generally taken seriously. <i><b>Irreverent</b> scholars mocking sacred things.</i>
<b>kicking</b>	Lively and exciting. <i>They gave him a good <b>kicking</b>.</i>
<b>lively</b>	Difficult or challenging. <i>A <b>lively</b> tennis ball.</i>
<b>meretricious</b>	Relating to or characteristic of a prostitute. <i><b>Meretricious</b> souvenirs for the tourist trade.</i>
<b>mischievous</b>	(of an action or statement) causing or intended to cause harm or trouble. <i><b>Mischievous</b> rumors and falsehoods.</i>

<b><u>nasty</u></b>	Damaging or harmful. <i>A <b>nasty</b> trick to pull.</i>
<b><u>naughty</u></b>	Wicked. <i>A <b>naughty</b> wink.</i>
<b><u>playful</u></b>	Giving or expressing pleasure and amusement. <i>He gave me a <b>playful</b> punch on the arm.</i>
<b>prankster</b>	Someone who plays practical jokes on others.
<b>pretentious</b>	Tawdry or vulgar. <i>The <b>pretentious</b> jargon of wine experts.</i>
<b>puckish</b>	Playful, especially in a mischievous way. <i>A <b>puckish</b> sense of humour.</i>
<b>punishment</b>	The infliction or imposition of a penalty as retribution for an offence. <i>He approved of stiff <b>punishments</b> for criminals.</i>
<b>raffish</b>	Marked by a carefree unconventionality or disreputableness- Crary Moore. <i>A cocktail party given by some <b>raffish</b> bachelors.</i>
<b><u>rampant</u></b>	(of a plant) lush in growth; luxuriant. <i>A rich soil soon becomes home to <b>rampant</b> weeds.</i>
<b>ribald</b>	A ribald person someone who uses vulgar and offensive language. <i><b>Ribald</b> language.</i>
<b>robust</b>	Uncompromising and forceful. <i>The country's political system has continued to be <b>robust</b> in spite of its economic problems.</i>
<b>showy</b>	Marked by ostentation but often tasteless. <i>A cheap <b>showy</b> rhinestone bracelet.</i>
<b>smiling</b>	Smiling with happiness or optimism. <i>It's nice to see everyone's <b>smiling</b> faces.</i>
<b>spank</b>	Give a spanking to subject to a spanking. <i>She was <b>spanked</b> for spilling ink on the carpet.</i>
<b><u>spirited</u></b>	Made lively or spirited. <i>A warm hearted generous <b>spirited</b> man.</i>
<b><u>whimsical</u></b>	Acting or behaving in a capricious manner. <i>The victim of <b>whimsical</b> persecutions.</i>
