<b>rigmarole</b>	A lengthy and complicated procedure. <i>She went into a long <b>rigmarole</b> about the different jobs she d had.</i>
<b>rite</b>	Any customary observance or practice. <i>The British family Christmas <b>rite</b>.</i>

- ablution** An act of washing oneself.  
*The women performed their **ablutions**.*
- baptism** The Christian religious rite of sprinkling water on to a person's forehead or of immersing them in water symbolizing purification or regeneration and admission to the Christian Church. In many denominations baptism is performed on young children and is accompanied by name giving.

- baptismal** Of or relating to baptism.

<b>ceremony</b>	The proper or conventional behavior on some solemn occasion. <i>A public <b>ceremony</b>.</i>
<b>coven</b>	An assembly of witches; usually 13 witches. <i><b>Covens</b> of militants within the party.</i>
<b>dedicated</b>	Solemnly dedicated to or set apart for a high purpose. <i><b>Dedicated</b> to the proposition that all men are created equal.</i>
<u><b>devout</b></u>	Deeply religious. <i>A rabbi s <b>devout</b> prayers.</i>
<b>fanatically</b>	In a passionately fanatic manner.
<b>funeral</b>	A sermon delivered at a funeral. <i>Her <b>funeral</b> had to pass.</i>
<b>godly</b>	Emanating from God-Saturday Review. <i>How to live the <b>godly</b> life.</i>
<b>impurity</b>	A constituent which impairs the purity of something. <i>A struggle to rid the soul of sin and <b>impurity</b>.</i>
<b>incantation</b>	A ritual recitation of words or sounds believed to have a magical effect. <i>An <b>incantation</b> to raise the dead.</i>
<b>liturgy</b>	A religious service conducted according to a liturgy. <i>A tradition which found its expression in ritual and <b>liturgy</b>.</i>
<b>oblation</b>	The presentation of bread and wine to God in the Eucharist. <i><b>Oblations</b> for aid to the poor.</i>
<b>ordination</b>	A statistical technique in which data from a large number of sites or populations are represented as points in a multidimensional space. <i>The rabbi s family was present for his <b>ordination</b>.</i>
<u><b>pilgrimage</b></u>	Go on a pilgrimage. <i>Now is the thirty first year of my dark <b>pilgrimage</b> on this earth.</i>
<u><b>pious</b></u>	Making or constituting a hypocritical display of virtue. <i><b>Pious</b> readings.</i>
<b>proselyte</b>	A Gentile who has converted to Judaism.
<b>religious</b>	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience. <i><b>Religious</b> houses were built on ancient pagan sites.</i>
<b>rite</b>	A religious or other solemn ceremony or act. <i>The British family Christmas <b>rite</b>.</i>
<b>sacrament</b>	A thing of mysterious and sacred significance; a religious symbol. <i>He heard Mass and received the <b>sacrament</b>.</i>



<b>sacred</b>	Regarded as too valuable to be interfered with; sacrosanct. <i>Cows are <b>sacred</b> and the eating of beef is taboo.</i>
<b>saintly</b>	Relating to a saint. <i>A truly <b>saintly</b> woman.</i>
<b>savagery</b>	The property of being untamed and ferocious. <i>Without adult society the children descend into <b>savagery</b>.</i>
<b>shaman</b>	In societies practicing shamanism one acting as a medium between the visible and spirit worlds practices sorcery for healing or divination.
<b>shrine</b>	Enclose in a shrine. <i>A goddess <b>shrined</b> in every tree.</i>
<b>witch</b>	A follower or practitioner of Wicca or of modern witchcraft. <i>Mrs Mucharski had somehow <b>witched</b> the house.</i>
<b>witchcraft</b>	(in a modern context) religious practice involving magic and affinity with nature, usually within a pagan tradition. <i>Children and goods were believed to be vulnerable to the <b>witchcraft</b> of jealous neighbours.</i>
