## Road as a Noun

### Definitions of "Road" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “road” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A regular trade route for a particular commodity.*
- *A railroad.*
- *A way or means to achieve something.*
- *A railway track, especially as clear (or otherwise) for a train to proceed.*
- *A partly sheltered stretch of water near the shore in which ships can ride at anchor.*
- *An underground passage or gallery in a mine.*
- *An open way (generally public) for travel or transportation.*
- *A particular course or direction taken or followed.*
- *A series of events or a course of action that will lead to a particular outcome.*
- *The part of a road intended for vehicles, especially in contrast to a verge or pavement.*
- *A wide way leading from one place to another, especially one with a specially prepared surface which vehicles can use.*



## Synonyms of "Road" as a noun (13 Words)

<b>anchorage</b>	An anchorite's dwelling place. <i>The plant needs a firm <b>anchorage</b>.</i>
<b>course</b>	An area of land set aside and prepared for racing, golf, or another sport. <i>He took a <b>course</b> in basket weaving.</i>
<b>direction</b>	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action. <i>He checked the <b>direction</b> and velocity of the wind.</i>
<b>harbour</b>	A place of refuge. <i>A curved breakwater was built of large stones to construct a small <b>harbour</b>.</i>
<b>highway</b>	(chiefly in official use) a public road. <i>A six lane <b>highway</b>.</i>
<b>mooring</b>	A place where a craft can be made fast. <i>The great ship slipped her <b>moorings</b> and slid out into the Atlantic.</i>

<b>path</b>	An established line of travel or access. <i>Genius usually follows a revolutionary <b>path</b>.</i>
<b>port</b>	A place seaport or airport where people and merchandise can enter or leave a country. <i>The French <b>port</b> of Toulon.</i>
<b>roads</b>	An open way (generally public) for travel or transportation.
<b>roadway</b>	A road (especially that part of a road) over which vehicles travel.
<b>route</b>	An established line of travel or access. <i>Proposals have been put forward for a new <b>route</b> around the south of the town.</i>
<b>thoroughfare</b>	A road or path forming a route between two places. <i>The teeming <b>thoroughfares</b> of central London.</i>
<b>way</b>	A general category of things used in the expression in the way of. <i>Get out of my <b>way</b>.</i>

## Associations of "Road" (30 Words)

### **asphalt**

Mixed asphalt and crushed gravel or sand used especially for paving but also for roofing.  
**Asphalt** the driveway.

<b>avenue</b>	A tree-lined approach to a country house or similar building. <i>Three possible <b>avenues</b> of research suggested themselves.</i>
<b>boulevard</b>	A wide street or thoroughfare. <i>Sunset <b>Boulevard</b>.</i>
<b>crisscross</b>	Crossing one another in opposite directions. <i>Wrinkles <b>crisscrossed</b> her face.</i>
<b>cross</b>	Draw a line or lines across mark with a cross. <i>A right <b>cross</b>.</i>
<b>crossing</b>	The action of crossing something. <i>A short ferry <b>crossing</b>.</i>
<b>crossover</b>	Relating to or denoting trials of medical treatment in which experimental subjects and control groups are exchanged after a set period. <i>A jazz classical <b>crossover</b> album.</i>
<b>crossroad</b>	A junction where one street or road crosses another.
<b>crosswalk</b>	A marked part of a road where pedestrians have right of way to cross; a pedestrian crossing.
<b>delineation</b>	The action of indicating the exact position of a border or boundary. <i>The artist s exquisite <b>delineation</b> of costume and jewellery.</i>
<b>drawbridge</b>	A bridge, especially one over a castle's moat, which is hinged at one end so that it may be raised to prevent people crossing or to allow vessels to pass under it. <i>There was a rattle of chains as the <b>drawbridge</b> was lowered.</i>
<b>fordable</b>	Shallow enough to be crossed by walking or riding on an animal or in a vehicle. <i>The stream was <b>fordable</b>.</i>
<b>highway</b>	A major road for any form of motor transport. <i>The <b>highway</b> to success.</i>
<b>intersect</b>	(of two or more things) pass or lie across each other. <i>The area is <b>intersected</b> only by minor roads.</i>
<b>intersection</b>	A point at which two or more things intersect, especially a road junction. <i>The <b>intersection</b> of a plane and a cone.</i>
<b>jaywalk</b>	Cross the road at a red light. <i>You <b>jaywalked</b> across a busy four lane street.</i>
<b>junction</b>	A region of transition in a semiconductor between a part where conduction is mainly by electrons and a part where it is mainly by holes. <i>The <b>junction</b> of Queen s Road and Lancaster Avenue.</i>
<b>lamppost</b>	A metal post supporting an outdoor lamp (such as a streetlight).

<b>lane</b>	Each of a number of notional parallel strips in the gel of an electrophoresis plate, occupied by a single sample. <i>The shipping <b>lanes</b> of the South Atlantic.</i>
<b><u>overlap</u></b>	A part or amount which overlaps. <i>The curtains <b>overlap</b> at the centre when closed.</i>
<b>path</b>	A definition of the order in which an operating system or program searches for a file or executable program. <i>Genius usually follows a revolutionary <b>path</b>.</i>
<b>pavement</b>	The paved surface of a thoroughfare. <i>He fell and hit his head on the <b>pavement</b>.</i>
<b><u>pedestrian</u></b>	Lacking wit or imagination. <i>Disenchantment with their <b>pedestrian</b> lives.</i>
<b>roadway</b>	The part of a bridge or railway used by traffic.
<b>route</b>	Send via a specific route. <i>The scenic <b>route</b> from Florence to Siena.</i>
<b>sidewalk</b>	Walk consisting of a paved area for pedestrians; usually beside a street or roadway.
<b>skyway</b>	A raised motorway. <i>A second storey <b>skyway</b> links the two shops.</i>
<b><u>street</u></b>	People living or working on the same street. <i>The <b>street</b> kids of the city.</i>
<b>walker</b>	New Zealand runner who in 1975 became the first person to run a mile in less than 3 minutes and 50 seconds (born in 1952). <i>A fell <b>walker</b>.</i>
<b><u>walkway</u></b>	A passage or path for walking along, especially a raised passageway connecting different sections of a building or a wide path in a park or garden.
