## Definitions of "Robber" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "robber" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- A thief who steals from someone by threatening violence.
- A person who commits robbery.





## Synonyms of "Robber" as a noun (9 Words)

<u>burglar</u>	A person who commits burglary.
cat burglar	A large tracked vehicle that is propelled by two endless metal belts; frequently used for moving earth in construction and farm work.
housebreaker	A wrecker of houses. In England a housewrecker is called a <b>housebreaker</b> .
mugger	A robber who takes property by threatening or performing violence on the person who is robbed (usually on the street. <i>The <b>mugger</b></i> snatched my purse and ran away.
pilferer	A thief who steals without using violence.
shoplifter	A thief who steals goods that are in a store. The supermarket had been targeted by <b>shoplifter</b> s and looters.
sneak thief	A person who is regarded as underhanded and furtive and contemptible.



stealerA person or thing that takes or steals a specified thing.<br/>He has been a remarkably strong base stealer.thiefA criminal who takes property belonging to someone else with the intention<br/>of keeping it or selling it.<br/>The thief stole the drugs from a doctor s surgery.



## Associations of "Robber" (30 Words)

<u>bandit</u>	A robber or outlaw belonging to a gang and typically operating in an isolated or lawless area. <i>The <b>bandit</b> produced a weapon and demanded money.</i>
<u>brigand</u>	A member of a gang that ambushes and robs people in forests and mountains.
burgle	Enter (a building) illegally with intent to commit a crime, especially theft. <i>Our house in London has been</i> <b>burgle</b> d.
<u>confiscate</u>	Surrendered as a penalty. The government <b>confiscate</b> d his property early in the war.



<u>crime</u>	Illegal activities. Shoplifting was a serious <b>crime</b> .
<u>encroach</u>	Advance gradually beyond usual or acceptable limits. The sea has <b>encroach</b> ed all round the coast.
<u>interloper</u>	A person who becomes involved in a place or situation where they are not wanted or are considered not to belong. <i>To her I was always an outsider an</i> <b>interloper</b> .
<u>intrude</u>	Enter unlawfully on someone's property. <i>The colors don t intrude on the viewer.</i>
<u>intruder</u>	Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission. <i>The intruder</i> had pulled out drawers and dumped their contents on the floor.
<u>invade</u>	Occupy in large numbers or live on a host. Demonstrators <b>invade</b> d the Presidential Palace.
larceny	Theft of personal property In English law larceny was replaced as a statutory crime by theft in 1968.
loot	Money. A gang <b>loot</b> ed Rs 1 5 lakh from a passenger.
lurk	A profitable stratagem; a dodge or scheme. A ruthless killer still <b>lurk</b> ed in the darkness.
<u>outlaw</u>	Declare illegal outlaw. The <b>outlaw</b> Ned Kelly.
piracy	A practice similar to piracy but in other contexts especially hijacking. <i>Air <b>piracy</b></i> .
<u>raid</u>	Conduct a raid on. An early morning <b>raid</b> on a bank.
rapine	The act of despoiling a country in warfare. <i>The fruits of violence and <b>rapine</b>.</i>
recidivist	Relating to recidivists. <i>Research reveals that murderers are less likely to be</i> <b>recidivist</b> <i>than other criminals.</i>
rob	Steal. The burglars <b>rob</b> bed him of all his money.
rustler	A person who rounds up and steals cattle, horses, or sheep. <i>The cattle <b>rustler</b>s stole over 700 cattle.</i>
shoplifting	The act of stealing goods that are on display in a store. Shrinkage is the retail trade s euphemism for <b>shoplifting</b> .



<u>thief</u>	A person who steals another person's property, especially by stealth and without using force or threat of violence. The <b>thief</b> stole the drugs from a doctor s surgery.
thieve	Take by theft. The students have been thieving my favourite art books.
trespass	Break the law. The defendants were guilty of <b>trespass</b> .
trespasser	A person entering someone's land or property without permission. A <b>trespasser</b> on his land.
unlawful	Having no legally established claim. <b>Unlawful</b> money.
usurpation	Wrongfully seizing and holding (an office or powers) by force (especially the seizure of a throne or supreme authority. <i>A succession of generals who ruled by <b>usurpation</b>.</i>
vagrancy	The state of wandering from place to place; having no permanent home or means of livelihood. A descent into <b>vagrancy</b> and drug abuse.
violate	Violate the sacred character of a place or language. <i>Violate</i> my privacy.
waylay	Wait in hiding to attack. <i>He waylaid me on the stairs.</i>
