- *Of, characterized by, or suggestive of an idealized view of reality.*

**sentimental** Given to or marked by sentiment or sentimentality.  
*I m a **sentimental** old fool.*

**sentimentality** Exaggerated and self-indulgent tenderness, sadness, or nostalgia.  
*There are passages which verge on **sentimentality**.*

**smitten** (used in combination) affected by something overwhelming.  
*Conscience **smitten**.*

**tender** Make a tender of in legal settlements.  
***Tender** loving care.*

**tryst** A private romantic rendezvous between lovers.  
*A moonlight **tryst**.*
