- *Absolutely still.*



Synonyms of "Rooted" as an adjective (2 Words)

frozen (used of foods) preserved by freezing sufficiently rapidly to retain flavor and nutritional value.

Frozen fish.

stock-still Absolutely still.

- *They stood rooted in astonishment.*

basal	Of primary importance. <i>The plant grows huge basal leaves.</i>
base	A known line used as a geometrical base for trigonometry. <i>Baseborn wretches with dirty faces.</i>
basilar	Of or situated at the base of something, especially of the skull, or of the organ of Corti in the ear. <i>The basilar membrane of the cochlea.</i>
basis	The fundamental assumptions from which something is begun or developed or calculated or explained. <i>On the basis of these statistics important decisions are made.</i>
cornerstone	A stone in the exterior of a large and important building; usually carved with a date and laid with appropriate ceremonies. <i>A national minimum wage remained the cornerstone of policy.</i>
deeply	To a great depth psychologically. <i>Dived deeply.</i>
down	Used as a command to a person or animal to sit or lie down. <i>You can plainly see the bottom 35 feet down.</i>
engross	Consume all of one's attention or time. <i>The solicitors will submit a draft conveyance and engross the same after approval.</i>
fixed	Fixed and unmoving Connor Cruise O'Brien. <i>A fixed iron ladder down the port side.</i>
foundation	A woman's undergarment worn to give shape to the contours of the body. <i>There is little foundation for his objections.</i>
fundamental	A fundamental note tone or frequency. <i>Two courses cover the fundamentals of microbiology.</i>
gist	The real point of an action. <i>I need a good friend I can always gist with.</i>
ground	Confine or restrict to the ground. <i>He lay on the ground.</i>
groundwork	Preliminary preparation as a basis or foundation. <i>We are prepared today because of groundwork that was done ten years ago.</i>
hypostasis	The suppression of a gene by the effect of an unrelated gene.

implanted	(used especially of ideas or principles) deeply rooted; firmly fixed or held. <i>Implanted convictions.</i>
ingrained	(of dirt or a stain) deeply embedded and thus difficult to remove. <i>Ingrained habits of a lifetime.</i>
jumping	The act of jumping propelling yourself off the ground. <i>The jumping was unexpected.</i>
nether	Dwelling beneath the surface of the earth. <i>Nether garments.</i>
pedestal	Set or support on a pedestal. <i>A pedestal washbasin.</i>
<u>primary</u>	A primary colour. <i>A primary alcohol.</i>
<u>profoundly</u>	To a great depth psychologically or emotionally. <i>A profoundly disturbing experience.</i>
prop	A propeller that rotates to push against air. <i>Before every scene he ran down his checklist of props.</i>
radix	The positive integer that is equivalent to one in the next higher counting place. <i>Judaism is the radix of Christianity.</i>
<u>root</u>	Plant by the roots. <i>Root growth.</i>
<u>stem</u>	Remove the stems from fruit or tobacco leaves. <i>If the wind will only freshen a little we shall be able to stem the first of the flood.</i>
<u>substrate</u>	An underlying substance or layer. <i>Brachiopods attached to the substrate by a stalk.</i>
tree	Plant with trees. <i>The hunters treed the bear with dogs and killed it.</i>
underside	The less favourable aspect of something. <i>The sordid underside of the glamorous 1980s.</i>
versed	Thoroughly acquainted through study or experience. <i>A solicitor well versed in employment law.</i>
