**Frozen** fish.

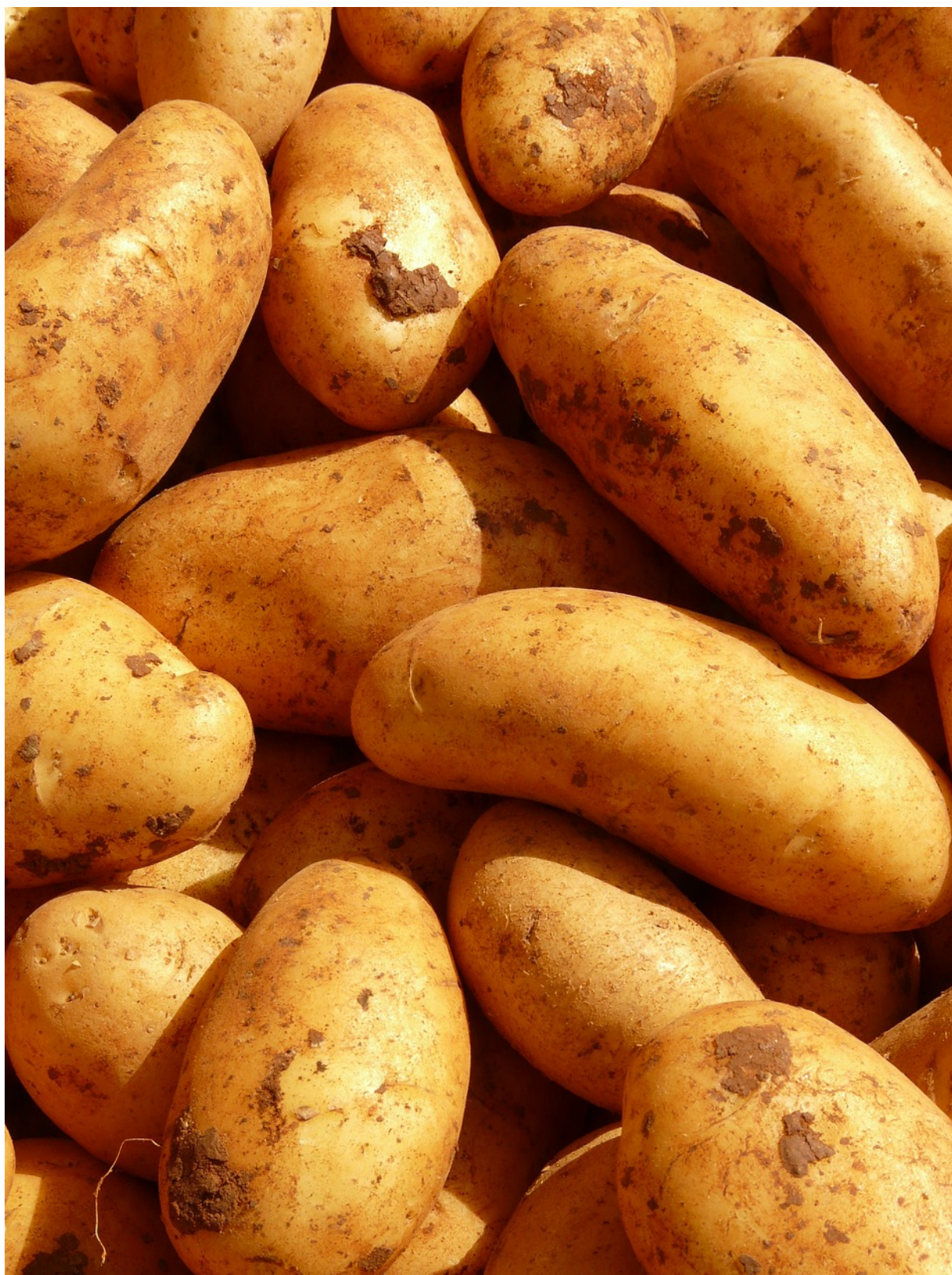
**stock-still** Absolutely still.

- *They stood rooted in astonishment.*





## Associations of "Rooted" (30 Words)

<b>basal</b>	Of primary importance. <i>The plant grows huge <b>basal</b> leaves.</i>
<b>base</b>	A known line used as a geometrical base for trigonometry. <i><b>Baseborn</b> wretches with dirty faces.</i>
<b>basilar</b>	Of or situated at the base of something, especially of the skull, or of the organ of Corti in the ear. <i>The <b>basilar</b> membrane of the cochlea.</i>
<b>basis</b>	The fundamental assumptions from which something is begun or developed or calculated or explained. <i>On the <b>basis</b> of these statistics important decisions are made.</i>
<b>cornerstone</b>	A stone in the exterior of a large and important building; usually carved with a date and laid with appropriate ceremonies. <i>A national minimum wage remained the <b>cornerstone</b> of policy.</i>
<b>deeply</b>	To a great depth psychologically. <i>Dived <b>deeply</b>.</i>
<b>down</b>	Used as a command to a person or animal to sit or lie down. <i>You can plainly see the bottom 35 feet <b>down</b>.</i>
<b>engross</b>	Consume all of one's attention or time. <i>The solicitors will submit a draft conveyance and <b>engross</b> the same after approval.</i>
<b>fixed</b>	Fixed and unmoving Connor Cruise O'Brien. <i>A <b>fixed</b> iron ladder down the port side.</i>
<b>foundation</b>	A woman's undergarment worn to give shape to the contours of the body. <i>There is little <b>foundation</b> for his objections.</i>
<b>fundamental</b>	A fundamental note tone or frequency. <i>Two courses cover the <b>fundamentals</b> of microbiology.</i>
<b>gist</b>	The real point of an action. <i>I need a good friend I can always <b>gist</b> with.</i>
<b>ground</b>	Confine or restrict to the ground. <i>He lay on the <b>ground</b>.</i>
<b>groundwork</b>	Preliminary preparation as a basis or foundation. <i>We are prepared today because of <b>groundwork</b> that was done ten years ago.</i>
<b>hypostasis</b>	The suppression of a gene by the effect of an unrelated gene.

<b>implanted</b>	(used especially of ideas or principles) deeply rooted; firmly fixed or held. <i><b>Implanted</b> convictions.</i>
<b>ingrained</b>	(of dirt or a stain) deeply embedded and thus difficult to remove. <i><b>Ingrained</b> habits of a lifetime.</i>
<b>jumping</b>	The act of jumping propelling yourself off the ground. <i>The <b>jumping</b> was unexpected.</i>
<b>nether</b>	Dwelling beneath the surface of the earth. <i><b>Nether</b> garments.</i>
<b>pedestal</b>	Set or support on a pedestal. <i>A <b>pedestal</b> washbasin.</i>
<u><b>primary</b></u>	A primary colour. <i>A <b>primary</b> alcohol.</i>
<u><b>profoundly</b></u>	To a great depth psychologically or emotionally. <i>A <b>profoundly</b> disturbing experience.</i>
<b>prop</b>	A propeller that rotates to push against air. <i>Before every scene he ran down his checklist of <b>props</b>.</i>
<b>radix</b>	The positive integer that is equivalent to one in the next higher counting place. <i>Judaism is the <b>radix</b> of Christianity.</i>
<u><b>root</b></u>	Plant by the roots. <i><b>Root</b> growth.</i>
<u><b>stem</b></u>	Remove the stems from fruit or tobacco leaves. <i>If the wind will only freshen a little we shall be able to <b>stem</b> the first of the flood.</i>
<u><b>substrate</b></u>	An underlying substance or layer. <i>Brachiopods attached to the <b>substrate</b> by a stalk.</i>
<b>tree</b>	Plant with trees. <i>The hunters <b>treed</b> the bear with dogs and killed it.</i>
<b>underside</b>	The less favourable aspect of something. <i>The sordid <b>underside</b> of the glamorous 1980s.</i>
<b>versed</b>	Thoroughly acquainted through study or experience. <i>A solicitor well <b>versed</b> in employment law.</i>
