balderdash	Senseless talk or writing; nonsense. <i>She dismissed talk of plots as balderdash.</i>

decomposition	The organic phenomenon of rotting. <i>The decomposition of organic waste.</i>
deterioration	Process of changing to an inferior state. <i>A deterioration in the condition of the patient.</i>
gibberish	Unintelligible or meaningless speech or writing; nonsense. <i>He talks gibberish.</i>
guff	Foolish talk or ideas.
hogwash	Nonsense.
<u>nonsense</u>	Denoting verse or other writing intended to be amusing by virtue of its absurd or whimsical language. <i>Nonsense poetry.</i>
putrefaction	The process of decay or rotting in a body or other organic matter. <i>Rome had fallen into moral putrefaction.</i>
<u>rotting</u>	The process of decay caused by bacterial or fungal action.

go to seed	Enter or assume a certain state or condition.
guy	Steady or support with a guy wire or cable. <i>She never stopped guying him about his weight.</i>
languish	Pine with love or grief. <i>He has been languishing in jail since 1974.</i>
laugh at	Produce laughter.
make fun of	Calculate as being.
make jokes about	Achieve a point or goal.
mock	Imitate with mockery and derision. <i>At Christmas arguments and friction mock our pretence at peace.</i>
molder	Break down.
moulder	Break down. <i>I couldn't permit someone of your abilities to moulder away in a backwater.</i>
poke fun at	Poke or thrust abruptly.
rag	Apply paint to a surface with a rag. <i>Rag that old tune.</i>
satirize	Deride and criticize by means of satire. <i>The writer satirized the politician's proposal.</i>
spoil	Treat with excessive indulgence. <i>He is spoiling for a fight.</i>
waste	Run off as waste. <i>20 of stock will need to be wasted.</i>

- *Caries sets in at a weak point and spreads to rot the whole tooth.*

blight

Infect plants with blight.

*The vacant properties are a **blight** on the neighbourhood.*

carcass

The dead body of an animal especially one slaughtered and dressed for food.

*The **carcass** has a high proportion of meat to bone.*

carrion

The decaying flesh of dead animals.

*A crow wheeled over the hills in search of **carrion**.*

corpse

Spoil a piece of acting by forgetting one's lines or laughing uncontrollably.

*One singer ad libbed and **corpsed** his colleagues on stage.*

corrupt

Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality.

*A **corrupt** text.*

corruptive

Tending to corrupt or pervert.

decay	An inferior state resulting from the process of decaying. <i>Hardwood is more resistant to decay than softwood.</i>
<u>decompose</u>	Separate (substances) into constituent elements or parts. <i>In how many ways can one decompose a number as a sum of squares.</i>
decomposition	The state or process of rotting; decay. <i>The decomposition of organic waste.</i>
<u>deconstruct</u>	Analyse a text or linguistic or conceptual system by deconstruction. <i>She likes to deconstruct the texts to uncover what they are not saying.</i>
degeneracy	Moral perversion; impairment of virtue and moral principles. <i>A slide into moral degeneracy.</i>
<u>depravity</u>	Moral perversion; impairment of virtue and moral principles. <i>A tale of depravity hard to credit.</i>
deteriorate	Become worse or disintegrate. <i>Her condition deteriorated.</i>
disassemble	Translate (a program) from machine code into a higher-level programming language. <i>It is permissible for a lawful user to disassemble a computer program to determine its interfaces.</i>
<u>disintegrate</u>	Lose a stored charge, magnetic flux, or current. <i>Their marriage disintegrated.</i>
disintegration	The spontaneous disintegration of a radioactive substance along with the emission of ionizing radiation. <i>The disintegration of infected cells.</i>
erosive	Of a substance, especially a strong acid; capable of destroying or eating away by chemical action. <i>The erosive effects of waves on the shoreline.</i>
ferment	Cause to undergo fermentation. <i>The Middle East is fermenting.</i>
fermentation	The fermentation process involved in the making of beers wines and spirits in which sugars are converted to ethyl alcohol. <i>The fermentation of organic matter by microorganisms in the gut.</i>
<u>fester</u>	A sore that has become inflamed and formed pus. <i>Below the surface the old antagonisms festered.</i>
fungi	The taxonomic kingdom including yeast, molds, smuts, mushrooms, and toadstools; distinct from the green plants.
malodorous	Having an unpleasant smell. <i>Leaking taps and malodorous drains.</i>

molder	Break down.
perishable	(especially of food) likely to decay or go bad quickly. <i>Caviar is extremely perishable.</i>
putrefaction	The process of decay caused by bacterial or fungal action. <i>Rome had fallen into moral putrefaction.</i>
putrefy	Become putrid; decay with an offensive smell. <i>The stench of putrefying corpses.</i>
putrid	Of or characteristic of rotting matter. <i>The putrid atmosphere of the court.</i>
rotten	Extremely unpleasant. <i>He s had rotten luck this year.</i>
spoilage	The action or process of spoiling, especially the deterioration of food and other perishable goods.
wilt	Any of a number of fungal or bacterial diseases of plants characterized by wilting of the foliage. <i>The flowers wilted.</i>
