Definitions of "Rotate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “rotate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Exchange on a regular basis.*
- *Pass to each member of a group in a regularly recurring order.*
- *Turn on or around an axis or a center.*
- *Change the position of (tyres) on a motor vehicle to distribute wear.*
- *Grow (different crops) in succession on a particular piece of land to avoid exhausting the soil.*
- *Turn outward.*
- *Plant or grow in a fixed cyclic order of succession.*
- *Perform a job or duty on a rotating basis.*
- *Move or cause to move in a circle round an axis or centre.*
- *Cause to turn on an axis or center.*

| switch | Beat or flick with or as if with a switch. <i>Switch on the light.</i> |
| swivel | Turn around a point or axis or on a swivel. <i>He swivelled in the chair.</i> |
| take it in turns | Take by force. |
| take turns | Occupy or take on. |
| trade places | Do business; offer for sale as for one's livelihood. |
| turn | Cause to change or turn into something different assume new characteristics. <i>I turned the key in the door and crept in.</i> |

I **whirled** her round the dance hall.

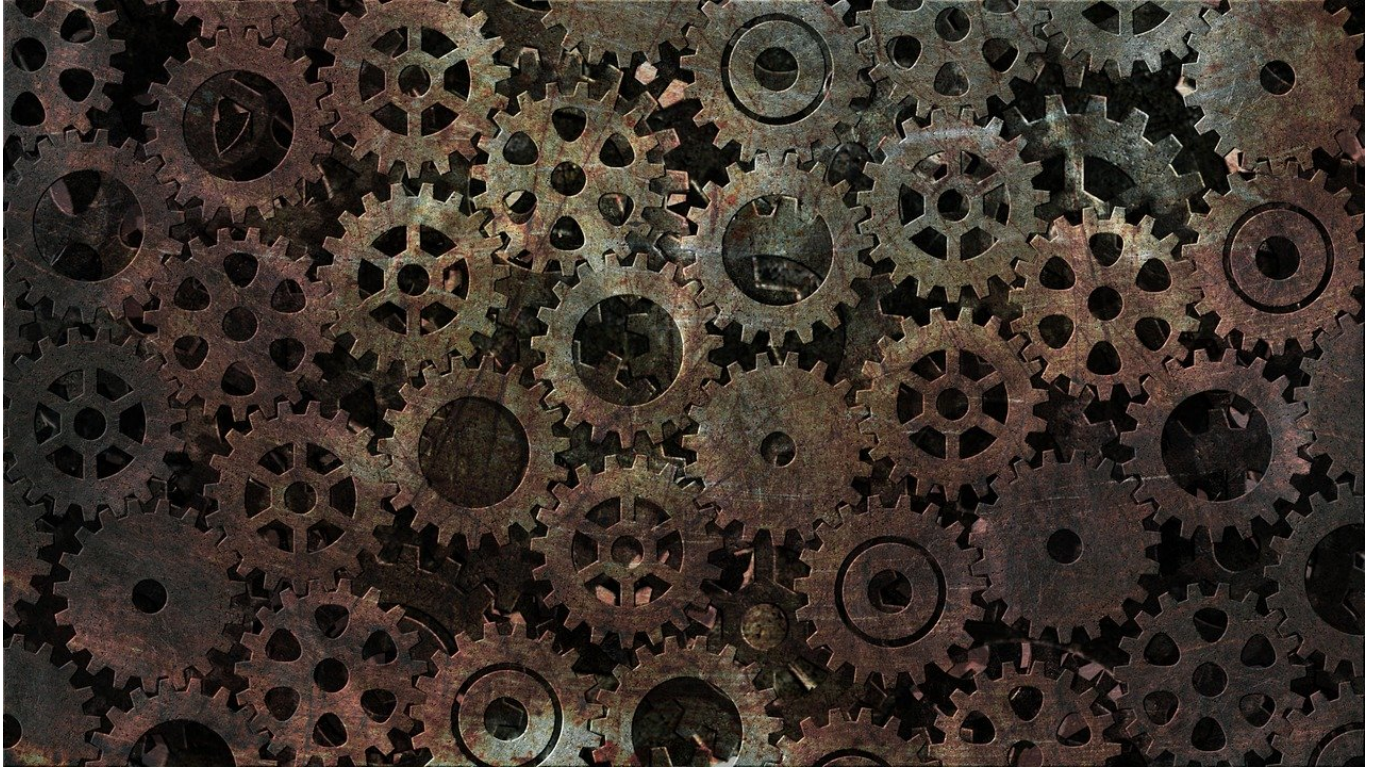

Usage Examples of "Rotate" as a verb

- *The wheel continued to rotate.*
- *Ballet dancers can rotate their legs out by 90 degrees.*
- *These crops were sometimes rotated with grass.*
- *Interns have to rotate for a few months.*
- *The lamb roast rotates on a spit over the fire.*
- *We rotate the lead soprano every night.*
- *Radial tyres should only be rotated from front to rear on the same side.*
- *We rotate the crops so as to maximize the use of the soil.*

- *The small directional side rockets rotated the craft.*
- *The job of chairing the meeting rotates.*

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| convolution | A method of determination of the sum of two random variables by integration or summation. <i>Crosses adorned with elaborate convolutions.</i> |
| convolve | Roll or coil together; entwine. |
| counter | A return punch (especially by a boxer). <i>The proposal has become a crucial bargaining counter over prices.</i> |
| curve | Form an arch or curve. <i>Her dress twisted tightly round her generous curves.</i> |
| flip | Glib or flippant. <i>Flip over the pork chop.</i> |
| gyrate | Move or cause to move rapidly in a circle or spiral. <i>Strippers gyrated to rock music on a low stage.</i> |
| kink | Form a curl curve or kink. <i>Though the system is making some headway there are still some kinks to iron out.</i> |
| oblate | Having the equatorial diameter greater than the polar diameter; being flattened at the poles. |
