corpse	The dead body of a human being. <i>He believed that fascism would revive the <b>corpse</b> of Europe.</i>
corrupt	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. Humanity they knew to be <b>corrupt</b> from the day of Adam s creation.
corruptive	Tending to corrupt or pervert.
decay	Undergo decay or decomposition. The corpse was in an advanced state of <b>decay</b> .
<u>decompose</u>	Express (a number or function) as a combination of simpler components. Living organisms are used to <b>decompose</b> water into hydrogen and oxygen.
decomposition	Separation of a substance into two or more substances that may differ from each other and from the original substance. <i>The decomposition of organic waste.</i>
<u>deconstruct</u>	Interpret a text or an artwork by the method of deconstructing. I want to <b>deconstruct</b> this myth that poverty breeds crime.
degeneracy	The state or quality of being degenerate. Moral <b>degeneracy</b> followed intellectual degeneration.
<u>depravity</u>	Moral corruption; wickedness. Its brothels its opium parlors its <b>depravity</b> .
deteriorate	Grow worse. Relations between the countries had <b>deteriorate</b> d sharply.
disassemble	Translate (a program) from machine code into a higher-level programming language. It is permissible for a lawful user to <b>disassemble</b> a computer program to determine its interfaces.
<u>disintegrate</u>	Lose strength or cohesion and gradually fail. <i>Their marriage <b>disintegrate</b>d</i> .
disintegration	The spontaneous disintegration of a radioactive substance along with the emission of ionizing radiation. <i>A disintegration</i> of personality.
erosive	Wearing away by friction. The <b>erosive</b> effects of waves on the shoreline.
ferment	A substance capable of bringing about fermentation. <i>This religion is <b>ferment</b>ing Africa</i> .



fermentation	The fermentation process involved in the making of beers wines and spirits in which sugars are converted to ethyl alcohol. <i>The fermentation of organic matter by microorganisms in the gut.</i>
<u>fester</u>	(of a negative feeling or a problem) become worse or more intense, especially through long-term neglect or indifference. <i>Remand prisoners are left to <b>fester</b> in our jails while they wait for trial.</i>
fungi	The taxonomic kingdom including yeast, molds, smuts, mushrooms, and toadstools; distinct from the green plants.
malodorous	Having an unpleasant smell. Leaking taps and <b>malodorous</b> drains.
molder	Break down.
perishable	Things, especially foodstuffs, likely to decay or go bad quickly. The shipment was delivered eventually though some of the <b>perishable</b> s had gone off.
putrefaction	(biology) the process of decay caused by bacterial or fungal action. The breeze shifted and we caught the stench of <b>putrefaction</b> .
putrefy	Become putrid; decay with an offensive smell. <i>The stench of <b>putrefy</b>ing corpses.</i>
putrid	Of or characteristic of rotting matter. The cocktail is a <b>putrid</b> pink colour.
<u>rotten</u>	Having decayed or disintegrated; usually implies foulness. <i>She was a <b>rotten</b> cook.</i>
spoilage	The process of becoming spoiled.
<u>wilt</u>	Any of a number of fungal or bacterial diseases of plants characterized by wilting of the foliage. My opponent was <b>wilt</b> ing.
