
## Rub as a Noun

#### Definitions of "Rub" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "rub" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- The act of rubbing or wiping.
- A mixture of spices and other seasonings that is applied to the surface of meat or fish before cooking.
- The central problem or difficulty in a situation.
- (in bowling) an uneven patch of ground that impedes or diverts a bowl.
- An unforeseen obstacle.
- An act of rubbing.
- An ointment designed to be rubbed on the skin to ease pain.





# Synonyms of "Rub" as a noun (15 Words)

buffing	An implement consisting of soft material mounted on a block; used for polishing (as in manicuring.
difficulty	A condition or state of affairs almost beyond one's ability to deal with and requiring great effort to bear or overcome. Had <b>difficulty</b> walking.
<u>drawback</u>	A feature that renders something less acceptable; a disadvantage or problem. They had been complaining of difficulties in getting quick reimbursement of duty <b>drawback</b> .
hang-up	An unforeseen obstacle.
<u>hindrance</u>	Any obstruction that impedes or is burdensome. A <b>hindrance</b> to the development process.
hitch	An act of hitch hiking. Everything went without a <b>hitch</b> .



<u>impediment</u>	Something immaterial that interferes with or delays action or progress. A serious <b>impediment</b> to scientific progress.
<u>massage</u>	The rubbing and kneading of muscles and joints of the body with the hands, especially to relieve tension or pain. <i>Massage</i> can ease tiredness.
obstacle	Something immaterial that stands in the way and must be circumvented or surmounted. The poverty of a district is an <b>obstacle</b> to good education.
obstruction	The physical condition of blocking or filling a passage with an obstruction. <i>Walkers could proceed with the minimum of obstruction</i> .
polish	A preparation used in polishing. They performed with great <b>polish</b> .
problem	An inquiry starting from given conditions to investigate or demonstrate a fact, result, or law. Motivation of staff can also be a <b>problem</b> .
snag	A rent or tear in fabric caused by a snag. Keep an emery board handy in case of nail <b>snag</b> s.
trouble	A source of difficulty. The kid had been no <b>trouble</b> up to now.
wipe	A cinematographic effect in which an existing picture seems to be wiped out by a new one as the boundary between them moves across the screen. Bert was giving the machine a final <b>wipe</b> over with an oily rag.

- He will be using coffee in a rub for a rack of lamb.
- A muscle rub.
- He gave the hood a quick rub.
- That was the rub—she had not cared enough.





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## Rub as a Verb

#### Definitions of "Rub" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "rub" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Work an ingredient into (a mixture) by breaking and blending it with firm movements of one's fingers.
- Move (one's hand, a cloth, or another object) back and forth against a surface.
- Cause friction.
- Make dry, clean, or smooth by rubbing.
- (of a bowl) be slowed or diverted by the unevenness of the ground.
- Reproduce the design of (a sepulchral brass or a stone) by rubbing paper laid on it with coloured wax, pencil, or chalk, etc.
- Apply firm pressure to the surface of (something), using a repeated back and forth motion.
- Scrape or rub as if to relieve itching.
- Move over something with pressure.
- Apply (ointment, polish, or a similar substance) with a back and forth motion.
- (of shoes or other hard items in contact with the skin) cause pain through friction.
- (with reference to two things) move or cause to move to and fro against each other with a certain amount of friction.





# Synonyms of "Rub" as a verb (21 Words)

abrade	Rub hard or scrub. It was a landscape slowly <b>abrade</b> d by a fine stinging dust.
apply	Apply oneself to. Please <b>apply</b> yourself to your homework.
<u>chafe</u>	Cause annoyance in; disturb, especially by minor irritations. <i>Her arms</i> <b>chafe</b> d where the rope bit into them.
clean	Be cleanable. The boys <b>clean</b> ed the sandwich platters.
cream in	Put on cream, as on one's face or body.
<u>fray</u>	(of a male deer) rub (a bush or small tree) with the head in order to remove the velvet from newly formed antlers, or to mark territory during the rut. <i>The friction <b>fray</b>ed the sleeve.</i>
<u>fret</u>	Provide a musical instrument with frets. She <b>fret</b> ted about the cost of groceries.



itch	Cause to perceive an itch. <i>Paul was <b>itch</b>ing to get outside.</i>
knead	Make bread or pottery by kneading flour or clay. She <b>knead</b> ed his back.
<u>massage</u>	Give a massage to. The accounts had been <b>massage</b> d to suit the government.
mop	To wash or wipe with or as if with a mop. She <b>mop</b> ped the floor and cleaned out two cupboards.
pinch	Make ridges into by pinching together. If I scraped and <b>pinch</b> ed a bit I might manage.
put on	Attribute or give.
scrape	Bend the knees and bow in a servile manner. For some years he <b>scrape</b> d a living as a tutor.
<u>scratch</u>	Play a record using the scratch technique. Banks seem prepared to <b>scratch</b> stabilization charges.
smear	Stain by smearing or daubing with a dirty substance. <b>Smear</b> the wall with paint.
<u>smooth</u>	Make smooth or smoother as if by rubbing. A conference would be held to <b>smooth</b> the way for the establishment of the provisional government.
sponge	Give a decorative effect to a painted surface by applying a different shade of paint with a sponge. I ll go and <b>sponge</b> this orange juice off my dress.
spread	Cover by spreading something over. The Marines <b>spread</b> out across the docks.
swab	Wash with a swab or a mop. The crew were <b>swab</b> bing down the decks.
work in	Exert oneself by doing mental or physical work for a purpose or out of necessity.






### Usage Examples of "Rub" as a verb

- Sift the flour into a bowl and rub in the fat.
- He was rubbing an old brass.
- I rubbed myself dry.
- She took out her sun cream and rubbed some on her nose.
- He rubbed at the earth on his jeans.
- *He rubbed a finger round the rim of his mug.*
- Badly fitting shoes can rub painfully.
- She rubbed her arm, where she had a large bruise.
- Many insects make noises by rubbing parts of their bodies together.
- She found a towel and began rubbing her hair.
- Rub my hands.
- The ice breaks into small floes that rub against each other.
- Rub oil into her skin.





# Associations of "Rub" (30 Words)

<u>caress</u>	Touch or stroke lightly in a loving or endearing manner. The <b>caress</b> es of the breeze played over his face.
<u>chafe</u>	(with reference to a part of the body) make or become sore by rubbing against something. <i>The collar <b>chafe</b>d his neck.</i>
dab	A brief application of a piece of absorbent material to a surface. Apply concealer with light <b>dab</b> s.
<u>delete</u>	Remove (a product, especially a recording) from the catalogue of those available for purchase. If one important gene is <b>delete</b> d from an animal s DNA other genes can stand in.
<u>discomfort</u>	A state of unease, worry, or embarrassment. <i>His remarks caused her <b>discomfort</b>.</i>



efface	Remove completely from recognition or memory. To <b>efface</b> oneself is not the easiest of duties which the teacher can undertake.
encourage	Spur on. The intention is to <b>encourage</b> new writing talent.
encouraged	Inspired with confidence.
eradicate	Kill in large numbers. This disease has been <b>eradicate</b> d from the world.
erasable	Capable of being effaced. A signal too loud to be <b>erasable</b> in a single pass through the erase head.
<u>erase</u>	Remove from memory or existence. The tape could be magnetically <b>erase</b> d and reused.
<u>excise</u>	Levy an excise tax on. The surgeon <b>excise</b> d the tumor.
expulsion	The action or process of forcing someone to leave a place. <i>His <b>expulsion</b> from the union.</i>
<u>expunge</u>	Obliterate or remove completely (something unwanted or unpleasant. The kind of man that could <b>expunge</b> an unsatisfactory incident from his memory.
<u>fray</u>	A noisy fight. As the temperature rose tempers <b>fray</b> ed.
friction	Effort expended in moving one object over another with pressure. A considerable amount of <b>friction</b> between father and son.
fumble	An act of managing or dealing with something clumsily. <i>He</i> <b>fumble</b> d about in the dark but could not find her.
<u>irritation</u>	An uncomfortable feeling of mental painfulness or distress. <i>The minor <b>irritation</b>s of life.</i>
itch	Be the site of or cause an itch. She is <b>itch</b> ing to start the project.
itching	An irritating cutaneous sensation that produces a desire to scratch.
<u>massage</u>	Give a massage to. She <b>massage</b> d his sore back.
<u>obliterate</u>	Make invisible or indistinct; conceal or cover. The special stamp should be placed on the left hand side and not be used to <b>obliterate</b> the postage stamp.
pat	Pat or squeeze fondly or playfully especially under the chin. <i>He</i> <b>pat</b> <i>ted the bench beside him and I sat down.</i>



rap	Genre of African American music of the 1980s and 1990s in which rhyming lyrics are chanted to a musical accompaniment several forms of rap have emerged. Social services were smarting from an Ombudsman s <b>rap</b> .
<u>scratch</u>	A mark or wound made by scratching. <i>Tabitha wondered how long the woman had been</i> <b>scratch</b> ing a living on the waterways.
<u>strike</u>	A pitch that passes through the strike zone. <i>Strike</i> a medal.
tap	Cut a female screw thread with a tap. The FBI was <b>tap</b> ping the phone line of the suspected spy.
touch	An act of touching someone or something. He <b>touch</b> ed back a cross field ball.
wipe	Pass a swipe card over an electronic reader. <i>Wipe</i> the blackboard.
