## Associations of "Rule out" (30 Words)

<b>absentee</b>	One that is absent or not in residence. <i>An <b>absentee</b> from the match.</i>
<b><a href="#">absenteeism</a></b>	The practice of regularly staying away from work or school without good reason. <i>High levels of <b>absenteeism</b> caused by low job motivation.</i>
<b><a href="#">away</a></b>	An away match or win. <i>He s <b>away</b> right now.</i>
<b>commandment</b>	Something that is commanded. <i>She had followed her mother s <b>commandments</b> for long enough.</i>
<b>controllable</b>	Capable of being safely regulated or limited. <i>The glider was fully <b>controllable</b>.</i>
<b><a href="#">convention</a></b>	Orthodoxy as a consequence of being conventional. <i>He was an upholder of <b>convention</b> and correct form.</i>
<b><a href="#">decree</a></b>	Issue a decree. <i>Presidential <b>decrees</b>.</i>
<b>dominate</b>	Have dominance or the power to defeat over. <i>Her husband completely <b>dominates</b> her.</i>
<b>edict</b>	An official order or proclamation issued by a person in authority. <i>Clovis issued an <b>edict</b> protecting Church property.</i>
<b><a href="#">ethical</a></b>	Adhering to ethical and moral principles. <i>Had no <b>ethical</b> objection to drinking.</i>
<b>excessive</b>	More than is necessary, normal, or desirable; immoderate. <i><b>Excessive</b> charges.</i>
<b>exoteric</b>	Intended for or likely to be understood by the general public. <i>Writings of an <b>exoteric</b> nature.</i>
<b>follow</b>	Accept and follow the leadership or command or guidance of. <i>It thus <b>follows</b> from this equation that the value must be negative.</i>

<b>impose</b>	Impose and collect. <i>Sanctions <b>imposed</b> on South Africa.</i>
<b>law</b>	Systems of law as a subject of study or as the basis of the legal profession. <i>A new <b>law</b> was passed to make divorce easier and simpler.</i>
<b>manageable</b>	Capable of existing or taking place or proving true; possible to do. <i>Her long hair was black wavy and <b>manageable</b>.</i>
<b>mode</b>	The value that occurs most frequently in a given set of data. <i>Some computers provide several so called processor <b>modes</b>.</i>
<b>nationalize</b>	Transfer (a major branch of industry or commerce) from private to state ownership or control. <i>The Bank of England was <b>nationalized</b> in the winter of 1946 7.</i>
<b>order</b>	Place in a certain order. <i>The meeting was called to <b>order</b>.</i>
<b>ordinance</b>	The act of ordaining; the act of conferring (or receiving) holy orders. <i>They issued an <b>ordinance</b> limiting the length of nets.</i>
<b>pedant</b>	A person who pays more attention to formal rules and book learning than they merit. <i>The royal palace some <b>pedants</b> would say the ex royal palace.</i>
<b>precept</b>	A rate or tax set by a precept. <i>Children learn far more by example than by <b>precept</b>.</i>
<b>predictable</b>	Able to be predicted. <i>The market is volatile and never <b>predictable</b>.</i>
<b>principle</b>	A natural law forming the basis for the construction or working of a machine. <i>The <b>principles</b> of democracy.</i>
<b>promulgate</b>	State or announce. <i>These objectives have to be <b>promulgated</b> within the organization.</i>
<b>regulation</b>	In accordance with regulations of the correct type. <i>A <b>regulation</b> Western parody.</i>
<b>ruling</b>	Exercising power or authority. <i>The <b>ruling</b> was reversed in the appeal court.</i>
<b>statute</b>	A rule of an organization or institution. <i>The Act consolidated <b>statutes</b> dealing with non fatal offences.</i>
<b>tenet</b>	A religious doctrine that is proclaimed as true without proof. <i>The <b>tenets</b> of classical liberalism.</i>
