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Associations of "Rule out" (30 Words)

absentee	One that is absent or not in residence. <i>An absentee from the match.</i>
<u>absenteeism</u>	The practice of regularly staying away from work or school without good reason. <i>High levels of absenteeism caused by low job motivation.</i>
<u>away</u>	An away match or win. <i>He s away right now.</i>
commandment	Something that is commanded. <i>She had followed her mother s commandments for long enough.</i>
controllable	Capable of being safely regulated or limited. <i>The glider was fully controllable.</i>
<u>convention</u>	Orthodoxy as a consequence of being conventional. <i>He was an upholder of convention and correct form.</i>
<u>decree</u>	Issue a decree. <i>Presidential decrees.</i>
dominate	Have dominance or the power to defeat over. <i>Her husband completely dominates her.</i>
edict	An official order or proclamation issued by a person in authority. <i>Clovis issued an edict protecting Church property.</i>
<u>ethical</u>	Adhering to ethical and moral principles. <i>Had no ethical objection to drinking.</i>
excessive	More than is necessary, normal, or desirable; immoderate. <i>Excessive charges.</i>
exoteric	Intended for or likely to be understood by the general public. <i>Writings of an exoteric nature.</i>
follow	Accept and follow the leadership or command or guidance of. <i>It thus follows from this equation that the value must be negative.</i>

impose	Impose and collect. <i>Sanctions imposed on South Africa.</i>
law	Systems of law as a subject of study or as the basis of the legal profession. <i>A new law was passed to make divorce easier and simpler.</i>
manageable	Capable of existing or taking place or proving true; possible to do. <i>Her long hair was black wavy and manageable.</i>
mode	The value that occurs most frequently in a given set of data. <i>Some computers provide several so called processor modes.</i>
nationalize	Transfer (a major branch of industry or commerce) from private to state ownership or control. <i>The Bank of England was nationalized in the winter of 1946 7.</i>
order	Place in a certain order. <i>The meeting was called to order.</i>
ordinance	The act of ordaining; the act of conferring (or receiving) holy orders. <i>They issued an ordinance limiting the length of nets.</i>
pedant	A person who pays more attention to formal rules and book learning than they merit. <i>The royal palace some pedants would say the ex royal palace.</i>
precept	A rate or tax set by a precept. <i>Children learn far more by example than by precept.</i>
predictable	Able to be predicted. <i>The market is volatile and never predictable.</i>
principle	A natural law forming the basis for the construction or working of a machine. <i>The principles of democracy.</i>
promulgate	State or announce. <i>These objectives have to be promulgated within the organization.</i>
regulation	In accordance with regulations of the correct type. <i>A regulation Western parody.</i>
ruling	Exercising power or authority. <i>The ruling was reversed in the appeal court.</i>
statute	A rule of an organization or institution. <i>The Act consolidated statutes dealing with non fatal offences.</i>
tenet	A religious doctrine that is proclaimed as true without proof. <i>The tenets of classical liberalism.</i>
