| <u>commotion</u> | A disorderly outburst or tumult. <i>A commotion of people fought for the exits.</i> |
| crash | A serious accident (usually involving one or more vehicles). <i>System crashes are an everyday hazard.</i> |
| crashing | An event that causes a computer system to become inoperative. |
| <u>echo</u> | A reflected television or radio or radar beam. <i>His love for her found an echo in her own feelings.</i> |
| fight | The act of fighting any contest or struggle. <i>A violent fight over the bill is expected in the Senate.</i> |
| fist fight | A hand with the fingers clenched in the palm (as for hitting). |
| fracas | A noisy disturbance or quarrel. <i>The fracas was broken up by stewards.</i> |
| <u>fray</u> | A noisy fight. |
| gang fight | An association of criminals. |
| <u>growl</u> | The sound of growling as made by animals. <i>The growl of diesel engines.</i> |
| <u>grumble</u> | A loud low dull continuous noise. <i>The main grumble is that he spends too much time away.</i> |
| grumbling | A complaint uttered in a low and indistinct tone. <i>There were grumbings from the trustees.</i> |
| melee | A confused crowd of people. <i>Several people were hurt in the melee.</i> |
| <u>pounding</u> | The act of pounding delivering repeated heavy blows. <i>The pounding of the surf on a sandy beach.</i> |
| reverberation | A remote or indirect consequence of some action. <i>Reverberations of the market crash were felt years later.</i> |
| ring | The sound of a bell ringing E A Poe. <i>He was knocking me all round the ring.</i> |
| <u>ringing</u> | An act or sound of ringing. <i>A ringing in her ears.</i> |
| <u>roar</u> | A very loud utterance (like the sound of an animal). <i>The roar of the sea.</i> |
| roaring | The sound made by a lion. |

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| rumbling | A continuous deep, resonant sound. <i>They heard the rumbling of thunder.</i> |
| rumpus | A noisy disturbance; a row. <i>He caused a rumpus with his flair for troublemaking.</i> |
| scrimmage | A sequence of play beginning with the placing of the ball on the ground with its longest axis at right angles to the goal line. <i>Michigan was called for pass interference in the first play from scrimmage.</i> |
| scrum | An ordered formation of players used to restart play in which the forwards of a team form up with arms interlocked and heads down and push forward against a similar group from the opposing side The ball is thrown into the scrum and the players try to gain possession of it by kicking it backwards towards their own side. <i>Ageing passengers often lost out in the scrum for the best seats.</i> |
| scuffle | An unceremonious and disorganized struggle. <i>He heard the scuffle of feet.</i> |
| skirmish | A short argument. <i>There was a skirmish over the budget.</i> |
| thud | A dull, heavy sound, such as that made by an object falling to the ground. <i>He hit the floor with a terrific thud.</i> |
| thudding | A heavy dull sound (as made by impact of heavy objects). <i>He heard the hollow thudding of hooves.</i> |
| thump | A heavy deadened sound. <i>Jane s heart gave an uncomfortable thump.</i> |
| thumping | A heavy dull sound (as made by impact of heavy objects). |
| tussle | A vigorous struggle or scuffle, typically in order to obtain or achieve something. <i>There was a tussle for the ball.</i> |
| uproar | A loud and impassioned noise or disturbance. <i>It caused an uproar in the press.</i> |
| wrangle | A dispute or argument, typically one that is long and complicated. <i>An insurance wrangle is holding up compensation payments.</i> |

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| observe | Observe with care or pay close attention to. <i>It s chilly she observed.</i> |
| peal | Of laughter or thunder sound in a peal. <i>Bells were pealing.</i> |
| perceive | Become aware of (something) by the use of one of the senses, especially that of sight. <i>He was quick to perceive that there was little future in such arguments.</i> |
| realize | Achieve (something desired or anticipated); fulfil. <i>Does she realize how important this decision is.</i> |
| resound | Emit a noise. <i>Whatever they do in the Nineties will not resound in the way that their earlier achievements did.</i> |
| reverberate | (of a loud noise) be repeated several times as an echo. <i>Oft did the cliffs reverberate the sound.</i> |
| roar | (of a lion or other large wild animal) utter a full, deep, prolonged cry. <i>Manfred roared with rage.</i> |
| roll | Move along or from side to side unsteadily or uncontrollably. <i>The buffalo rolled in the dust.</i> |

| shriek | An exclamation mark. <i>The wheels shrieked as the car sped away.</i> |
| <u>snarl</u> | An act or sound of snarling. <i>Shut your mouth he snarled.</i> |
| <u>squeal</u> | Make a squeal. <i>The girls squealed with delight.</i> |
| <u>thud</u> | A heavy dull sound (as made by impact of heavy objects). <i>The knocker thudded against the front door.</i> |
| thunder | Be the case that thunder is being heard. <i>The train thundered through the night.</i> |
| <u>thundering</u> | Making a resounding, loud, deep noise. <i>A thundering good read.</i> |
| whine | Give or make a long, high-pitched complaining cry or sound. <i>She began to whine about how hard she had been forced to work.</i> |
