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amble	Walk leisurely. <i>A peaceful riverside amble.</i>
apart	Used after a noun to indicate that someone or something has qualities which mark them out from other people or things. <i>He leapt out of the car just before it was blown apart.</i>
aside	Not taken into account or excluded from consideration. <i>All joking aside I think you re crazy.</i>
canter	Ride at a cantering pace. <i>We came back from one of our canters.</i>
dash	A short vertical mark placed above or beneath a note to indicate that it is to be performed in a very staccato manner. <i>I must dash I m late.</i>
depart	Leave. <i>He will soon depart his post as high commissioner to Britain.</i>
detached	Showing lack of emotional involvement. <i>A four bedroomed detached house.</i>
deviate	A person whose behavior deviates from what is acceptable especially in sexual behavior. <i>Their deviate behaviour.</i>
far	Located at a great distance in time or space or degree. <i>A far trek.</i>
farther	To or at a greater extent or degree or a more advanced stage further is used more often than farther in this abstract sense. <i>Farther from the truth.</i>
flit	An act of moving house or leaving one’s home, typically secretly so as to escape creditors or obligations. <i>Small birds flitted about in the branches.</i>

gait	The pattern of steps of a horse or dog at a particular speed. <i>The easy gait of an athlete.</i>
isolated	Having minimal contact or little in common with others. <i>An isolated pawn.</i>
jog	A spell of jogging. <i>He began to jog along the road.</i>
jogger	Loose trousers made of a stretchy fabric and typically elasticated at the waist and ankles, worn especially for jogging. <i>There are joggers on every road.</i>
jogging	Denoting a garment designed to be worn while jogging. <i>Some gentle jogging for a few weeks before the event should prevent any aching or stiffness.</i>
marathon	A long-lasting or difficult task or activity. <i>She s embarking on a marathon UK tour.</i>
race	A series of races for horses or dogs held at a fixed time on a set course. <i>She spoke automatically while her mind raced ahead.</i>
ramble	(of a plant) put out long shoots and grow over walls or other plants. <i>This novel rambles on and jogs.</i>
runner	A plant that spreads by means of runners. <i>The vegetable baskets were on runners.</i>
running	Of advancing the ball by running. <i>The coach put great emphasis on running.</i>
sidetrack	A minor path or track. <i>The horse took a sidetrack which led uphill.</i>
sprint	A quick run. <i>Greg broke into a sprint.</i>
stray	A stray person or thing especially a domestic animal. <i>A stray calf.</i>
stride	Bestride. <i>The speaker was getting into his stride.</i>
stroll	A leisurely walk (usually in some public place). <i>I strolled around the city.</i>
stroller	A person taking a leisurely walk. <i>Shady gardens where strollers could relax.</i>
trainer	A soft sports shoe suitable for casual wear. <i>A fitness trainer.</i>

walker A person who walks, especially for exercise or enjoyment.
*A fell **walker**.*

wander An act or instance of wandering.
*He found her **wandering** the streets.*
