<u>alienation</u>	The state or experience of being alienated. <i>The power of alienation is an essential ingredient of ownership.</i>
breach	An opening (especially a gap in a dike or fortification). <i>A widening breach between government and Church.</i>
break	The act of breaking something. <i>A weekend break in the Cotswolds.</i>
<u>breakage</u>	The act of breaking something. <i>The breakage was unavoidable.</i>
breaking	The act of breaking something.
bursting	The act of exploding or bursting.
cleavage	Cell division, especially of a fertilized egg cell. <i>She wore a dress that exposed an inch or two of cleavage.</i>

cracking	The act of cracking something. <i>He heard the cracking of the ice.</i>

division	Biology a group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category. <i>A licensing division of a district.</i>
<u>estrangement</u>	Separation resulting from hostility. <i>A parent s rights in the event of divorce or estrangement.</i>
fragmentation	(computer science) the condition of a file that is broken up and stored in many different locations on a magnetic disk. <i>Fragmentation slows system performance because it takes extra time to locate and assemble the parts of the fragmented file.</i>
hernia	Rupture in smooth muscle tissue through which a bodily structure protrudes. <i>A hernia operation.</i>
parting	The act of departing politely. <i>The parting of the Red Sea.</i>
<u>rift</u>	A major fault separating blocks of the earth s surface a rift valley. <i>The sun shone through a rift in the clouds.</i>
<u>separation</u>	The state in which a couple remain married but live apart. <i>The separation of wheat from chaff.</i>
severance	The action of ending a connection or relationship. <i>A complete severance of links with the Republic.</i>
shattering	The act of breaking something into small pieces.
splintering	The act of chipping something.
<u>split</u>	An instance or act of splitting or being split a division. <i>Light squeezed through a small split in the curtain.</i>
splitting	The action of dividing or being divided into parts. <i>The splitting of assets between former spouses.</i>

- *The patient died after rupture of an aneurysm.*

- *Suffer an abdominal hernia.*
- *Cause to break or burst suddenly.*
- *Breach or disturb (a harmonious feeling or situation).*
- *Separate or cause to separate abruptly.*

breach	Act in disregard of laws, rules, contracts, or promises. <i>These outside bodies are bootlegging albums and breaching copyright.</i>
break	Break a piece from a whole. <i>The book dealer would not break the set.</i>
break off	Fracture a bone of nicecutisours.
<u>bust</u>	Break open or apart suddenly and forcefully. <i>He busted my radio.</i>
cut off	Cut off the testicles of male animals such as horses. Make a break in.
<u>disrupt</u>	<i>Our 3D printing technology is disrupting the traditional manufacturing industry.</i>
<u>fracture</u>	Become fractured. <i>Fracture the balance of power.</i>
<u>sever</u>	Put an end to (a connection or relationship); break off. <i>The head was severed from the body.</i>
snap	Take a snapshot of. <i>He snapped indignantly.</i>
tear	Fill with tears or shed tears. <i>Her eyes were tearing.</i>



Usage Examples of "Rupture" as a verb

- *The impact ruptured both fuel tanks.*
- *If the main artery ruptures he could die.*
- *One of the boys was ruptured and needed to be fitted with a truss.*
- *Once trust and confidence has been ruptured it can be difficult to regain.*

breach	A personal or social separation (as between opposing factions). <i>These outside bodies are bootlegging albums and breaching copyright.</i>
break	Undergo breaking. <i>Break an alibi.</i>
<u>broken</u>	Out of working order busted is an informal substitute for broken. <i>His broken spirit.</i>
burst	Burst outward usually with noise. <i>Sophie burst out laughing.</i>
<u>bust</u>	A woman's breasts, especially considered in terms of their size. <i>A 36 inch bust.</i>
cleavage	(embryology) the repeated division of a fertilised ovum. <i>All the cells divide synchronously for the first 12 cleavages.</i>
cleave	Make a way through (something) forcefully, as if by splitting it apart. <i>The water is going to cleave a channel into the rock.</i>
cleft	Having one or more incisions reaching nearly to the midrib. <i>He had a cleft chin and strong jaw.</i>
cracked	Damaged and showing lines on the surface from having split without coming apart. <i>You must think my family are cracked.</i>
<u>dismantle</u>	Tear down so as to make flat with the ground. <i>The old regime was dismantled.</i>
divisible	(of a number) containing another number a number of times without a remainder. <i>The Americans fought a bloody war to prove that their nation is not divisible.</i>
effusion	An instance of giving off something such as a liquid or gas. <i>Middle ear effusions.</i>
eruption	A spot, rash, or other mark appearing suddenly on the skin. <i>A sudden eruption of street violence.</i>
fissure	Break into fissures or fine cracks. <i>The bacteria survive around vents or fissures in the deep ocean floor.</i>
flick	Cause to move with a flick. <i>He felt the flick of a whip.</i>
<u>fraction</u>	A component of a mixture that has been separated by a fractional process. <i>Her eyes widened a fraction.</i>
<u>fracture</u>	Fracture a bone of. <i>The pothole fractured a bolt on the axle.</i>

intermission	The act of suspending activity temporarily. <i>The daily work goes on without intermission.</i>
partible	Involving or denoting a system of inheritance in which a deceased person's estate is divided equally among the heirs. <i>A partible estate.</i>
partition	The act of dividing or partitioning separation by the creation of a boundary that divides or keeps apart. <i>Partition a room off.</i>
piece	Assemble something from parts or pieces. <i>If it be broken it must be pieced.</i>
recess	Put into a recess. <i>The mid morning recess.</i>
rift	A major fault separating blocks of the earth's surface a rift valley. <i>The Indian landmass rifted from Madagascar about 90 million years ago.</i>
separation	The state of lacking unity. <i>Prose structured into short sentences with meaningful separation into paragraphs.</i>
severance	The act of severing. <i>The severance and disestablishment of the Irish Church.</i>
snap	Cause to make a snapping sound. <i>Bullets snapped past us.</i>
split	A split osier used in basketwork. <i>The party was deeply split over its future direction.</i>
sunder	Break apart or in two, using violence. <i>A universe sundered ages ago in a divine war.</i>
