centennial	A hundredth anniversary. <i>Centennial celebrations.</i>
concomitant	Following or accompanying as a consequence. <i>She loved travel with all its concomitant worries.</i>
date	Provide with a dateline mark with a date. <i>The package is dated November 24.</i>
day	A day assigned to a particular purpose or observance. <i>He was a successful pianist in his day.</i>

january	The first month of the year; begins 10 days after the winter solstice.
lastingly	In an enduring or permanent manner.
lifespan	The period during which something is functional (as between birth and death). <i>The human lifespan.</i>
long	Of elongated shape. <i>A week long course.</i>
march	Cause to march or go at a marching pace. <i>They marched the mules into the desert.</i>
millennial	A person reaching young adulthood in the early 21st century. <i>Most social networking groups are dominated by the millennial generation.</i>
millennium	A period of a thousand years, especially when calculated from the traditional date of the birth of Christ. <i>Archer s treatise predicted that the millennium was close at hand.</i>
month	A period of time between the same dates in successive calendar months. <i>It was the end of the month.</i>
periodicity	The quality of recurring at regular intervals. <i>The periodicity of the sunspot cycle.</i>

<u>prolonged</u>	Continuing for a long time or longer than usual; lengthy. <i>A prolonged black line across the page.</i>
protracted	Relatively long in duration tediously protracted. <i>A protracted and bitter dispute.</i>
semiannual	Occurring or payable twice each year.
<u>span</u>	The wingspan of an aircraft or a bird. <i>An eight span bridge.</i>
<u>thereafter</u>	From that time on. <i>It was agreed that the meeting be held annually thereafter.</i>
tuesday	The third day of the week; the second working day.
waking	The state of remaining awake. <i>He hangs between sleeping and waking.</i>
<u>week</u>	Hours or days of work in a calendar week. <i>They worked a 40 hour week.</i>
weekday	A day of the week other than Sunday or Saturday. <i>The weekday rush hour.</i>
<u>year</u>	A set of students grouped together as being of roughly similar ages mostly entering a school or college in the same academic year. <i>Single vineyard wine of a good year.</i>
