- *A leave usually taken every seventh year.*

<b>recess</b>	A small space created by building part of a wall further back from the rest. <i>Talks resumed after a month s <b>recess</b>.</i>

<b>sabbatical leave</b>	A leave usually taken every seventh year.
<b>school holiday</b>	The process of being formally educated at a school.

**week off** A period of seven consecutive days starting on Sunday.

<b>concomitant</b>	Following or accompanying as a consequence. <i>She loved travel with all its <b>concomitant</b> worries.</i>
<b>date</b>	Provide with a dateline mark with a date. <i>The package is <b>dated</b> November 24.</i>
<b>day</b>	A day assigned to a particular purpose or observance. <i>He was a successful pianist in his <b>day</b>.</i>
<b>duration</b>	The period of time during which something continues. <i>Bicycle hire for the <b>duration</b> of your holiday.</i>
<b>enduring</b>	Unceasing. <i>He formed a number of <b>enduring</b> relationships with women.</i>
<b>ensuing</b>	Following immediately and as a result of what went before. <i>She lost track of one of her children during the <b>ensuing</b> chaos.</i>
<b>january</b>	The first month of the year; begins 10 days after the winter solstice.
<b>lastingly</b>	In an enduring or permanent manner.
<b>lifespan</b>	The period during which something is functional (as between birth and death). <i>The human <b>lifespan</b>.</i>
<b>long</b>	Of elongated shape. <i>A week <b>long</b> course.</i>
<b>march</b>	Cause to march or go at a marching pace. <i>They <b>marched</b> the mules into the desert.</i>
<b>millennial</b>	A person reaching young adulthood in the early 21st century. <i>Most social networking groups are dominated by the <b>millennial</b> generation.</i>
<b>millennium</b>	A period of a thousand years, especially when calculated from the traditional date of the birth of Christ. <i>Archer s treatise predicted that the <b>millennium</b> was close at hand.</i>
<b>month</b>	A period of time between the same dates in successive calendar months. <i>It was the end of the <b>month</b>.</i>
<b>periodicity</b>	The quality of recurring at regular intervals. <i>The <b>periodicity</b> of the sunspot cycle.</i>

<b><u>prolonged</u></b>	Continuing for a long time or longer than usual; lengthy. <i>A <b>prolonged</b> black line across the page.</i>
<b>protracted</b>	Relatively long in duration tediously protracted. <i>A <b>protracted</b> and bitter dispute.</i>
<b>semiannual</b>	Occurring or payable twice each year.
<b><u>span</u></b>	The wingspan of an aircraft or a bird. <i>An eight <b>span</b> bridge.</i>
<b><u>thereafter</u></b>	From that time on. <i>It was agreed that the meeting be held annually <b>thereafter</b>.</i>
<b>tuesday</b>	The third day of the week; the second working day.
<b>waking</b>	The state of remaining awake. <i>He hangs between sleeping and <b>waking</b>.</i>
<b><u>week</u></b>	Hours or days of work in a calendar week. <i>They worked a 40 hour <b>week</b>.</i>
<b>weekday</b>	A day of the week other than Sunday or Saturday. <i>The <b>weekday</b> rush hour.</i>
<b><u>year</u></b>	A set of students grouped together as being of roughly similar ages mostly entering a school or college in the same academic year. <i>Single vineyard wine of a good <b>year</b>.</i>
