destruction	A group of wild cats. Gambling was his <b>destruction</b> .
disruption	The act of causing disorder. <i>He gave hints on what industry today he believes may be ripe for</i> <i>disruption</i> .
filibustering	A tactic for delaying or obstructing legislation by making long speeches. The rules allowing <b>filibustering</b> may have to be changed.
<u>impairment</u>	The condition of being unable to perform as a consequence of physical or mental unfitness. <i>Hearing impairment</i> .
obstruction	The physical condition of blocking or filling a passage with an obstruction. They were held for <b>obstruction</b> and other public order offences.
ruining	Failure that results in a loss of position or reputation.
spoiling	The act of spoiling something by causing damage to it. <i>Her <b>spoiling</b> my dress was deliberate.</i>
<u>subversion</u>	The act of subverting; as overthrowing or destroying a legally constituted government. The ruthless <b>subversion</b> of democracy.
<u>undermining</u>	The action or process of lessening the effectiveness, power, or ability of someone or something, especially gradually or insidiously. <i>The greatest threat of all is the <b>undermining</b> of our Constitution.</i>
vandalism	Willful wanton and malicious destruction of the property of others. Surveillance of the building would reduce <b>vandalism</b> and theft.
wrecking	The event of a structure being completely demolished and leveled. His main business was <b>wrecking</b> and removal.



- Deliberately destroy, damage, or obstruct (something), especially for political or military advantage.








## Synonyms of "Sabotage" as a verb (18 Words)

counteract	Oppose or check by a counteraction. This will <b>counteract</b> the foolish actions of my colleagues.
countermine	Dig a countermine against. They <b>countermine</b> d the enemies mines so that sometimes they fought hand to hand underground.
damage	Inflict damage upon. The snow <b>damage</b> d the roof.
destroy	Destroy completely damage irreparably. <i>The fire <b>destroy</b>ed the house.</i>
<u>disrupt</u>	Interrupt (an event, activity, or process) by causing a disturbance or problem. Flooding <b>disrupt</b> ed rail services.
filibuster	Obstruct proposed legislation with a filibuster. He was one of four Tories who <b>filibuster</b> ed for more than 30 minutes each to derail the free parking plan.
<u>impair</u>	Weaken or damage (something, especially a faculty or function. <i>His vision was <b>impair</b>ed</i> .
incapacitate	Injure permanently. <i>He was <b>incapacitate</b>d by a heart attack.</i>
obstruct	Shut out from view or get in the way so as to hide from sight. The appellants were arrested and later convicted of <b>obstruct</b> ing the police.
ruin	Fall into ruin. The tears <b>ruin</b> ed her make up.
spoil	Make a mess of, destroy or ruin. The group called on its supporters to <b>spoil</b> their papers.
<u>subvert</u>	Destroy property or hinder normal operations. We must not let our civil liberties be <b>subvert</b> ed by the current crisis.
threaten	To be a menacing indication of something. Danger <b>threaten</b> s.
undermine	Erode the base or foundation of (a rock formation. The demolition engineers did eventually <b>undermine</b> two of the tower s six sides.
<u>vandalize</u>	Destroy wantonly, as through acts of vandalism. <i>Vandalize</i> the park.
<u>weaken</u>	Lessen the strength of. His resistance had <b>weaken</b> ed.



#### <u>wreck</u>

Suffer or undergo shipwreck. Police began handing out warnings to people **wreck**ing cars without a license.



#### Usage Examples of "Sabotage" as a verb

- The Resistance sabotaged railroad operations during the war.
- Power lines from South Africa were sabotaged by rebel forces.







# Associations of "Sabotage" (30 Words)

attenuate	Reduce in thickness; make thin. <i>Her intolerance was <b>attenuate</b>d by an unexpected liberalism.</i>
<u>calculated</u>	Carefully thought out in advance. A <b>calculated</b> insult.
counteract	Oppose or check by a counteraction. Should we deliberately intervene in the climate system to <b>counteract</b> global warming.
<u>dampen</u>	Check; keep in check (a fire. Nothing could <b>dampen</b> her enthusiasm.
deaden	Make vague or obscure or make (an image) less visible. The syllabus has <b>deaden</b> ed the teaching process.
debilitate	Make (someone) very weak and infirm. <i>Hard drugs destroy families and <b>debilitate</b> communities.</i>
<u>deliberate</u>	Engage in long and careful consideration. A <b>deliberate</b> decision.
designed	Planned or conceived in detail or for a specific purpose. The aircraft performed their <b>designed</b> functions well.
destabilize	Become unstable. The accused were charged with conspiracy to <b>destabilize</b> the country.
dilute	(of colour or light) weak or low in concentration. <i>Dilute</i> acetic acid.
diminish	Cause to seem less impressive or valuable. The trial has aged and <b>diminish</b> ed him.
diminished	Of an organ or body part diminished in size or strength as a result of disease or injury or lack of use. A <b>diminished</b> fifth.
emasculate	Make (someone or something) weaker or less effective. The refusal to allow them to testify effectively <b>emasculate</b> d the committee.
enervate	Make (someone) feel drained of energy or vitality. <i>The heat <b>enervate</b>d us all.</i>
enfeeble	Make weak or feeble. Sickness had <b>enfeeble</b> d me.
faded	Having lost freshness or brilliance of color. <i>Faded jeans</i> .
fatigued	Drained of energy or effectiveness; extremely tired; completely exhausted.



intended	Future; betrothed. <i>Your <b>intended</b> trip abroad.</i>
knowingly	In a way that suggests one has secret knowledge or awareness. Amy looked at me <b>knowingly</b> .
measured	(of speech or writing) carefully considered and restrained. <i>His <b>measured</b> prose.</i>
premeditated	Characterized by deliberate purpose and some degree of planning. A <b>premeditated</b> crime.
rarefy	Make or become less dense or solid. As the shell continues to expand and <b>rarefy</b> astronomers may eventually be able to see characteristic gamma rays from the radioactivity within.
reduce	Reduce in scope while retaining essential elements. The workforce has been <b>reduce</b> d to some 6 100.
reduced	Made less in size or amount or degree.
scheme	Devise a system or form a scheme for. Sheila and me were in that gang on the <b>scheme</b> .
<u>subvert</u>	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. We must not let our civil liberties be <b>subvert</b> ed by the current crisis.
thinner	A volatile solvent used to make paint or other solutions less viscous. Dampen a clean rag with <b>thinner</b> s and carefully wipe any remaining dust from the timber.
undermine	Erode the base or foundation of (a rock formation. <i>This could <b>undermine</b> years of hard work.</i>
unsettle	Disturb the composure of. The crisis has <b>unsettle</b> d financial markets.
<u>weaken</u>	Destroy property or hinder normal operations. Fault lines had <b>weaken</b> ed and shattered the rocks.
