hallowed	Worthy of religious veneration. <i>Hallowed ground.</i>
<u>inalienable</u>	Incapable of being repudiated or transferred to another. <i>The shareholders have the inalienable right to dismiss directors.</i>
inviolable	Must be kept sacred. <i>The person of the king is inviolable.</i>
inviolate	(of a woman) having the hymen unbroken. <i>An international memorial which must remain inviolate.</i>
invulnerable	Immune to attack; impregnable. <i>Gunners raked the beach from invulnerable positions on the cliffs.</i>
protected	(of a threatened species or area) covered by legislation controlling hunting, collection, or development. <i>Medical facilities have a special protected status under international law.</i>

<u>respected</u>	Deeply admired or esteemed. <i>A respected academic.</i>
sacred	Worthy of religious veneration. <i>A sacred Hindu text.</i>
safe	Financially safe. <i>His world it s safe to say will not fall apart.</i>
<u>secure</u>	Immune to attack; incapable of being tampered with. <i>A secure investment.</i>
set apart	Converted to solid form (as concrete.
unchallengeable	Not open to challenge. <i>Unchallengeable facts.</i>
unimpeachable	Free of guilt; not subject to blame. <i>An unimpeachable reputation.</i>
unthreatened	Free from threat or danger; safe and secure. <i>Her lead remained unthreatened for the remainder of the race.</i>
<u>untouchable</u>	Defiling. <i>In most museums such articles are untouchable.</i>

<u>bless</u>	(of God or some notional higher power) endow someone with (a particular cherished thing or attribute). <i>We have been blessed with a beautiful baby boy.</i>

ecumenism	The principle or aim of promoting unity among the world's Christian Churches.
enshrine	Enclose in a shrine. <i>The saint s bones were enshrined in the cathedral.</i>
hallowed	Greatly revered and honoured. <i>The band will be in some hallowed and historic surroundings.</i>
heavenly	Relating to or inhabiting a divine heaven. <i>Heavenly Father.</i>
heresy	Opinion profoundly at odds with what is generally accepted. <i>The doctrine was denounced as a heresy by the Pope.</i>
holy	(of a person) devoted to the service of God. <i>Holy smoke.</i>
invincible	Incapable of being overcome or subdued. <i>An invincible warrior.</i>
inviolable	Immune to attack; incapable of being tampered with. <i>An inviolable oath.</i>
inviolable	Must be kept sacred. <i>An international memorial which must remain inviolable.</i>
liturgy	A religious service conducted according to a liturgy. <i>A tradition which found its expression in ritual and liturgy.</i>
omniscience	The state of being omniscient; having infinite knowledge. <i>The notion of divine omniscience.</i>
orison	A prayer.
pantheon	All the gods of a people or religion collectively. <i>The pantheon of the all time greats.</i>
priestess	A female priest of a non-Christian religion.
religion	The belief in and worship of a superhuman controlling power, especially a personal God or gods. <i>Ideas about the relationship between science and religion.</i>
religious	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience. <i>A member of a religious order.</i>
sacred	Concerned with religion or religious purposes. <i>A profit oriented public to whom nothing is sacred.</i>

sacrilege	Blasphemous behavior; the act of depriving something of its sacred character. <i>Putting ecclesiastical vestments to secular use was considered sacrilege.</i>
<u>sanctity</u>	The state or quality of being holy, sacred, or saintly. <i>The site of the tomb was a place of sanctity for the ancient Egyptians.</i>
theologian	Someone who is learned in theology or who speculates about theology.
theological	Relating to the study of the nature of God and religious belief. <i>Theological and pastoral training.</i>
theology	Religious beliefs and theory when systematically developed. <i>Jewish theology.</i>
