### Definitions of "Sailor" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “sailor” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A person who goes sailing as a sport or recreation.*
- *A stiff hat made of straw with a flat crown.*
- *A person who rarely (or often) becomes sick at sea in rough weather.*
- *A serviceman in the navy.*
- *Any member of a ship's crew.*
- *A person whose job it is to work as a member of the crew of a commercial or naval ship or boat, especially one who is below the rank of officer.*



## Synonyms of "Sailor" as a noun (14 Words)

<b>bluejacket</b>	A sailor in the navy.
<b>boater</b>	A flat-topped hardened straw hat with a brim.
<b>crewman</b>	Any member of a ship's crew. <i>The coast guard has rescued seven crewmen from a tugboat being battered by rough seas.</i>
<b>leghorn</b>	A hat made of leghorn.
<b>mariner</b>	A sailor. <i>The intrepid <b>mariners</b> of yesteryear set out to discover new worlds.</i>
<b>navy man</b>	The navy of the United States of America; the agency that maintains and trains and equips combat-ready naval forces.
<b>panama</b>	A republic on the Isthmus of Panama; achieved independence from Colombia in 1903.

<b>panama hat</b>	Headress that protects the head from bad weather; has shaped crown and usually a brim.
<b>sailor boy</b>	A serviceman in the navy.
<b>seafarer</b>	A person who regularly travels by sea; a sailor. <i>The shipping subsidiary employs about 800 <b>seafarers</b> and 150 shore staff.</i>
<b>seafaring man</b>	A male person who plays a significant role (husband or lover or boyfriend) in the life of a particular woman.
<b>skimmer</b>	A long-winged seabird related to the terns, feeding by flying low over the water surface with its knife-like extended lower mandible immersed. <i>Our collection includes wraps <b>skimmers</b> and pleated coat dresses.</i>
<b>straw hat</b>	Plant fiber used e.g. for making baskets and hats or as fodder.



### Usage Examples of "Sailor" as a noun

- *He is a keen sailor in his spare time.*
- *Hawaii was an important stopping point for sailors to restock provisions.*

- aboard** On first or second or third base.  
*Anchored close **aboard** another ship.*
- aquatic** An aquatic plant or animal especially one suitable for a pond or aquarium.  
***Aquatic** plants.*
- boat** Of an angler draw a hooked fish into a boat.  
*She likes to go **boating**.*
- boatswain** A ship's officer in charge of equipment and the crew.
- coastal** Located on or near or bordering on a coast.  
***Coastal** waters.*

<u>crew</u>	Serve as a crew member on. <i>A graffiti <b>crew</b> called the Syndicate.</i>
<b>dolphin</b>	Large slender food and game fish widely distributed in warm seas (especially around Hawaii).
<b>fisherman</b>	Someone whose occupation is catching fish.
<b>frog</b>	Hunt frogs for food.
<b>galleon</b>	A large square-rigged sailing ship with three or more masts; used by the Spanish for commerce and war from the 15th to 18th centuries. <i>A Spanish treasure <b>galleon</b> wrecked off the Florida Keys.</i>
<b>harpoon</b>	Spear with a harpoon. <i>Gilbert s father <b>harpooned</b> a five metre basking shark.</i>
<b>jack</b>	A lumberjack. <i>You don t know <b>jack</b>.</i>
<b>marine</b>	Relating to or found in the sea. <i><b>Marine</b> plants and animals such as seaweed and whales.</i>
<b>mariner</b>	A man who serves as a sailor. <i>The intrepid <b>mariners</b> of yesteryear set out to discover new worlds.</i>
<b>maritime</b>	Relating to or involving ships or shipping or navigation or seamen. <i>Native and exotic plants flourish in the mild <b>maritime</b> climate on the Lleyn Peninsula.</i>
<b>mollusc</b>	Invertebrate having a soft unsegmented body usually enclosed in a shell.
<b>nautical</b>	Of or concerning navigation, sailors, or the sea; maritime. <i><b>Nautical</b> charts.</i>
<b>navigation</b>	The work of a sailor. <i>The channel will be open to <b>navigation</b> as soon as the ice melts.</i>
<u>navigator</u>	In earlier times, a person who explored by ship. <i>The driver relies on his <b>navigator</b> s skill at reading the road.</i>
<u>ocean</u>	Anything apparently limitless in quantity or volume. <i>She had <b>oceans</b> of energy.</i>
<b>offshore</b>	Situated at sea some distance from the shore. <i>We dropped anchor <b>offshore</b>.</i>
<b>oyster</b>	Raise dredge or gather oysters. <i>As a kid he crabbed and <b>oystered</b> for fun.</i>
<b>sailing</b>	The action of sailing in a ship or boat. <i>A <b>sailing</b> club.</i>
<u>sea</u>	Used to refer to waves as opposed to calm sea. <i>Heavy <b>seas</b>.</i>

- shellfish** Shellfish as food.  
*They plied me with enormous platters of fresh **shellfish**.*
- ship** A spaceship.  
*Jack you **shipped** with the Admiral once didn't you.*
- shipwreck** Of a person or ship suffer a shipwreck.  
*The vessel was **shipwrecked**.*
- underwater** Situated, occurring, or done beneath the surface of water.  
***Underwater** photography.*
- whaler** A ship engaged in whale fishing.
