### Definitions of "Sake" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “sake” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Out of consideration for or in order to help or please someone.*
- *The purpose of achieving or obtaining.*
- *Japanese alcoholic beverage made from fermented rice; usually served hot.*
- *For the purpose of; in the interest of; in order to achieve or preserve.*
- *Used to express impatience, annoyance, urgency, or desperation.*
- *Used to indicate something that is done as an end in itself rather than to achieve some other purpose.*
- *A reason for wanting something done.*

- advantage** (tennis) first point scored after deuce.  
*He saw some **advantage** in the proposal.*
- aim** A purpose or intention; a desired outcome.  
*His **aim** was perfect.*
- benefit** An event such as a concert or game that is intended to raise money for a particular player or charity.  
*The social season was highlighted by debutante balls and charity **benefits**.*
- cause** A series of actions advancing a principle or tending toward a particular end.  
*She devoted her whole adult life to the **cause** of deaf people.*
- end** The state of affairs that a plan is intended to achieve and that when achieved terminates behavior intended to achieve it.  
*An ashtray full of cigarette **ends**.*
- gain** The amount of increase in signal power or voltage or current expressed as the ratio of output to input.  
*The potential **gain** from rail privatization would be a more commercial railway.*

<b>goal</b>	An instance of sending the ball into or over the goal especially as a unit of scoring in a game. <i>The aircraft bumped towards our <b>goal</b> some 400 miles to the west.</i>
<b>good</b>	That which is morally right; righteousness. <i>What s the <b>good</b> of worrying.</i>
<b>interest</b>	The selfish pursuit of one s own welfare self interest. <i><b>Interest</b> payments.</i>
<b><u>motive</u></b>	A reason for doing something. <i>Police were unable to establish a <b>motive</b> for his murder.</i>
<b>object</b>	The goal intended to be attained (and which is believed to be attainable). <i>Small <b>objects</b> such as shells.</i>
<b>objective</b>	The objective case. <i>The system has achieved its <b>objective</b>.</i>
<b>profit</b>	The advantageous quality of being beneficial. <i>His eyes brightened at the prospect of <b>profit</b>.</i>
<b>purpose</b>	The quality of being determined to do or achieve something firmness of purpose. <i>The building is no longer needed for its original <b>purpose</b>.</i>
<b>reason</b>	A rational motive for a belief or action. <i>She is in danger of losing her <b>reason</b>.</i>
<b>rice beer</b>	Annual or perennial rhizomatous marsh grasses; seed used for food; straw used for paper.
<b>saki</b>	Small arboreal monkey of tropical South America with long hair and bushy nonprehensile tail.
<b>welfare</b>	Financial support given to those who are unemployed or otherwise in need. <i>She lives on <b>welfare</b>.</i>
<b>well-being</b>	A contented state of being happy and healthy and prosperous.

<b>alcohol</b>	Drink containing alcohol. <i>The use of petrol containing <b>alcohol</b>.</i>
<b>bean</b>	A leguminous plant that bears beans in pods. <i>A <b>bean</b> casserole.</i>
<b>beer</b>	A general name for alcoholic beverages made by fermenting a cereal (or mixture of cereals) flavored with hops. <i>A pint of <b>beer</b>.</i>
<b>beverage</b>	(chiefly in commercial use) a drink other than water. <i>May I take your <b>beverage</b> order.</i>
<b>brew</b>	Prepare by brewing. <i>A storm was <b>brewing</b>.</i>
<b>carouse</b>	Engage in boisterous, drunken merrymaking. <i>Corporate <b>carouses</b>.</i>

<b>cocktail</b>	A short mixed drink. <i>A chilled lobster <b>cocktail</b> prettily presented in a martini glass.</i>
<b>coffee</b>	Coffee seeds roasted and ground or a powder made from them. <i>He ordered a cup of <b>coffee</b>.</i>
<b>drink</b>	The act of drinking alcoholic beverages to excess. <i>He heaved the outboard motor into the <b>drink</b>.</i>
<b>drinker</b>	A person who drinks alcoholic beverages (especially to excess). <i>A heavy <b>drinker</b>.</i>
<b>expediency</b>	The quality of being suited to the end in view. <i>An act of political <b>expediency</b>.</i>
<b>gulp</b>	An act of gulping food or drink. <i>He <b>gulped</b> for help after choking on a big piece of meat.</i>
<b>guzzle</b>	Drink greedily or as if with great thirst. <i>This car <b>guzzles</b> petrol.</i>
<b>inebriated</b>	Stupefied or excited by a chemical substance (especially alcohol). <i>Helplessly <b>inebriated</b>.</i>
<b>juice</b>	A drink made from fruit or vegetable juice. <i>Digestive <b>juices</b>.</i>
<b>kava</b>	The shrub from which the kava root is obtained grown in the Pacific Islands.
<b>lemonade</b>	A sweet colourless carbonated drink containing lemon flavouring. <i>A jug of <b>lemonade</b>.</i>
<b>liqueur</b>	A chocolate with a liqueur filling. <i>Fruit cocktail laced with <b>liqueur</b>.</i>
<b>liquor</b>	Liquid which drains from food during cooking. <i>Waste <b>liquors</b>.</i>
<b>mead</b>	United States anthropologist noted for her claims about adolescence and sexual behavior in Polynesian cultures (1901-1978). <i>The tavern stocks beer cider perry and <b>mead</b>.</i>
<b>profit</b>	Make a profit gain money or materially. <i>It would <b>profit</b> us to change our plans.</i>
<b>quaff</b>	A hearty draft. <i>Porter is a dark malty <b>quaff</b>.</i>
<b>rice</b>	Sieve so that it becomes the consistency of rice. <i><b>Rice</b> the potatoes.</i>
<b>sip</b>	Drink in sips. <i>She took a <b>sip</b> of the red wine.</i>
<b>stein</b>	Experimental expatriate United States writer (1874-1946).

- swill** Cause (liquid) to swirl round in a container or cavity.  
*A feast **swilled** down with pints of cider.*
- tea** Dried leaves of the tea shrub used to make tea.  
*I **teaed** with Professor Herron.*
- vino** Fermented juice (of grapes especially).

*He opened a bottle of red **wine**.*
