- *Represented as leaping (rampant but leaning forward).*
- *Prominent; conspicuous.*

basic	Relating to or denoting steel-making processes involving lime-rich refractories and slags. <i>A basic story line.</i>

chief	Most important. <i>Chief among her concerns is working alone at night.</i>
conspicuous	Without any attempt at concealment; completely obvious. <i>A tower conspicuous at a great distance.</i>

dominant	Denoting the predominant species in a plant or animal community. <i>The dominant partner in the marriage.</i>
essential	(of a disease) with no known external stimulus or cause; idiopathic. <i>It is essential to keep up to date records.</i>
evident	Clearly seen or understood; obvious. <i>A clearly evident erasure in the manuscript.</i>
eye-catching	Seizing the attention.
focal	Relating to the focus of a lens. <i>Focal point.</i>
important	Important in effect or meaning. <i>Important people.</i>
key	Of crucial importance. <i>She became a key figure in the suffragette movement.</i>
main	Most important element. <i>By main strength.</i>
major	Of a premise containing the major term in a categorical syllogism. <i>A major artist.</i>
notable	Worthy of attention or notice; remarkable. <i>A notable increase in the crime rate.</i>

noteworthy	Worthy of attention because interesting, significant, or unusual. <i>Noteworthy features.</i>
<u>noticeable</u>	Undesirably noticeable. <i>After a noticeable pause the lecturer continued.</i>
obvious	Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. <i>It was obvious a storm was coming in.</i>
outstanding	Having a quality that thrusts itself into attention. <i>Outstanding bills.</i>
<u>paramount</u>	Having supreme power. <i>The interests of the child are of paramount importance.</i>
<u>pivotal</u>	Being of crucial importance- Henry Kissinger. <i>A sliding or pivotal motion.</i>
predominant	Having or exerting control or power. <i>The predominant colour was white.</i>
<u>primary</u>	Of primary importance. <i>The government s primary aim is to see significant reductions in unemployment.</i>
prime	(of a number) divisible only by itself and unity (e.g. 2, 3, 5, 7, 11). <i>Prime mover.</i>
principal	Denoting an original sum invested or lent. <i>The principal amount of your investment.</i>
prominent	Projecting from something; protuberant. <i>A new theory is the most prominent feature of the book.</i>
pronounced	Strongly marked; easily noticeable. <i>A pronounced flavor of cinnamon.</i>
<u>recognizable</u>	Able to be recognized or identified from previous encounters or knowledge. <i>This situation produces recognizable stress symptoms.</i>
remarkable	Worthy of attention; striking. <i>A remarkable coincidence.</i>
signal	Notably out of the ordinary. <i>The year saw one signal triumph for the Labour party.</i>
<u>spectacular</u>	Having a quality that thrusts itself into attention. <i>Spectacular dives from the cliff.</i>
<u>staple</u>	Necessary or important, especially regarding food or commodities. <i>Wheat is a staple crop.</i>

striking

Attracting attention by reason of being unusual, extreme, or prominent.
*The murder bore a **striking** similarity to an earlier shooting.*

unmistakable

Not able to be mistaken for anything else; very distinctive.
*The **unmistakable** sound of his laughter.*

vital

Manifesting or characteristic of life.
***Vital** signs.*

important

Important in effect or meaning.
*The speech had passion and more **important** compassion.*

interesting	Arousing or holding the attention. <i>An interesting debate.</i>
intriguing	Disturbingly provocative. <i>Our team came up with some most intriguing finds.</i>
<u>irresistible</u>	Impossible to resist; overpowering. <i>He found the delicious looking cakes irresistible.</i>
<u>marvelous</u>	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>A marvelous collection of rare books.</i>
noteworthy	Worth paying attention to; interesting or significant. <i>A noteworthy fact is that her students rarely complain.</i>
obtrusive	Undesirably noticeable. <i>Equally obtrusive was the graffiti.</i>
outstanding	Owed as a debt. <i>The team's outstanding performance.</i>
profound	Profound quality. <i>A profound book.</i>
prominent	Projecting from something; protuberant. <i>A man with big prominent eyes like a lobster's.</i>
remarkable	Worthy of attention because interesting, significant, or unusual. <i>A remarkable coincidence.</i>
saintliness	The quality or state of being saintly; holiness. <i>Her selfless behaviour borders on saintliness.</i>
<u>sensational</u>	Relating to or concerned in sensation. <i>A sensational view.</i>
<u>spectacular</u>	Strikingly large or obvious. <i>Spectacular dives from the cliff.</i>
