- The rescue of property or material from potential loss or destruction.
- Property or goods saved from damage or destruction.

Definitions of "Salvage" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "salvage" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Rescue (a wrecked or disabled ship or its cargo) from loss at sea.
- Retrieve or preserve (something) from potential loss or adverse circumstances.
- Collect discarded or refused material.
- Collect discarded material.
- Apprehend and execute (a suspected criminal) without trial.
- Save from ruin, destruction, or harm.

<u>retain</u>	Keep (something) in place; hold fixed. <i>The rights of defendants must be retained.</i>
retrieve	Find or extract (information stored in a computer. Other features include the ability to store update retrieve and print your data.
salve	Apply salve to. They salve d my cuts and stopped the bleeding.
<u>save</u>	Save from sins. This move will save money.
	Remove unwanted substances from.

scavenge Solid lead deposits of combustion would be scavenged from the engine.

repository	A facility where things can be deposited for storage or safekeeping. The metadata will be aggregated in a repository .
rescue	Denoting the emergency excavation of archaeological sites threatened by imminent building or road development. The dramatic rescue of nine trapped coal miners.
<u>salvation</u>	Saving someone or something from harm or from an unpleasant situation. The salvation of his party was the president s major concern.



<u>save</u>	Save from sins. <i>Save</i> the instructions to a new file.
scrimp	Be thrifty or parsimonious; economize. I have scrimp ed and saved to give you a good education.
skimp	Work hastily or carelessly; deal with inadequately and superficially. <i>She wore a yellow</i> skimp .
<u>sparingly</u>	To a meager degree or in a meager manner. <i>The sharply flavoured leaves should be used sparingly.</i>
stinginess	A lack of generosity; a general unwillingness to part with money.
<u>survivor</u>	One who lives through affliction. The survivor s of the fire were taken to a hospital.
<u>thrifty</u>	Using money and other resources carefully and not wastefully. <i>He had been brought up to be thrifty and careful.</i>
tug	Tow a ship by means of a tugboat. An overwhelming tug of attraction.
