- restore** Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken.
Restore the emperor to the throne.
- retain** Keep (something) in place; hold fixed.
*The rights of defendants must be **retained**.*
- retrieve** Find or extract (information stored in a computer).
*Other features include the ability to store update **retrieve** and print your data.*
- salve** Apply salve to.
*They **salved** my cuts and stopped the bleeding.*
- save** Save from sins.
*This move will **save** money.*
- scavenge** Remove unwanted substances from.
*Solid lead deposits of combustion would be **scavenged** from the engine.*



Usage Examples of "Salvage" as a verb

- *It was the only crumb of comfort he could salvage from the ordeal.*

<u>deposit</u>	Matter that has been deposited by some natural process. <i>Deposit the suitcase on the bench.</i>
depositor	A person who has deposited money in a bank or similar institution.
drag	The act of dragging pulling with force. <i>He dragged the big suitcase behind him.</i>
<u>drown</u>	Deliberately kill a person or animal by drowning. <i>I was drowned in work.</i>
economize	Spend sparingly, avoid the waste of. <i>I have to economize where I can.</i>
fireman	Play in which children pretend to put out a fire.
frugal	Avoiding waste. <i>A frugal meal.</i>
galley	A crescent-shaped seagoing vessel propelled by oars.
<u>haul</u>	The act of drawing or hauling something. <i>Haul nets.</i>
lifeboat	A small boat kept on a ship for use in emergency, typically one of a number on deck or suspended from davits.
lifeguard	An attendant employed at a beach or pool to protect swimmers from accidents.
pull	The force used in pulling. <i>I pulled up some onions.</i>
redeem	Pay off (loans or promissory notes). <i>The thief on the cross who by a single act redeemed a life of evil.</i>
<u>redemption</u>	The act of purchasing back something previously sold. <i>God s plans for the redemption of his world.</i>
repository	A facility where things can be deposited for storage or safekeeping. <i>The metadata will be aggregated in a repository.</i>
rescue	Denoting the emergency excavation of archaeological sites threatened by imminent building or road development. <i>The dramatic rescue of nine trapped coal miners.</i>
<u>salvation</u>	Saving someone or something from harm or from an unpleasant situation. <i>The salvation of his party was the president s major concern.</i>

<u>save</u>	Save from sins. <i>Save the instructions to a new file.</i>
scrimp	Be thrifty or parsimonious; economize. <i>I have scrumped and saved to give you a good education.</i>
skimp	Work hastily or carelessly; deal with inadequately and superficially. <i>She wore a yellow skimp.</i>
<u>sparingly</u>	To a meager degree or in a meager manner. <i>The sharply flavoured leaves should be used sparingly.</i>
stinginess	A lack of generosity; a general unwillingness to part with money.
<u>survivor</u>	One who lives through affliction. <i>The survivors of the fire were taken to a hospital.</i>
<u>thrifty</u>	Using money and other resources carefully and not wastefully. <i>He had been brought up to be thrifty and careful.</i>
tug	Tow a ship by means of a tugboat. <i>An overwhelming tug of attraction.</i>
