Salvation as a Noun

Definitions of "Salvation" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “salvation” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Deliverance from sin and its consequences, believed by Christians to be brought about by faith in Christ.*
- *A means of preserving from harm or unpleasantness.*
- *A source or means of being saved from harm, ruin, or loss.*
- *The state of being saved or preserved from harm.*
- *Saving someone or something from harm or from an unpleasant situation.*
- *Preservation or deliverance from harm, ruin, or loss.*
- *The act of delivering from sin or saving from evil.*
- *(theology) the act of delivering from sin or saving from evil.*



Synonyms of "Salvation" as a noun (9 Words)

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| conservation | The maintenance of a certain quantities unchanged during chemical reactions or physical transformations. <i>The government must take action to promote energy conservation.</i> |
| <u>deliverance</u> | Recovery or preservation from loss or danger. <i>The low drawl he employed for such deliverances.</i> |
| help | The action of helping someone to do something. <i>Offered his help in unloading.</i> |
| lifeline | A thing on which someone or something depends or which provides a means of escape from a difficult situation. <i>Fertility treatment can seem like a lifeline to childless couples.</i> |
| means of escape | An instrumentality for accomplishing some end. |
| preservation | The activity of protecting something from loss or danger. <i>The preservation of the city's green spaces.</i> |

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| reclamation | The process of claiming something back or of reasserting a right. <i>A land reclamation project.</i> |
| redemption | The action of regaining or gaining possession of something in exchange for payment, or clearing a debt. <i>Soldiers who were captured had to seek redemption.</i> |
| saving | The activity of protecting something from loss or danger. <i>The agents were cheating them out of their life savings.</i> |

- *The Christian gospel of salvation for all mankind.*
- *The salvation of his party was the president's major concern.*
- *His only salvation was to outfly the enemy.*
- *They try to sell it to us as economic salvation.*

Associations of "Salvation" (30 Words)

- apologetic** Offering or expressing apology.
*An **apologetic** smile.*
- atonement** The action of making amends for a wrong or injury.
*He submitted his resignation as an act of **atonement**.*
- baptism** A ceremony or occasion at which baptism takes place.
*The sacrament of **baptism**.*
- compunction** A feeling of deep regret (usually for some misdeed).
*They used their tanks without **compunction**.*
- confess** Confess to a punishable or reprehensible deed usually under pressure.
*I could not **confess** all my sins to the priest.*

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| <u>confession</u> | The religious body or Church sharing a confession of faith. <i>His words are a political confession of faith.</i> |
| confessor | A person to whom another confides personal problems. <i>If one prisoner confesses and implicates the other the confessor will go free as a reward.</i> |
| contrite | Feeling or expressing pain or sorrow for sins or offenses. <i>A contrite tone.</i> |
| contrition | (in the Roman Catholic Church) the repentance of past sins during or after confession. <i>Prayers of contrition.</i> |
| <u>faith</u> | Complete trust or confidence in someone or something. <i>A member of his own faith contradicted him.</i> |
| forgive | Stop blaming or grant forgiveness. <i>I forgive you your debt.</i> |
| mormon | A member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. |
| penance | Impose a penance on. <i>He had done public penance for those hasty words.</i> |
| penitence | The action of feeling or showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong; repentance. <i>A public display of penitence.</i> |
| penitent | (in the Roman Catholic Church) a person who confesses their sins to a priest and submits to the penance that he imposes. <i>A penitent expression.</i> |
| <u>redemption</u> | A thing that saves someone from error or evil. <i>Soldiers who were captured had to seek redemption.</i> |
| regret | Express with regret. <i>I regret I can't come to the party.</i> |
| regretful | Feeling or showing regret. <i>He sounded regretful but pointed out that he had committed himself.</i> |
| <u>remorse</u> | Deep regret or guilt for a wrong committed. <i>They were filled with remorse and shame.</i> |
| remorseful | Feeling or expressing pain or sorrow for sins or offenses. <i>The defendant was remorseful for what he had done.</i> |
| repent | Turn away from sin or do penitence. <i>Marian came to repent her hasty judgement.</i> |

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| <u>repentance</u> | The action of repenting; sincere regret or remorse. <i>Each person who turns to God in genuine repentance and faith will be saved.</i> |
| repentant | Expressing or feeling sincere regret and remorse; remorseful. <i>He is truly repentant for his incredible naivety and stupidity.</i> |
| rescue | Keep from being lost or abandoned; retrieve. <i>He came to our rescue with a loan of 100.</i> |
| rue | Bitterly regret (something one has done or allowed to happen) and wish it undone. <i>With rue my heart is laden.</i> |
| <u>rueful</u> | Feeling or expressing pain or sorrow for sins or offenses. <i>She gave a rueful grin.</i> |
| sacrament | A formal religious ceremony conferring a specific grace on those who receive it; the two Protestant ceremonies are baptism and the Lord's Supper; in the Roman Catholic Church and the Eastern Orthodox Church there are seven traditional rites accepted as instituted by Jesus: baptism and confirmation and Holy Eucharist and penance and holy orders and matrimony and extreme unction. <i>He heard Mass and received the sacrament.</i> |
| scruple | Raise scruples. <i>Without scruple politicians use fear as a persuasion weapon.</i> |
| <u>sin</u> | Commit a sin. <i>I sinned and brought shame down on us.</i> |
| <u>sinner</u> | A person who transgresses against divine law by committing an immoral act or acts. <i>God forgives repentant sinners.</i> |
