sand dunes	A loose material consisting of grains of rock or coral.
sands	French writer known for works concerning women's rights and independence (1804-1876).
seashore	The land between high- and low-water marks.
seaside	A place by the sea, especially a beach area or holiday resort. <i>A day at the seaside.</i>
<u>shore</u>	The land between ordinary high- and low-water marks. <i>Record companies have been anxious to import the music to American shores.</i>

- *Rub with sandpaper.*
- *Sprinkle or overlay with sand, to give better purchase on a surface.*
- *Smooth or polish with sandpaper or a mechanical sander.*

Sandpaper the wooden surface.

clay	A hardened clay surface for a tennis court. <i>Honor comes to bless the turf that wraps their clay.</i>
dune	A ridge of sand created by the wind; found in deserts or near lakes and oceans. <i>A sand dune.</i>
grain	1 7000 pound equals a troy grain or 64 799 milligrams. <i>A grain of sand.</i>
granite	Something having the quality of granite unyielding firmness. <i>A man with granite determination.</i>
granular	Characterized by a high level of granularity. <i>A granular database.</i>
granulate	Form (something) into grains or particles. <i>We have the capacity to granulate 100 of the potash we produce.</i>
granule	A tiny grain. <i>Granules of sugar.</i>
gravel	Cover an area of ground with gravel. <i>Steps lead down from the terrace to a gravelled path.</i>
gritty	Composed of or covered with particles resembling meal in texture or consistency. <i>A stone floor that was gritty and unswept.</i>
gypsum	A soft white or grey mineral consisting of hydrated calcium sulphate. It occurs chiefly in sedimentary deposits and is used to make plaster of Paris and fertilizers, and in the building industry.
limestone	A hard sedimentary rock, composed mainly of calcium carbonate or dolomite, used as building material and in the making of cement.
loam	A rich soil consisting of a mixture of sand and clay and decaying organic materials.
mineral	Of or denoting a mineral. <i>A wide range of necessary vitamins and minerals.</i>
mining	Laying explosive mines in concealed places to destroy enemy personnel and equipment. <i>Coal mining.</i>
mud	Plaster with mud. <i>The two sides took over the local media to throw mud at each other.</i>
peat	A cut piece of peat. <i>He reached forward to add a couple of peats to the fire.</i>
pebble	A small stone made smooth and round by the action of water or sand. <i>Pebble glasses.</i>

quarry	Extract stone or other materials from a quarry. <i>A limestone quarry.</i>
quartz	A hard glossy mineral consisting of silicon dioxide in crystal form present in most rocks especially sandstone and granite yellow sand is quartz with iron oxide impurities.
quicksand	A treacherous situation that tends to entrap and destroy. <i>John found himself sinking fast in financial quicksand.</i>
rock	A mass of rock projecting above the earth's surface or out of the sea. <i>He threw a rock at me.</i>
sandy	Resembling or containing or abounding in sand or growing in sandy areas. <i>Pine woods and a fine sandy beach.</i>
silt	Become filled or blocked with silt. <i>The soil ends up silting up the stream.</i>
soil	Make soiled filthy or dirty. <i>American troops were stationed on Japanese soil.</i>
