nibbles	Gentle biting.
refreshments	Snacks and drinks served as a light meal. <i>Time for rest and refreshment by the pool.</i>

titbit	A small and particularly interesting item of gossip or information. <i>When you are out with your puppy always have a titbit in your pocket.</i>
titbits	A small tasty bit of food.

Sandwich as a Verb

Definitions of "Sandwich" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "sandwich" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Insert or squeeze tightly between two people or objects.*
- *Make into a sandwich.*
- *Insert or squeeze (someone or something) between two other people or things, typically in a restricted space or so as to be uncomfortable.*



Synonyms of "Sandwich" as a verb (15 Words)

- compress** Squeeze or press together.
*She **compressed** her lips.*
- confine** Deprive of freedom take into confinement.
*He was **confined** to bed for four days with a bad dose of flu.*
- cram** Put something somewhere so that the space is completely filled.
*It s amazing how you ve managed to **cram** everyone in.*
- force** Move with force.
*Don t **force** it.*
- insert** Insert casually.
*He immediately **inserted** a clause into later contracts.*

<u>pack</u>	Load with a pack. <i>If you have a nosebleed try packing the nostrils with cotton wool.</i>
press	To be oppressive or burdensome. <i>The mob was still pressing forward.</i>
<u>push</u>	Make strenuous pushing movements during birth to expel the baby. <i>He pushed her to finish her doctorate.</i>
<u>ram</u>	Beat (earth) with a heavy implement to make it hard and firm. <i>In former times earth was rammed manually.</i>
<u>shove</u>	Push (someone or something) roughly. <i>Woolley shoved past him.</i>
<u>squeeze</u>	Squeeze or press together. <i>He squeezed with all his strength.</i>
stick	Come or be in close contact with stick or hold together and resist separation. <i>The door sticks we will have to plane it.</i>
stuff	Fill with a stuffing while cooking. <i>Chicken stuffed with mushrooms and breadcrumbs.</i>
<u>wedge</u>	Squeeze like a wedge into a tight space. <i>The door was wedged open.</i>



Usage Examples of "Sandwich" as a verb

- *The girl was sandwiched between two burly men in the back of the car.*
- *She was sandwiched in her airplane seat between two fat men.*



Associations of "Sandwich" (30 Words)

bacon	English scientist and Franciscan monk who stressed the importance of experimentation; first showed that air is required for combustion and first used lenses to correct vision (1220-1292). <i>A bacon sandwich.</i>
bake	A social gathering at which baked food of a specified kind is eaten. <i>A vegetable bake.</i>
baked	Dried out by heat or excessive exposure to sunlight. <i>Baked apples.</i>
beef	Flesh with well-developed muscle. <i>He was beefing about how the recession was killing the business.</i>
<u>bread</u>	Cover with bread crumbs. <i>A loaf of bread.</i>

cake	A flattish compact mass of something, especially soap. <i>A starter of goat s cheese and potato cakes.</i>
<u>cheese</u>	A round flat object resembling a cake of cheese such as the heavy flat wooden disc used in skittles and other games. <i>Lemon cheese.</i>
cooked	Having been prepared for eating by the application of heat. <i>A cooked breakfast.</i>
cookie	A short line of text that a web site puts on your computer's hard drive when you access the web site. <i>She s a tough cookie.</i>
cooking	Suitable for or used in cooking. <i>He developed an interest in cooking.</i>
crispy	Tender and brittle. <i>Crispy fried bacon.</i>
deli	A shop selling ready-to-eat food products.
fried	Cooked by frying in fat. <i>A breakfast of fried eggs and bacon.</i>
fry	Be excessively hot. <i>With the sea and sun and wind you ll fry if you don t take care.</i>
grill	Cook food using a grill. <i>He cooked hamburgers on the grill.</i>
ham	(Old Testament) son of Noah. <i>Thin slices of ham.</i>
<u>meat</u>	The chief part of something. <i>He did the meat of the climb on the first day.</i>
microwave	Cook or heat in a microwave oven. <i>He microwaved some steak out of the freezer.</i>
oven	A small furnace or kiln. <i>Bake the dish in a preheated oven.</i>
pancake	With reference to an aircraft make or cause to make a pancake landing. <i>Crispy pancakes filled with cheese.</i>
pizza	A dish of Italian origin, consisting of a flat round base of dough baked with a topping of tomatoes and cheese, typically with added meat, fish, or vegetables. <i>A pizza restaurant.</i>
pork	A legislative appropriation designed to ingratiate legislators with their constituents. <i>We porked out on cookies and pies.</i>

<u>recipe</u>	Directions for making something. <i>A traditional Yorkshire recipe.</i>
roast	An outdoor party at which meat of a particular type is roasted. <i>Carving the Sunday roast.</i>
sausage	An object shaped like a sausage. <i>Silly sausage he teased.</i>
smoked	(used especially of meats and fish) dried and cured by hanging in wood smoke. <i>A plate of smoked salmon.</i>
stew	Food prepared by stewing especially meat or fish with vegetables. <i>The stews of Southwark.</i>
<u>toast</u>	Slices of bread that have been toasted. <i>One mistake and you re toast.</i>
toaster	Someone who proposes a toast; someone who drinks to the health of success of someone or some venture.
<u>waffle</u>	Pancake batter baked in a waffle iron. <i>His waffle on abortion.</i>
