| comedy | The style or genre represented by comedy films plays and broadcast programmes. <i>Satiric comedy.</i> |
| condemning | Containing or imposing condemnation or censure. |
| contemptuous | Expressing extreme contempt. <i>She was intolerant and contemptuous of the majority of the human race.</i> |
| criticism | A serious examination and judgment of something. <i>He ignored the criticisms of his friends.</i> |
| criticize | Indicate the faults of (someone or something) in a disapproving way. <i>Those who criticize others often are not perfect either.</i> |
| cynical | Believing the worst of human nature and motives; having a sneering disbelief in e.g. selflessness of others. <i>Most residents are cynical about efforts to clean mobsters out of their city.</i> |
| cynicism | A school of ancient Greek philosophers, the Cynics. <i>Cynicism about the future.</i> |
| despise | Feel contempt or a deep repugnance for. <i>He despises the people he has to work for.</i> |
| disrespectful | Neither feeling nor showing respect. <i>Disrespectful toward his teacher.</i> |
| insulting | Expressing extreme contempt. <i>Their language is insulting to women.</i> |
| ironic | Humorously sarcastic or mocking. <i>It was ironical that the well planned scheme failed so completely.</i> |
| ironical | Characterized by often poignant difference or incongruity between what is expected and what actually is. <i>An ironical smile.</i> |
| irony | Witty language used to convey insults or scorn-Jonathan Swif. <i>Irony is wasted on the stupid.</i> |
| mordant | Impregnate or treat a fabric with a mordant. <i>Mordanted wool.</i> |
| paradox | A statement or proposition which, despite sound (or apparently sound) reasoning from acceptable premises, leads to a conclusion that seems logically unacceptable or self-contradictory. <i>The liar paradox.</i> |

| <u>paradoxical</u> | Seemingly contradictory but nonetheless possibly true. <i>By glorifying the acts of violence they achieve the paradoxical effect of making them trivial.</i> |
| <u>parody</u> | Make a parody of. <i>The film is a parody of the horror genre.</i> |
| polemic | The practice of engaging in controversial debate or dispute. <i>His polemic against the cultural relativism of the Sixties.</i> |
| sarcasm | Witty language used to convey insults or scorn. <i>He used sarcasm to upset his opponent.</i> |
| <u>sardonic</u> | Grimly mocking or cynical. <i>Starkey attempted a sardonic smile.</i> |
| <u>satire</u> | A play novel film or other work which uses satire. <i>A stinging satire on American politics.</i> |
| satiric | Exposing human folly to ridicule. <i>A persistent campaign of mockery by the satirical fortnightly magazine.</i> |
| <u>satirical</u> | Containing or using satire. <i>A persistent campaign of mockery by the satirical fortnightly magazine.</i> |
| <u>scornful</u> | Expressing extreme contempt. <i>Scornful laughter.</i> |
| sneering | Expressive of contempt. <i>Spoke in a sneering jeering manner.</i> |
| spoof | Imitate (something) while exaggerating its characteristic features for comic effect. <i>It is a movie that spoofs other movies.</i> |
| <u>trenchant</u> | Vigorous or incisive in expression or style. <i>Trenchant criticism.</i> |
