abyss	A catastrophic situation seen as likely to occur. <i>Satan s dark abyss.</i>
astride	With a leg on each side of something. <i>She sat on the chair astride.</i>
below	See below. <i>Our nutritionist is pictured below right.</i>
bottom	Strike the ground as with a ship s bottom. <i>He climbs the side of the gorge scratching his bottom unselfconsciously.</i>
bridle	Put a bridle on a horse. <i>The fact that he was their servant bridled his tongue.</i>
cringe	Bend one’s head and body in fear or apprehension or in a servile manner. <i>I cringed at the fellow s stupidity.</i>
crouch	A crouching stance or posture. <i>We crouched down in the trench.</i>
descending	Coming down or downward. <i>The categories are listed in descending order of usefulness.</i>
down	Denoting a flavour variety of stable quark having relatively low mass and an electric charge of $1/3$ In the Standard Model protons and neutrons are composed of up and down quarks. <i>The mugger knocked down the old lady after she refused to hand over her wallet.</i>
duck	The meat of a duck as food. <i>Before he could duck another stone struck him.</i>
falling	Coming down freely under the influence of gravity. <i>Falling temperature.</i>
flop	With a flopping sound. <i>I m going to flop here for the night.</i>
genuflect	Lower one’s body briefly by bending one knee to the ground, typically in worship or as a sign of respect. <i>Politicians had to genuflect to the far left to advance their careers.</i>
hatch	A movable barrier covering a hatchway. <i>Young birds fish and reptiles hatch.</i>
incubate	Grow under conditions that promote development. <i>The samples were incubated at 80 C for 3 minutes.</i>

kneel	Rest one's weight on one's knees. <i>In church you have to kneel during parts of the service.</i>
malleable	Easily influenced; pliable. <i>A malleable metal can be beaten into a sheet.</i>
nestle	(of a place) be situated in a half-hidden or sheltered position. <i>She nestled her head against his shoulder.</i>
pliable	Able to adjust readily to different conditions. <i>Quality leather is pliable and will not crack.</i>
pliant	Capable of being influenced or formed. <i>A more pliant prime minister.</i>
posture	Assume a posture as for artistic purposes. <i>He took ballet lessons to improve his posture.</i>
rein	Control and direct with or as if by reins. <i>Rein a horse.</i>
saddle	Put a saddle on a horse. <i>Follow the road which goes across the saddle between two tors.</i>
shrink	A psychiatrist. <i>Hot water will shrink the sweater.</i>
snuggle	A close and affectionate (and often prolonged) embrace. <i>She snuggled her head into his shoulder.</i>
squat	An exercise in which a person squats down and rises again while holding a barbell across one's shoulders. <i>A squat grey house.</i>
stoop	An inclination of the top half of the body forward and downward. <i>The princes now and then stooped to pay a nominal homage.</i>
succumb	Consent reluctantly. <i>We cannot merely give up and succumb to despair.</i>
tensile	Capable of being shaped or bent or drawn out. <i>A tensile force.</i>
wince	Make a face indicating disgust or dislike. <i>He wincing at the disgust in her voice.</i>
