fill	Fill to satisfaction. <i>Community land trusts are a way to fill the pressing need for housing.</i>
glut	Overeat or eat immodestly; make a pig of oneself. <i>He planned a treacherous murder to glut his desire for revenge.</i>
gorge	Eat a large amount greedily; fill oneself with food. <i>They gorged themselves on Cornish cream teas.</i>
gormandise	Overeat or eat immodestly; make a pig of oneself.
gormandize	Overeat or eat immodestly; make a pig of oneself.
gourmandize	Eat good food, especially to excess.
ingurgitate	Swallow (something) greedily. <i>Its empty holds are ingurgitating a vast, continuous rush of murky brown seawater.</i>
overeat	Overeat or eat immodestly make a pig of oneself. <i>If your friends overeat you re more likely to overeat too.</i>
overgorge	Overeat or eat immodestly; make a pig of oneself.
overindulge	Overeat or eat immodestly; make a pig of oneself. <i>His mother had overindulged him.</i>
pig out	Live like a pig, in squalor.
replete	Fill to satisfaction.
sate	Fill to satisfaction. <i>I am sated.</i>
scarf out	Wrap in or adorn with a scarf.
stuff	Fill with a stuffing while cooking. <i>An old teapot stuffed full of cash.</i>

glut	The quality of being so overabundant that prices fall. <i>There is a glut of cars on the market.</i>
gratification	The act or an instance of satisfying. <i>Dull repetitious work gives no gratification.</i>

gratify	Yield (to); give satisfaction to. <i>Not all the sexual impulses can be gratified.</i>
happy	Enjoying or showing or marked by joy or pleasure. <i>I can't say they looked too happy about it but a deal is a deal.</i>
indulge	Treat with excessive indulgence. <i>We indulged in a cream tea.</i>
indulging	The act of indulging or gratifying a desire. Exhausted.
jaded	<i>I have to work tonight and I don't want to become totally jaded before I even get there.</i>
overeat	Overeat or eat immodestly make a pig of oneself. <i>If your friends overeat you're more likely to overeat too.</i>
overindulge	Have too much of something enjoyable, especially food or drink. <i>His mother had overindulged him.</i>
plentiful	Producing in abundance. <i>Food is plentiful.</i>
replete	Fill to satisfaction. <i>I went out into the sun drenched streets again replete and relaxed.</i>
repletion	The state of being satisfactorily full and unable to take on more.
sate	Supply (someone) with as much as or more of something than is desired or can be managed. <i>Sate your appetite at the resort's restaurant.</i>
satiety	The feeling or state of being sated. <i>A molecule that seems to regulate satiety.</i>
satisfaction	The payment of a debt or fulfilment of an obligation or claim. <i>The full and final satisfaction of the claim.</i>
satisfy	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. <i>Social services is trying to satisfy the needs of so many different groups.</i>
slake	Satisfy (desires). <i>Slake your thirst with citron press.</i>
splurge	An act of spending money freely or extravagantly. <i>We splurged on T bone steaks.</i>
surfeit	Supply or feed to surfeit. <i>He never surfeited on rich wine.</i>
