According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “satisfactory” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

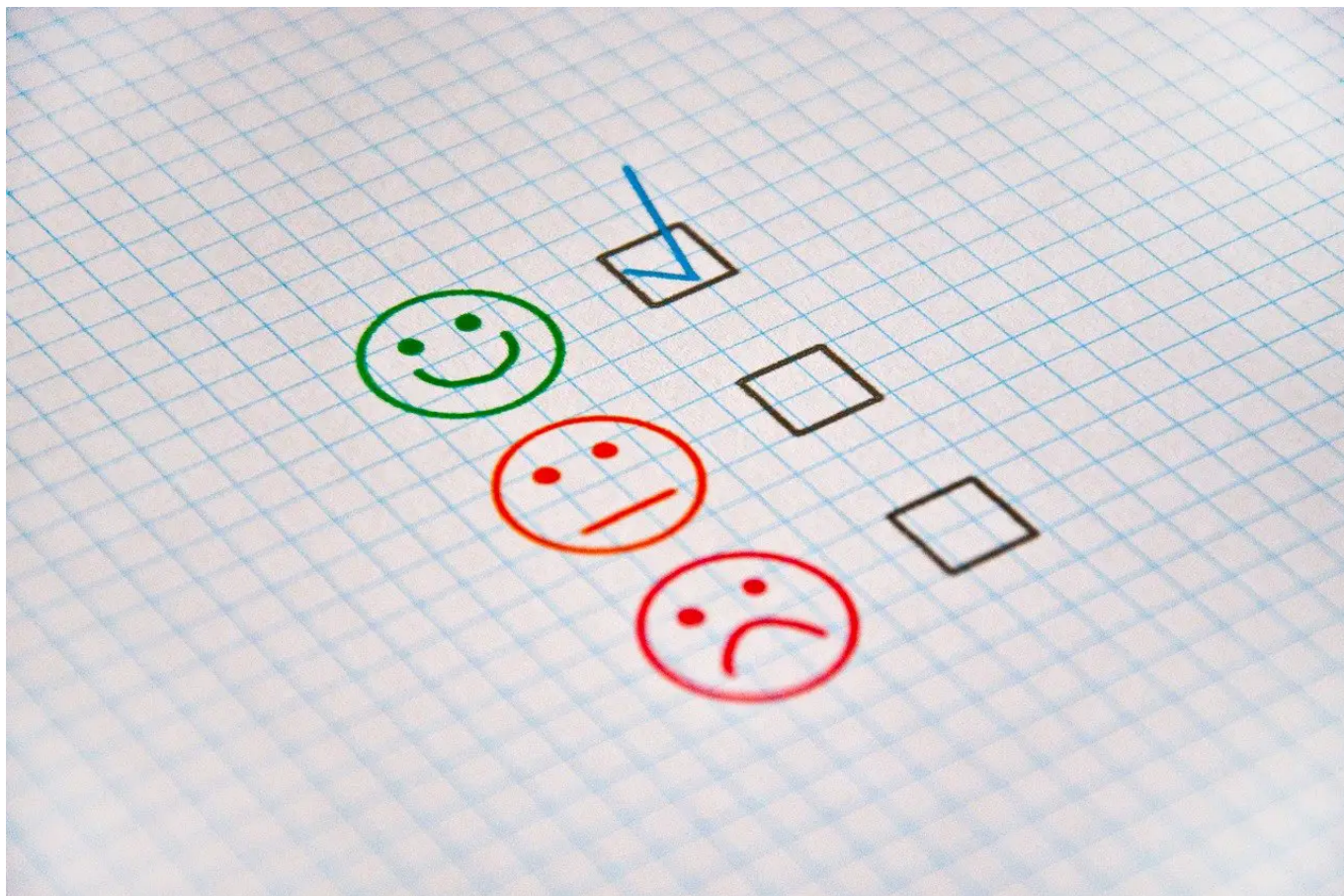
- *(of a patient in a hospital) not deteriorating or likely to die.*
- *Meeting requirements.*
- *Fulfilling expectations or needs; acceptable, though not outstanding or perfect.*
- *Giving satisfaction.*
- *(of evidence or a verdict) sufficient for the needs of the case.*



Synonyms of "Satisfactory" as an adjective (21 Words)

acceptable	Worthy of acceptance or satisfactory. <i>The water was acceptable for drinking.</i>
adequate	About average; acceptable. <i>More than adequate as a secretary.</i>
all right	Quantifier; used with either mass or count nouns to indicate the whole number or amount of or every one of a class.
average	Relating to or constituting the middle value of an ordered set of values or the average of the middle two in a set with an even number of values. <i>The caliber of the students has gone from mediocre to above average.</i>
competent	Properly or sufficiently qualified or capable or efficient. <i>An infinitely competent mother of three.</i>
decent	Decently clothed. <i>Are you decent.</i>

fair	Free of clouds or rain. <i>This cow is a fair swine.</i>
fine	Characterized by elegance or refinement or accomplishment. <i>A fine film of oil.</i>
good enough	Generally admired.
in order	Currently fashionable.
middling	Moderate or average in size, amount, or rank. <i>The performance was middling at best.</i>
moderate	Not extreme. <i>Moderate in his demands.</i>
not bad	Not in an edible or usable condition.
passable	About average; acceptable. <i>He spoke passable English.</i>
reasonable	Showing reason or sound judgment. <i>A police officer may use reasonable force to gain entry.</i>
sufficient	Enough; adequate. <i>She had a small private income that was sufficient for her needs.</i>
tolerable	Fairly good; mediocre. <i>A stimulant to make life more tolerable.</i>
up to par	Open.
up to scratch	Getting higher or more vigorous.
up to standard	Used up.
up to the mark	Extending or moving toward a higher place.

- *The step makes a satisfactory seat.*

complacency	A feeling of smug or uncritical satisfaction with oneself or one's achievements. <i>His complacency was absolutely disgusting.</i>
complacent	Contented to a fault with oneself or one's actions. <i>You can't afford to be complacent about security.</i>
content	The state of being contented with your situation in life. <i>They could read to their hearts content.</i>
contented	Satisfied or showing satisfaction with things as they are. <i>I was never contented with half measures.</i>

enjoy	Derive or receive pleasure from get enjoyment from take pleasure in. <i>I could never enjoy myself knowing you were in your room alone.</i>

good	Often used as a combining form in a good or proper or satisfactory manner or to a high standard good is a nonstandard dialectal variant for well. <i>This stump will make a good picnic table.</i>
gratify	Make happy or satisfied. <i>She was gratified to see the shock in Jim's eyes.</i>
happy	Eagerly disposed to act or to be of service. <i>A happy outcome.</i>
indulgence	In the Roman Catholic Church a grant by the Pope of remission of the temporal punishment in purgatory still due for sins after absolution The unrestricted sale of indulgences by pardoners was a widespread abuse during the later Middle Ages. <i>Indulgence in self pity.</i>
indulging	The act of indulging or gratifying a desire.
okay	Being satisfactory or in satisfactory condition. <i>Things are okay.</i>
passable	Just good enough to be acceptable; satisfactory. <i>He spoke passable English.</i>
permissible	Permitted; allowed. <i>Permissible behavior in school.</i>
<u>pleased</u>	Willing or glad to do something. <i>As he led the way he looked very pleased with himself.</i>
<u>pleasurable</u>	Pleasing; enjoyable. <i>Good printing makes a book more pleasurable to read.</i>
replete	Fill to satisfaction. <i>It is replete with misery.</i>
satisfaction	Fulfilment of one's wishes, expectations, or needs, or the pleasure derived from this. <i>The full and final satisfaction of the claim.</i>
satisfactorily	In a satisfactory manner. <i>The matter is considered to be satisfactorily resolved.</i>
<u>satisfied</u>	Contented; pleased. <i>A satisfied customer.</i>
satisfy	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. <i>Social services is trying to satisfy the needs of so many different groups.</i>

<u>savor</u>	Derive or receive pleasure from; get enjoyment from; take pleasure in. <i>Savor the soup.</i>
savour	The taste experience when a savoury condiment is taken into the mouth. <i>Gourmets will want to savour our game specialities.</i>
<u>sensuous</u>	Attractive or gratifying physically, especially sexually. <i>Her voice was rather deep but very sensuous.</i>
<u>smug</u>	Marked by excessive complacency or self-satisfaction. <i>He was feeling smug after his win.</i>
<u>tolerable</u>	Fairly good; mediocre. <i>The climate is at least tolerable.</i>

<u>yes</u>	An affirmative. <i>Answering with assured and ardent yeses.</i>
