<b>promenade</b>	(in country dancing) a movement in which couples follow one another in a given direction, each couple having both hands joined. <i>An evening <b>promenade</b>.</i>
<b>ramble</b>	A walk taken for pleasure in the countryside.
<b>stroll</b>	A short leisurely walk. <i>We took a <b>stroll</b> in the garden.</i>
<b>turn</b>	A place where a road meets or branches off another a turning. <i>Why don't you take a <b>turn</b> around the garden.</i>
<b>walk</b>	A person's manner of walking. <i>He had a funny <b>walk</b>.</i>
<b>wander</b>	An act or instance of wandering. <i>She'd go on <b>wanders</b> like that in her nightgown.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Saunter" as a noun

- *He walked with a kind of saunter as if he hadn't a care in the world.*
- *A quiet saunter down the road.*

## Saunter as a Verb

### Definitions of "Saunter" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "saunter" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Walk leisurely and with no apparent aim.*
- *Walk in a slow, relaxed manner.*

### Synonyms of "Saunter" as a verb (10 Words)

<b>amble</b>	Walk leisurely. <i>They <b>ambled</b> along the riverbank.</i>
<b>drift</b>	Vary or move from a fixed point or course. <i><b>Drift</b> the boats downstream.</i>
<b>maunder</b>	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>He <b>maunders</b> through the bank composing his thoughts.</i>
<b>meander</b>	Wander at random. <i>The path <b>meanders</b> through the vineyards.</i>

<b>potter</b>	Work lightly. <i>The old lady is <b>pottering</b> around in the garden.</i>
<b>promenade</b>	Take a promenade through a place. <i>The ladies <b>promenaded</b> along the beach.</i>
<b>ramble</b>	Walk for pleasure in the countryside. <i>Roses climbed <b>rambled</b> hung over walls.</i>
<b><u>stroll</u></b>	Achieve a sporting victory without effort. <i>The horse <b>strolled</b> home by 12 lengths.</i>
<b>walk</b>	Make walk. <i>The patient cannot <b>walk</b> yet.</i>
<b><u>wander</u></b>	Be unfaithful to one's regular sexual partner. <i>After dinner we <b>wandered</b> into town.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Saunter" as a verb

- *Adam sauntered into the room.*

## Associations of "Saunter" (30 Words)

<b>aimlessly</b>	Without purpose or direction. <i>We wandered <b>aimlessly</b> round Venice.</i>
<b>amble</b>	Walk or move at a slow, relaxed pace. <i>They <b>ambled</b> along the riverbank.</i>
<b>ambulate</b>	Walk; move about. <i>People who make use of crutches to <b>ambulate</b>.</i>
<b><u>astray</u></b>	Into error or morally questionable behaviour. <i>He was led <b>astray</b> by boozy colleagues.</i>
<b>canter</b>	Ride at a canter. <i>We came back from one of our <b>canters</b>.</i>
<b><u>drift</u></b>	A horizontal or inclined passage following a mineral vein or coal seam. <i><b>Drift</b> the boats downstream.</i>
<b><u>feral</u></b>	(especially of an animal) in a wild state, especially after escape from captivity or domestication. <i>Gangs of <b>feral</b> youths.</i>
<b>flit</b>	Move house or leave one's home, typically secretly so as to escape creditors or obligations. <i>The idea had <b>flitted</b> through his mind.</i>

<b>gad</b>	Go from place to place in the pursuit of pleasure. <i>He had heard that I was <b>gadding</b> about with an airline stewardess.</i>
<b>gait</b>	A horse's manner of moving. <i>The easy <b>gait</b> of an athlete.</i>
<b>gallivant</b>	Wander aimlessly in search of pleasure. <i>She quit her job to go <b>gallivanting</b> around the globe.</i>
<b>mincing</b>	Affectedly dainty or refined. <i>I don't have to go through the rest of my life with that <b>mincing</b> voice of yours.</i>
<b>pace</b>	Go at a pace. <i>Kirov stepped back a <b>pace</b>.</i>
<b>peripatetic</b>	A person who travels from place to place, especially a teacher who works in more than one school or college. <i>The <b>peripatetic</b> nature of military life.</i>
<b>plod</b>	Walk doggedly and slowly with heavy steps. <i>I could recognize his <b>plod</b> anywhere.</i>
<b>promenade</b>	Take a promenade through a place. <i>They <b>promenaded</b> along the waterfront.</i>
<b>ramble</b>	Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment. <i>This novel <b>rambles</b> on and jogs.</i>
<b>rambling</b>	(of a plant) putting out long shoots and growing over walls or other plants. <i>A big old <b>rambling</b> house.</i>
<b>roam</b>	Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment. <i>Gangs of youths <b>roamed</b> the streets unopposed.</i>
<b>route</b>	Send via a specific route. <i>The many <b>routes</b> to a healthier diet will be described.</i>
<b>rove</b>	A journey, especially one with no specific destination; an act of wandering. <i>The policeman's eyes <b>roved</b> around the pub.</i>
<b>stray</b>	A stray person or thing especially a domestic animal. <i><b>Stray</b> dogs.</i>
<b>stride</b>	Significant progress especially in the phrase make strides. <i>The speaker was getting into his <b>stride</b>.</i>
<b>stroll</b>	A leisurely walk (usually in some public place). <i>I <b>strolled</b> around the city.</i>
<b>trudge</b>	A long difficult walk. <i>He began the long <b>trudge</b> back to Stokenchurch Street.</i>

- walk** A person's manner of walking.  
*He was in place as the male lead but **walked** at the eleventh hour.*
- walker** A frame used by disabled or infirm people for support while walking, typically made of metal tubing with small wheels or rubber-tipped feet; a walking frame.  
*A fell **walker**.*
- walking** Close enough to be walked to.  
***Walking** is a healthy form of exercise.*
- wander** An act or instance of wandering.  
*Please don't **wander** off again.*
