airing	The opening of a subject to widespread discussion and debate. <i>Taking the baby out for an airing.</i>
amble	A leisurely walk (usually in some public place). <i>A peaceful riverside amble.</i>
breather	A vent or valve to release pressure or to allow air to move freely around something. <i>A cask breather.</i>
<u>constitutional</u>	A walk taken regularly to maintain or restore good health. <i>She went out for a constitutional.</i>
meander	A bend or curve, as in a stream or river. <i>The river flows in sweeping meanders.</i>
perambulation	A leisurely walk (usually in some public place).

promenade	(in country dancing) a movement in which couples follow one another in a given direction, each couple having both hands joined. <i>An evening promenade.</i>
ramble	A walk taken for pleasure in the countryside.
<u>stroll</u>	A short leisurely walk. <i>We took a stroll in the garden.</i>
turn	A place where a road meets or branches off another a turning. <i>Why don't you take a turn around the garden.</i>
walk	A person's manner of walking. <i>He had a funny walk.</i>
<u>wander</u>	An act or instance of wandering. <i>She'd go on wanders like that in her nightgown.</i>

Usage Examples of "Saunter" as a noun

- *He walked with a kind of saunter as if he hadn't a care in the world.*
- *A quiet saunter down the road.*

- *Walk in a slow, relaxed manner.*

Synonyms of "Saunter" as a verb (10 Words)

amble	Walk leisurely. <i>They ambled along the riverbank.</i>
<u>drift</u>	Vary or move from a fixed point or course. <i>Drift the boats downstream.</i>
maunder	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>He maunders through the bank composing his thoughts.</i>
meander	Wander at random. <i>The path meanders through the vineyards.</i>

potter	Work lightly. <i>The old lady is pottering around in the garden.</i>
promenade	Take a promenade through a place. <i>The ladies promenaded along the beach.</i>
ramble	Walk for pleasure in the countryside. <i>Roses climbed rambled hung over walls.</i>
<u>stroll</u>	Achieve a sporting victory without effort. <i>The horse strolled home by 12 lengths.</i>
walk	Make walk. <i>The patient cannot walk yet.</i>
<u>wander</u>	Be unfaithful to one's regular sexual partner. <i>After dinner we wandered into town.</i>

- *Adam sauntered into the room.*

Associations of "Saunter" (30 Words)

aimlessly	Without purpose or direction. <i>We wandered aimlessly round Venice.</i>
amble	Walk or move at a slow, relaxed pace. <i>They ambled along the riverbank.</i>
ambulate	Walk; move about. <i>People who make use of crutches to ambulate.</i>
<u>astray</u>	Into error or morally questionable behaviour. <i>He was led astray by boozy colleagues.</i>
canter	Ride at a canter. <i>We came back from one of our canters.</i>
<u>drift</u>	A horizontal or inclined passage following a mineral vein or coal seam. <i>Drift the boats downstream.</i>
<u>feral</u>	(especially of an animal) in a wild state, especially after escape from captivity or domestication. <i>Gangs of feral youths.</i>
flit	Move house or leave one's home, typically secretly so as to escape creditors or obligations. <i>The idea had flitted through his mind.</i>

gad	Go from place to place in the pursuit of pleasure. <i>He had heard that I was gadding about with an airline stewardess.</i>
gait	A horse's manner of moving. <i>The easy gait of an athlete.</i>
gallivant	Wander aimlessly in search of pleasure. <i>She quit her job to go gallivanting around the globe.</i>
mincing	Affectedly dainty or refined. <i>I don't have to go through the rest of my life with that mincing voice of yours.</i>
pace	Go at a pace. <i>Kirov stepped back a pace.</i>
peripatetic	A person who travels from place to place, especially a teacher who works in more than one school or college. <i>The peripatetic nature of military life.</i>
plod	Walk doggedly and slowly with heavy steps. <i>I could recognize his plod anywhere.</i>
promenade	Take a promenade through a place. <i>They promenaded along the waterfront.</i>
ramble	Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment. <i>This novel rambles on and jogs.</i>
rambling	(of a plant) putting out long shoots and growing over walls or other plants. <i>A big old rambling house.</i>
roam	Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment. <i>Gangs of youths roamed the streets unopposed.</i>
route	Send via a specific route. <i>The many routes to a healthier diet will be described.</i>
rove	A journey, especially one with no specific destination; an act of wandering. <i>The policeman's eyes roved around the pub.</i>
stray	A stray person or thing especially a domestic animal. <i>Stray dogs.</i>
stride	Significant progress especially in the phrase make strides. <i>The speaker was getting into his stride.</i>
stroll	A leisurely walk (usually in some public place). <i>I strolled around the city.</i>
trudge	A long difficult walk. <i>He began the long trudge back to Stokenchurch Street.</i>

walk	A person's manner of walking. <i>He was in place as the male lead but walked at the eleventh hour.</i>
walker	A frame used by disabled or infirm people for support while walking, typically made of metal tubing with small wheels or rubber-tipped feet; a walking frame. <i>A fell walker.</i>
walking	Close enough to be walked to. <i>Walking is a healthy form of exercise.</i>
<u>wander</u>	An act or instance of wandering. <i>Please don't wander off again.</i>
