breather	A vent or valve to release pressure or to allow air to move freely around something. A cask <b>breather</b> .
<u>constitutional</u>	A walk taken regularly to maintain or restore good health. She went out for a <b>constitutional</b> .
meander	A bend or curve, as in a stream or river. The river flows in sweeping <b>meander</b> s.
perambulation A leisurely walk (usually in some public place.	



promenade	(in country dancing) a movement in which couples follow one another in a given direction, each couple having both hands joined. <i>An evening promenade</i> .
ramble	A walk taken for pleasure in the countryside.
<u>stroll</u>	A short leisurely walk. We took a <b>stroll</b> in the garden.
turn	A place where a road meets or branches off another a turning. Why don t you take a <b>turn</b> around the garden.
walk	A person s manner of walking. <i>He had a funny <b>walk</b>.</i>
<u>wander</u>	An act or instance of wandering. She d go on <b>wander</b> s like that in her nightgown.

### Definitions of "Saunter" as a verb

- Walk leisurely and with no apparent aim.
- Walk in a slow, relaxed manner.

### Synonyms of "Saunter" as a verb (10 Words)

amble	Walk leisurely. They <b>amble</b> d along the riverbank.
<u>drift</u>	Vary or move from a fixed point or course. <b>Drift</b> the boats downstream.
maunder	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. He <b>maunder</b> s through the bank composing his thoughts.
meander	Wander at random. The path <b>meander</b> s through the vineyards.



potter	Work lightly. The old lady is <b>potter</b> ing around in the garden.
promenade	Take a promenade through a place. The ladies <b>promenade</b> d along the beach.
ramble	Walk for pleasure in the countryside. Roses climbed <b>ramble</b> d hung over walls.
<u>stroll</u>	Achieve a sporting victory without effort. The horse <b>stroll</b> ed home by 12 lengths.
walk	Make walk. The patient cannot <b>walk</b> yet.
wander	Be unfaithful to one's regular sexual partner. After dinner we <b>wander</b> ed into town.

# Associations of "Saunter" (30 Words)

aimlessly	Without purpose or direction. We wandered <b>aimlessly</b> round Venice.
amble	Walk or move at a slow, relaxed pace. They <b>amble</b> d along the riverbank.
ambulate	Walk; move about. People who make use of crutches to <b>ambulate</b> .
<u>astray</u>	Into error or morally questionable behaviour. <i>He was led <b>astray</b> by boozy colleagues.</i>
canter	Ride at a canter. We came back from one of our <b>canter</b> s.
<u>drift</u>	A horizontal or inclined passage following a mineral vein or coal seam. <b>Drift</b> the boats downstream.
<u>feral</u>	(especially of an animal) in a wild state, especially after escape from captivity or domestication. <i>Gangs of feral youths.</i>
flit	Move house or leave one's home, typically secretly so as to escape creditors or obligations. <i>The idea had flitted through his mind.</i>



gad	Go from place to place in the pursuit of pleasure. He had heard that I was <b>gad</b> ding about with an airline stewardess.
gait	A horse's manner of moving. The easy <b>gait</b> of an athlete.
gallivant	Wander aimlessly in search of pleasure. She quit her job to go <b>gallivant</b> ing around the globe.
mincing	Affectedly dainty or refined. I don t have to go through the rest of my life with that <b>mincing</b> voice of yours.
pace	Go at a pace. Kirov stepped back a <b>pace</b> .
peripatetic	A person who travels from place to place, especially a teacher who works in more than one school or college. <i>The peripatetic nature of military life.</i>
plod	Walk doggedly and slowly with heavy steps. I could recognize his <b>plod</b> anywhere.
promenade	Take a promenade through a place. They <b>promenade</b> d along the waterfront.
ramble	Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment. <i>This novel rambles on and jogs.</i>
<u>rambling</u>	(of a plant) putting out long shoots and growing over walls or other plants. <i>A big old <b>rambling</b> house.</i>
roam	Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment. Gangs of youths <b>roam</b> ed the streets unopposed.
route	Send via a specific route. The many <b>route</b> s to a healthier diet will be described.
rove	A journey, especially one with no specific destination; an act of wandering. The policeman s eyes <b>rove</b> d around the pub.
<u>stray</u>	A stray person or thing especially a domestic animal. <i>Stray dogs.</i>
stride	Significant progress especially in the phrase make strides. <i>The speaker was getting into his <b>stride</b></i> .
<u>stroll</u>	A leisurely walk (usually in some public place. I <b>stroll</b> ed around the city.
trudge	A long difficult walk. He began the long <b>trudge</b> back to Stokenchurch Street.



walk	A person s manner of walking. He was in place as the male lead but <b>walk</b> ed at the eleventh hour.
walker	A frame used by disabled or infirm people for support while walking, typically made of metal tubing with small wheels or rubber-tipped feet; a walking frame. A fell <b>walker</b> .
walking	Close enough to be walked to. <i>Walking</i> is a healthy form of exercise.
<u>wander</u>	An act or instance of wandering. Please don t <b>wander</b> off again.
