<a href="#"><b>philosopher</b></a>	A person engaged or learned in philosophy, especially as an academic discipline.
<b>pundit</b>	An expert in a particular subject or field who is frequently called upon to give their opinions to the public. <i>Political <b>pundits</b> were tipping him for promotion.</i>
<b>sage</b>	Used in names of aromatic plants of the mint family that resemble sage e g wood sage.

<b><u>scholar</u></b>	A student who holds a scholarship. <i>A phrase borrowed from the Indian <b>scholar</b> Ananda Coomaraswamy.</i>
<b>solomon</b>	(Old Testament) son of David and king of Israel noted for his wisdom (10th century BC).
<b>thinker</b>	An important intellectual. <i>A leading scientific <b>thinker</b>.</i>
<b>wise person</b>	United States religious leader (born in Bohemia) who united reform Jewish organizations in the United States (1819-1900).

<b>academician</b>	Someone elected to honorary membership in an academy.
<b>begin</b>	Be the first item or point constitute the beginning or start come first in a series. <i>The DMZ <b>begins</b> right over the hill.</i>
<b>celebrated</b>	Widely known and esteemed. <i>A <b>celebrated</b> mathematician.</i>
<b>columnist</b>	A journalist who writes editorials.
<b><u>commence</u></b>	Take the first step or steps in carrying out an action. <i>His design team <b>commenced</b> work.</i>
<b>distinguished</b>	(used of persons) standing above others in character or attainment or reputation. <i>A <b>distinguished</b> American educationist.</i>
<b>eminent</b>	Of imposing height; especially standing out above others. <i>An <b>eminent</b> peak.</i>
<b><u>famous</u></b>	Known about by many people. <i>The country is <b>famous</b> for its natural beauty.</i>
<b>honorary</b>	Of a person holding an honorary title or position. <i>An <b>honorary</b> doctorate.</i>
<b>illustrious</b>	Widely known and esteemed. <i>An <b>illustrious</b> judge.</i>
<b>inaugurate</b>	Be a precursor of. <i>The new President will be <b>inaugurated</b> on January 20.</i>
<b>initiate</b>	A person who has been initiated into an organization or activity. <i>He <b>initiated</b> a new program.</i>
<b>known</b>	Apprehended with certainty. <i>A musician <b>known</b> throughout the world.</i>

<b>launch</b>	An act or instance of launching something. <i>The town's lifeboat was <b>launched</b> to rescue the fishermen.</i>
<b>luminary</b>	A person who inspires or influences others, especially one prominent in a particular sphere. <i>One of the luminaries of child psychiatry.</i>
<b>notable</b>	Worthy of attention or notice; remarkable. <i>A <b>notable</b> increase in the crime rate.</i>
<b>noted</b>	Well known; famous. <i>The restaurant is <b>noted</b> for its high standards of cuisine.</i>
<b>officially</b>	With the authority of the government or other organization. <i>There is a possibility he was murdered <b>officially</b> he died in a car smash.</i>
<b>operetta</b>	A short opera usually on a light or humorous theme and typically having spoken dialogue. Notable composers of operettas include Offenbach, Johann Strauss, Franz Lehár and Gilbert and Sullivan.
<b>outstanding</b>	Distinguished from others in excellence. <i>Einstein was one of the <b>outstanding</b> figures of the 20th century.</i>
<b>perhaps</b>	By chance. <i><b>Perhaps</b> not surprisingly he was cautious about committing himself.</i>
<b>personage</b>	A character in a play or other work. <i>A strange <b>personage</b> appeared at the door.</i>
<b>playwright</b>	A person who writes plays.
<b>prominent</b>	Situated so as to catch the attention; noticeable. <i>A <b>prominent</b> citizen.</i>
<b>pundit</b>	Someone who has been admitted to membership in a scholarly field. <i>Political <b>pundits</b> were tipping him for promotion.</i>
<b>renowned</b>	Known or talked about by many people; famous. <i>A <b>renowned</b> author.</i>
<b>start</b>	Give a signal to competitors to start in a race. <i>The blood shed <b>started</b> when the partisans launched a surprise attack.</i>
<b>tragedian</b>	A writer (especially a playwright) who writes tragedies.
<b>writer</b>	A clerk, especially in the navy or in government offices. <i>Dickens was a prolific <b>writer</b>.</i>
