## Save as a Verb

### Definitions of "Save" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “save” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Avoid, lessen, or guard against.*
- *Spend less; buy at a reduced price.*
- *Prevent (someone) from dying.*
- *Accumulate money for future use.*
- *Record data on a computer.*
- *Keep safe or rescue (someone or something) from harm or danger.*
- *(of a goalkeeper in soccer and hockey) stop (a shot) from entering the goal.*
- *Bring into safety.*
- *Keep (data) by moving a copy to a storage location.*
- *Stop talking.*

- *Refrain from harming.*
- *Prevent an opponent from scoring (a goal or point) in a game or from winning (the game).*
- *Avoid the need to use up or spend (money, time, or other resources).*
- *(in Christian use) preserve (a person's soul) from damnation.*
- *Keep (someone) in health (used in exclamations and formulaic expressions).*
- *Save from ruin, destruction, or harm.*
- *Keep and store up (something, especially money) for future use.*
- *To keep up and reserve for personal or special use.*

<b>come to someone's rescue</b>	Cover a certain distance.
<b><u>conserve</u></b>	Maintain (a quantity such as energy) at a constant overall total. <i>The funds raised will help <b>conserve</b> endangered meadowlands.</i>
<b>deliver</b>	Deliver a speech oration or idea. <b>Deliver</b> an attack.
<b>economise</b>	Use cautiously and frugally.
<b>economize</b>	Spend less; reduce one's expenses. <i>I try to <b>economize</b> my spare time.</i>
<b>forestall</b>	Keep from happening or arising; make impossible. <i>He would have spoken but David <b>forestalled</b> him.</i>
<b>guard</b>	Watch over or shield from danger or harm; protect. <i>Farmers must <b>guard</b> against sudden changes in the market.</i>
<b><u>hoard</u></b>	Accumulate (money or valued objects) and hide or store away. <i>Thousands of antiques <b>hoarded</b> by a compulsive collector.</i>
<b>hold open</b>	Be pertinent or relevant or applicable.
<b><u>keep</u></b>	Cause to continue in a certain state position or activity e g keep clean. <i>Return one copy to me <b>keeping</b> the other for your files.</i>
<b>keep for future use</b>	Retain rights to.
<b>keep in reserve</b>	Keep in a certain state, position, or activity.
<b>keep open</b>	Behave as expected during of holidays or rites.
<b>keep safe</b>	Allow to remain in a place or position or maintain a property or feature.
<b>lay aside</b>	Impose as a duty, burden, or punishment.
<b>lay by</b>	Lay eggs.
<b>make economies</b>	Perform or carry out.
<b>make unnecessary</b>	Represent fictitiously, as in a play, or pretend to be or act like.

<b>obviate</b>	Prevent the occurrence of; prevent from happening. <i>The presence of roller blinds <b>obviated</b> the need for curtains.</i>
<u>preserve</u>	Keep undisturbed for personal or private use for hunting, shooting, or fishing. <b>Preserved</b> meats.
<b>prevent</b>	Keep from happening or arising; make impossible. <i>Locks won't <b>prevent</b> a determined burglar from getting in.</i>
<b>protect</b>	Preserve or guarantee by means of formal or legal measures. <i>Use a sunscreen that <b>protects</b> against both UVA and UVB.</i>
<b>pull through</b>	Cause to move in a certain direction by exerting a force upon, either physically or in an abstract sense.
<b>put aside</b>	Cause (someone) to undergo something.
<b>put by</b>	Cause (someone) to undergo something.
<b>put in a safe place</b>	Make an investment.
<b>put to one side</b>	Cause to be in a certain state; cause to be in a certain relation.
<b>redeem</b>	Atone or make amends for (sin, error, or evil). <i>The party prepared to <b>redeem</b> the pledges of the past three years.</i>
<b>relieve</b>	Relieve oneself of troubling information. <i>He <b>relieved</b> her of her baggage.</i>
<b>rescue</b>	Save (someone) from a dangerous or difficult situation. <i>He got out of his chair to <b>rescue</b> his cup of coffee.</i>
<u>reserve</u>	Arrange for and reserve something for someone else in advance. <i>We managed to <b>reserve</b> a table at Maxim's.</i>
<u>retain</u>	Secure the services of (a barrister) with a preliminary payment. <i>She <b>retained</b> her composure.</i>
<b>safeguard</b>	Make safe. <i>A framework which <b>safeguards</b> employees from exploitation.</i>
<u>salvage</u>	Collect discarded or refused material. <i>It was the only crumb of comfort he could <b>salvage</b> from the ordeal.</i>
<b>salve</b>	Apply a salve to usually for the purpose of healing. <i>Charity <b>salves</b> our conscience.</i>
<b>save for a rainy day</b>	Refrain from harming.
<b>save someone's life</b>	Save from ruin, destruction, or harm.
<b>save up</b>	Spend less; buy at a reduced price.



<b>scrimp</b>	Be thrifty or parsimonious; economize. <i>I have <b>scrimped</b> and saved to give you a good education.</i>
<b>scrimp and scrape</b>	Subsist on a meager allowance.
<b>set aside</b>	Become gelatinous.
<b><u>spare</u></b>	Refrain from inflicting (something unpleasant) on (someone). <i>She asked if I could <b>spare</b> her a bob or two.</i>
<b>stockpile</b>	Have on hand. <i>He claimed that the weapons were being <b>stockpiled</b>.</i>
<b><u>store</u></b>	Find a place for and put away for storage. <b>Store</b> grain for the winter.
<b><u>write</u></b>	Write and send a letter to. <i>She <b>writes</b> code faster than anybody else.</i>

<b>economical</b>	Of or relating to an economy, the system of production and management of material wealth. <i>The cast are <b>economical</b> with their actions.</i>
<b>frugal</b>	Avoiding waste. <i>A <b>frugal</b> farmer.</i>
<b>frugality</b>	The quality of being economical with money or food; thriftiness. <i>He scorned the finer things in life and valued <b>frugality</b> and simplicity.</i>
<b><u>inexpensive</u></b>	Relatively low in price or charging low prices. <i><b>Inexpensive</b> family restaurants.</i>
<b>meagerly</b>	To a meager degree or in a meager manner. <i>These voices are <b>meagerly</b> represented at the conference.</i>
<b>miser</b>	A stingy hoarder of money and possessions often living miserably. <i>A typical <b>miser</b> he hid his money in the house in various places.</i>
<b>parsimony</b>	Extreme unwillingness to spend money or use resources. <i>A great tradition of public design has been shattered by government <b>parsimony</b>.</i>
<b>rebate</b>	Join with a rebate. <i><b>Rebate</b> the pieces of timber and stone.</i>
<b>redemptive</b>	Of or relating to or resulting in redemption- E.K.Brown. <i>The healing power of <b>redemptive</b> love.</i>
<b>rescue</b>	Save (someone) from a dangerous or difficult situation. <i>He got out of his chair to <b>rescue</b> his cup of coffee.</i>
<b>saving</b>	An act of economizing; reduction in cost. <i>The agents were cheating them out of their life <b>savings</b>.</i>
<b><u>savings</u></b>	A fund of money put by as a reserve.
<b>schlock</b>	Cheap or inferior goods or material; trash. <i>Mass produced <b>schlock</b>.</i>
<b>scrimp</b>	Subsist on a meager allowance. <i>I have <b>scrimped</b> and saved to give you a good education.</i>
<b>skimp</b>	A fashionably short or revealing garment. <i>Don't <b>skimp</b> on insurance when you book your holidays.</i>
<b>sparing</b>	Moderate; economical. <i>Physicians advised <b>sparing</b> use of the ointment.</i>
<b><u>sparingly</u></b>	In a restricted or infrequent manner; in small quantities. <i>The sharply flavoured leaves should be used <b>sparingly</b>.</i>
<b>stinginess</b>	A lack of generosity; a general unwillingness to part with money.

**thrift** A European plant which forms low-growing tufts of slender leaves with rounded pink flower heads, growing chiefly on sea cliffs and mountains.  
*The values of **thrift** and self reliance.*

**thriftiness** Frugality in the expenditure of money or resources.

**thrifty** Careful and diligent in the use of resources.  
*He had been brought up to be **thrifty** and careful.*

**tightwad** A miserly person.  
*He is a notorious **tightwad**.*
